## Camp Fire Board Meeting Called

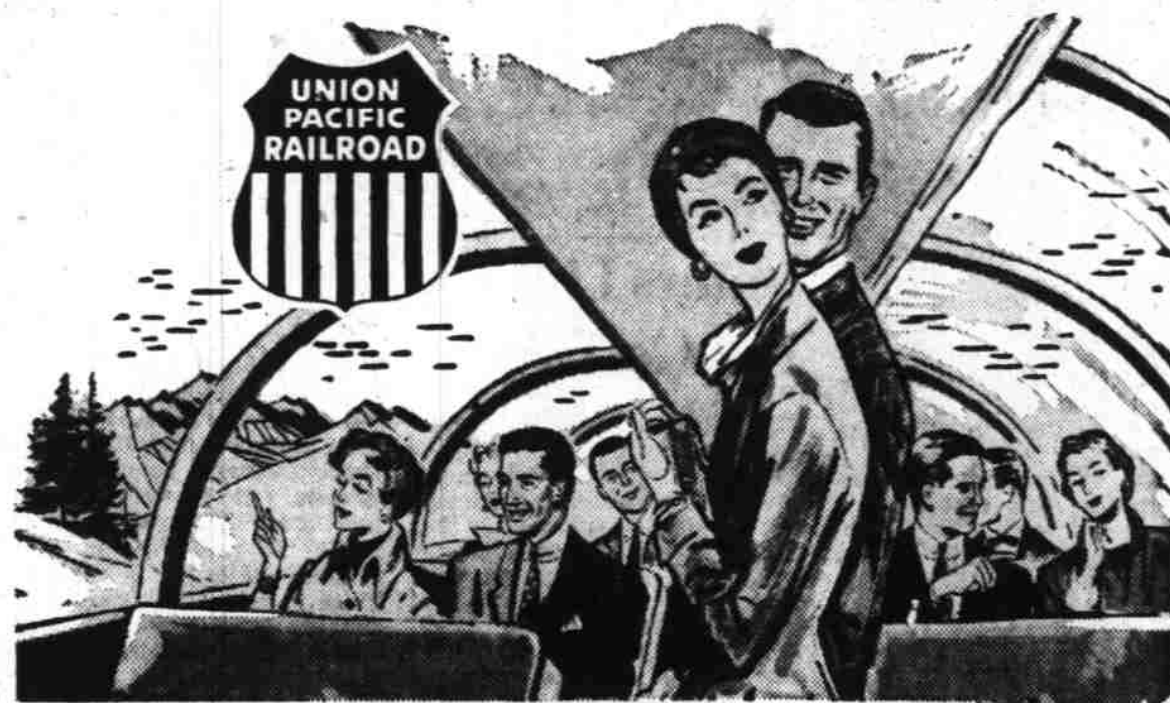
