Once-Gored Matadora Has 'Poor Day'

NUEVO LAREDO, Mexico (U) — Pretty, blonde Patricia McCormick returned to the bull ring here Sunday for the first time since she was seriously gored seven months ago and had a "bad afternoon."

The 24-year-old Texas girl, alternating with two men bullfighters who had not yet attained the standing of a torero, fought two black bulls that were not very aggressive.

The crowd of 4,000 gave her a big hand and awarded her a bouquet of red roses but no ears, the accolade of the true bullfighter.

The last time she fought here the crowd awarded her the bull's ears and tail.

"We all have bad afternoons," Pat said after the fight. "And we like to avoid them as much as possible."

The young girl was pale, but did not appear to be afraid as she faced the bulls in this Rio Grande border town Sunday. She is billed for another fight next Sunday at Ciudad Acuna, across the Rio Grande from Del Rio, Tex.

It was in Ciudad Acuna last Sept. 5 that Pat almost met death in the bullring. A bullfighter for three years, she was working her second bull just before the kill when it charged.

The bull lifted her high on its horns. Her trainer, Alejandro del Hierro, pulled her free in a display of extraordinary heroism.

Pat underwent numerous transfusions and emergency surgery. Her mother, Mrs. E.B. McCormick of Big Spring, Tex., said that while Pat was unconscious she kept saying "Tell them I'll fight them again."

She has spent the last three months in Mexico training for her comeback. Her mother, who has been in Mexico with her, watched her fight Sunday. Her father, a civil engineer, stayed in Big Spring, Tex.

New Method For Treating Cancer Told

OAKLAND, Calif. (U) — Encouraging results in the treatment of far-advanced cancer patients with nitrogen mustard and hormones were reported Sunday by an Oakland physician.

Some patients who had been given only a few weeks to live have been kept going for as long as three years and have been comparatively free of pain, said Dr. William D. McCarthy. He reported the results in the New England Journal of Medicine.

Nitrogen mustard, a chemical relative of poison gas, has long been known as a weapon against cancer but it can be otherwise dangerous to the patient. It can damage the blood-producing mechanism in the bone marrow and can cause violent nausea and vomiting.

Use of the hormones acth and cortisone counteracts the ill effects of nitrogen mustard, Dr. McCarthy asserted.

Of 100 cancer patients, Dr. McCarthy said, 16 who presumably were dying recovered sufficiently to go back to work. Fifteen others got "good relief." Twenty-nine others got some help but the remaining 40 did not benefit.

Father, Son Missing After Boat Capsizes

OCEANPORT, N. J. (U) — A home-made 12-foot skimmer capsized in the Shrewsbury River Sunday and pitched its four occupants into the rapid currents of the stream. A father and son were carried by the tide downriver and are presumed to have drowned.

A heroic young nurse in a passing cabin cruiser jumped into the fast river and rescued a third member of the family—an 11-year-old girl who was going down for the third time.

The missing were identified by police as Barney Fain, 32, of Norfolk, Va., and his son, Alan, 9.

The nurse, Miss Joan Beston, 24, of Whippany, dove over the side of the craft and brought the child, Carol Fain, to the surface and then helped her aboard the cabin cruiser.

The owner of the ill-fated boat, Neil Bry, 22, of Oceanport, Carol's uncle, had kept the child afloat for about 10 minutes before he let go.

Bry managed to swim to the rescue vessel owned by Breck Hamblen of East Orange.

Mrs. Hamblen, who pumped nearly a gallon of foamy water out of Carol in artificial respiration after the child was hauled aboard, said Carol's first words were:

"Where's my daddy. I know he is dead."

Critics Ask Virgin Isles Chief Recall

CHARLOTTE AMALIE, Virgin Islands (U) — Critics of Gov. Archie A. Alexander launched a coordinated campaign over the weekend to have President Eisenhower recall him. Republicans and Democrats joined in the attack.

The move came one year after Alexander took office. The governor, a Negro, celebrated the anniversary at his home in Des Moines, Iowa. He is the first Republican chief executive since the Virgin Islands began civil government in 1931.

The concerted attack on the governor had been expected for some time. He has been feuding with the Legislature and vetoed the islands' budget.

The Unity Club addressed an open letter to President Eisenhower, saying:

"We are a peaceful and law-abiding people who sincerely believe in liberty and democracy. We abhor the vigilant intolerance of a dictatorship under any guise. We carry no racial bias since the people of all races have lived in peace and harmony in these islands."

"One year after the inauguration of Gov. Alexander, there is an atmosphere of fear and uncertainty among all the elements of our community."

"We ask you in good faith to recall him and place the administration of the Virgin Islands in the hands of a competent executive sympathetic to the people, their problems, and their aspirations for advancement in self-government."

Union Cited for Non-Communist Affidavit Lack

WASHINGTON (U) — The United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America were ordered by the National Labor Relations Board Sunday to show cause why it should not be held in non-compliance with the Labor Management Act.

The board said that from "informal investigations" by its agents it "appears" that William Elconin has been president of the union's District Council No. 10 and has performed the duties of general vice president of District No. 10 since 1950, but that no non-Communist affidavit has been filed with him.

District No. 10 of the union, with headquarters at Oakland, Calif., includes California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Nebraska.

Solon Warns Allies May Lose Viet Nam

WASHINGTON (U) — Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) said Saturday the Free World is in danger of losing South Viet Nam and possibly Japan unless it substitutes a "bold new" program for "crisis diplomacy" in the Far East.

The situation in both strategic areas, he said, "has deteriorated alarmingly" in the past six months while American attention has been focused on the Formosan Straits.

"Yet Japan is the main Communist target in Asia," he added in an interview. "and Viet Nam is at least as important to us as Formosa."

Mansfield, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and an Asian specialist, gave this summary:

Viet Nam is perhaps only days away from events that could mean a civil war in which the United States would be legally unable to intervene. Chaos in this southern half of the Indochina peninsula would open the gates for the Communist drive toward rich Southeast Asia.

A slower - fused crisis is pushing Japan toward a search for markets, essential for the livelihood of its 82 million people, and the search may produce an economic liaison with Communist areas.

This, said Mansfield, has prompted recent promises by Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama to seek "normalization of relations" with the Communist bloc.

Mansfield's views are shared by several members of foreign policy committees in both houses. Several have complained recently that inadequate attention has been paid to the dangers of losing these two areas, the east and west anchors of the present American defensive position in Asia.

Mansfield said a "hand-to-mouth foreign policy" which he contended permitted this country to drift into the Korean and Formosan crises, is preventing the country from being "fully and soberly" informed of what the administration intends doing about the rest of Asia.
