

Janzen Quits Durocher Club

Forest Grove Hurler Signs With Seattle

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Larry Janzen, who spent his entire eight-year major league career with the New York Giants, quit the club Tuesday and announced he would pitch for Seattle of the Pacific Coast League.

The 34-year-old father of seven children was attempting a come-back this year after being dropped from the pitching corps and made a coach last July. He has been ineffective in spring training.

Janzen said he thought he could make more money than the estimated \$10,000 he gets from the Giants, adding that he would be closer to his home in Forest Grove, Ore., playing for the PCL club.

He joined the Giants in 1947 after winning 30 games for San Francisco in the Coast League the previous year and promptly won 21 games while losing only five, leading the league with an .808 percentage. In 1951, he won 23 and lost 11.

Reynolds Bases Suit on Accident

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Allie Reynolds, ex-pitching star of the New York Yankees, filed suit for \$235,250 against the Philadelphia Transportation Co. Tuesday for injuries allegedly suffered in a bus accident here on July 7, 1953.

Reynolds retired this year because of a recurring back ailment. The suit, filed in U.S. district court, said Reynolds was riding in a chartered PTC bus when the driver tried to go under "an overhead railway system near 30th Street station." The bus roof was torn loose and part of it crashed down upon Reynolds, the suit charged, causing "severe, painful and permanent" injuries.

Junior colleges are springing up every year, with new and larger leagues being formed. This is good news to Oregon State and Oregon as well as the California colleges, for the JC's are a great source of experienced athletes who have been nursed through their first couple of years of book work.

College of Pacific and the Cal Aggies had a rather spectacular track meet a couple of weeks back. A 25 mile per hour wind alternately aided and hindered the athletes. The 880 was taken by COP's Jack Marden in 2:55, nearly a full minute slower than his best time of 1:58. The wind was behind the sprinters, however, and a .09-8 hundred was recorded. There was just as much optimism around Olson's headquarters, but no talk of a knockout. Olson, who expects to weigh around 170 pounds, figures to maul Maxim savagely around the mid-section in the manner that has won him 61 of 67 previous fights, including the last 20 in a row.

Veteran observers were more inclined to string with Olson than with Maxim. Pre-fight odds, which a week ago were 6-5, had lengthened to 2-1 on the eve of the scheduled 10-round bout. The fact that the 33-year-old Maxim had to reduce nearly 15 pounds while Olson at 26 could pick up a few was said to be a key factor in the advance figuring.

The gross for the match is expected to come close to \$150,000, which would be an all-time high for a non-title event in San Francisco and second high to the \$167,000 Ezzard Charles and Pat Valentin drew in their heavyweight encounter in 1949.

Despite the forfeit if Maxim fails to make the weight, the fight will go on with only Kearns \$10,000 lighter. National television is scheduled with San Francisco blacked out, starting at 7 p. m.

Cockell Gets U.S. Greeting

British Hope Arrives For Marciano Battle

NEW YORK (AP)—England's Don Cockell went through a three hour "ordeal" with the press Tuesday and said "fighting Marciano should be a lot easier."

Despite his remarks about the "ordeal," the 26-year-old British Empire heavyweight king who meets world champion Rocky Marciano in San Francisco May 16, was good natured throughout a series of interviews and picture-taking sessions with about 100 newsmen and photographers at a downtown restaurant.

The pudgy Briton arrived Tuesday morning on the Queen Mary and from then on he was interviewed until his ears turned red. The only time he became sharp was when repeated questions were fired at his knockout losses to Randy Turpin and Jimmy Slade. Simpson repeated the details of his defeats to Turpin and Slade.

"He had to cut off close to 40 pounds each time. We told him he could no longer make the light heavyweight limit of 175 pounds but he insisted on trying. It weakened him too much. As a heavyweight he is faster and a better puncher. I give him a 50-50 chance to win the title."

Bookmakers have established the undefeated Marciano as a 5-1 favorite to keep his all-winning string intact.

What did Cockell think of his chances? "I didn't come here to lose," he replied tartly, his eyes glinting. "I'm hopeful of winning and if I don't think I had a chance I never would have come here. "Marciano is a great champion and he behaves like a champion. If I should win, I only hope I can conduct myself like he does."

the third. But he was greeted with rousing cheers after hitting the seats in the left field corner in the fifth.

The Athletics, playing with former President Harry Truman, Connie Mack and 32,843 fans in the sky, scored three runs in the sixth off starter Ned Garver to break up a 2-2 tie. Alex Kellner started for the A's and was credited with the victory as Ewell Blackwell, late of the Yankees, protected the sixth-inning lead through the last three frames, giving up just two hits.

Warren Spahn won his third opening day decision since the Braves moved into Milwaukee, although he was behind 2-1, going into the ventful last half of the eighth. Tanner batted for the veteran lefty and smacked Gerry Staley's first pitch over the right field wall. Bill Bruton followed with a single and Hank Aaron swatted Staley's next pitch into center for a triple that scored the lead run. Bobby Thomson brought Aaron home with a sacrifice fly to cap a great day for the 43,640 fans.

'Klu' Connects Up until the time he ran into Tanner, Staley had retired 11 men in order. He got his 2-1 lead in the top of the eighth as Ted Kluszewski, who led the majors with 49 home runs last season, hit his second homer of the 1955 campaign.

Tanner, 25 and up from Atlanta, became the second rookie to hit the first pitch for a pinch home run while making his first appearance in the majors. The Cardinals' Ed Morgan did it on April 14, 1936.

The Cubs and Dee Fondy clobbered the Cards all the way while winning their second game of the season with 26,133 on hand—the largest Chicago opening day crowd since 1929. Fondy drove in five of the 11 runs scored by the Cubs in the first two innings. Brooks Lawrence, a rookie standout for the Cards last season, didn't last out the first frame. In all, the Cubs swung for 18 hits off Lawrence and four other Card hurlers.

Minner Winner Paul Minner scattered nine St. Louis hits, including three doubles and rookie Ken Boyer's home run. Third baseman Ted Lepcio hit a pair of home runs in Boston's success against the Orioles to become the first to hit two homers in one game at Baltimore's vast Memorial Stadium. A crowd of 38,085 Baltimore fans, buffeted by winds that dropped the temperature to 56 degrees, saw the Orioles held to five hits by Fran Sullivan.
