

Polk Children to Get Polio Vaccine Shots Next Week

DALLAS, Ore.—Polk County's first and second-graders next week get the first of possibly three shots of Salk polio vaccine in accordance with a schedule which repeats itself the following week when the second shot is given.

Nine hundred fifty-eight of the county's estimated 1,100 first and second grade pupils have signed up for the vaccination, declared to be 80 to 90 per cent effective against paralytic polio.

In charge of the volunteer program of giving the shots is Dr. E. B. Bossatti, part-time Polk County health officer. He will be assisted by Dr. Lucille Fortner in West Salem and a number of private physicians from Monmouth, Independence and Dallas.

First Two Shots
Besides the first two shots to be given during the weeks of April 18-22 and April 25-29, a fall booster shot is tentatively slated. The morning round of shots at all locations starts at 9 a.m.; the afternoon round, at 1 p.m. Children from the smaller schools will be transported to the school where the physicians will be.

Thursday morning at West Salem Grade School; West Salem, Zena, Eola, Oak Grove, Brush College, Popcorn and Mountain View; 204 pupils.
Thursday afternoon at Grand Ronde School; Grand Ronde and Buell; 34 pupils.

Friday morning at Rickreall Grade School; Rickreall, Greenwood and Oak Point; 24 pupils.
Friday afternoon at Valseit School; Valseit only; 63 pupils.

Dr. Giedt said he expected vaccine will be available in time to begin inoculations in Washington Monday, of the 127,000 scheduled for first inoculations, all are first and second graders except for about 5,900 now in the third and fourth grades in the three 1954 test counties. These are the youngsters who got the dummy shots last year, and they're to get special consideration now for that reason.

Cattle Bidding Slow; Prices Turn Out Low

Whether the damp weather or the beef situation, or both, were reflected in the bidding of the R. B. Sears dispersal sale Tuesday, prices were low and bidding was slow. Total returns from the 59 head sold were \$11,235. However, a number of young stock was included in the sale.

This was the first sale held in the new Gillaspie auction yard at Salem, with some 200 folk, seemingly many of them merely spectators around the ring. Visitors expressed considerable pleasure at the modern auction yard which was added to Salem livestock equipment.

Clayton Mann of Philomath paid top price at the sale when he bought four-year-old Sr. Choice Lady 32d for \$610. Lady was out of Royal Maid 6th and her sire was Alf Choate Domino 22d. A son, Leskan 45th, dropped Oct. 8, 1953, brought the second highest price, \$450, from Fred Muhs of McMinnville.

Lela Worthmore, a five-year-old cow, for which Sears had paid \$1,224 at a State Fair sale three years ago, only went to \$330 Tuesday as she was bid in by H. R. Jones of Salem.

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Oregon Civil Service Has Job Openings

The crippled children's division of the University of Oregon Medical School is looking for a medical social work consultant, the state Civil Service Commission announced here Tuesday.

An immediate vacancy exists in Portland.

Applicants for this position should have at least two years of graduate training in an accepted school of social work with field and course work in medical welfare cases, and two years of professional experience in a medical social work position, or an equivalent combination of experience and training.

Starting salary for the position is in the \$379-426 a month range, depending upon the qualifications of the person who is appointed.

Other Positions

Applications also are being accepted by the Civil Service Commission for examination for field representative, fair employment practices division of the State Labor Bureau. The starting salary is \$336 and increases to \$410 a month.

Qualifications for this examination include two years experience in labor relations, vocational counseling, adult education, or a related area, one year of which must have been in interracial relations.

College Graduates

Applicants should be college graduates with major course work in sociology, economics, adult education, cultural anthropology, vocational guidance, industrial psychology, or related fields. Additional pertinent experience will substitute on a year for year basis for the college training.

The commission also is accepting applications for an examination for transportation rate analyst with a salary range of \$296-\$364 a month.

Minimum qualifications call for college graduation with specialization in transportation.

Children Rescued From Snowbound Bus in Wyoming

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (UP)—Six children were rescued from a snowbound school bus Tuesday as the second spring blizzard within a week swirled across portions of the Great Plains States, marooning scores of motorists, blocking highways and isolating communities.

The children, who had been trapped aboard the bus since Monday afternoon when they were caught in the storm's fury en route home from their classes, were taken to safety by two Union Pacific Railroad section hands. None of the six suffered any ill effects.

The storm virtually isolated Cheyenne. Tuesday it was whipping across a big area of Southwestern Wyoming, Northeastern Colorado and Southwestern Nebraska.

Home, Farm Loans to Vets Gain Over '54

The Department of Veterans' Affairs loaned \$16,381,000 to 2,448 World War II and Korean veterans in the 12-month period ended March 31. Ernest J. Smith, loan manager, reported here Tuesday. This was a 28 per cent gain over the corresponding period a year ago.

Loans in the past year average slightly over \$1,365,000 to 204 veterans each month. The average veteran's loan amounted to \$6,691.

In the nearly 10 years since the program started, Smith said 14,338 veterans have borrowed \$71,117,839. They have already repaid \$32,978,303 in principal and interest, with monthly repayments exceeding \$800,000. More than \$20,000,000 of the principal repayments has been re-loaned.

The state veterans' loans are at four per cent interest. An eligible veteran may borrow up to 75 per cent of the appraised value of the property to a maximum of \$9,000 to purchase, refinance or construct a home or \$15,000 to acquire a farm. The veteran borrows direct from the state veterans' department.

The applicant, to qualify, must be a veteran of World War II or the Korean emergency, and have been a resident of Oregon at the time of his enlistment or for a period of two years following discharge. The World War II veteran's postwar residence must have been prior to Dec. 31, 1950.

Applications are filed through county veterans' service officers, or with the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Finance Building, Salem, or State Office Building, Portland.

Unsuccessful attempts to break into two Salem businesses were reported to Salem police Tuesday.

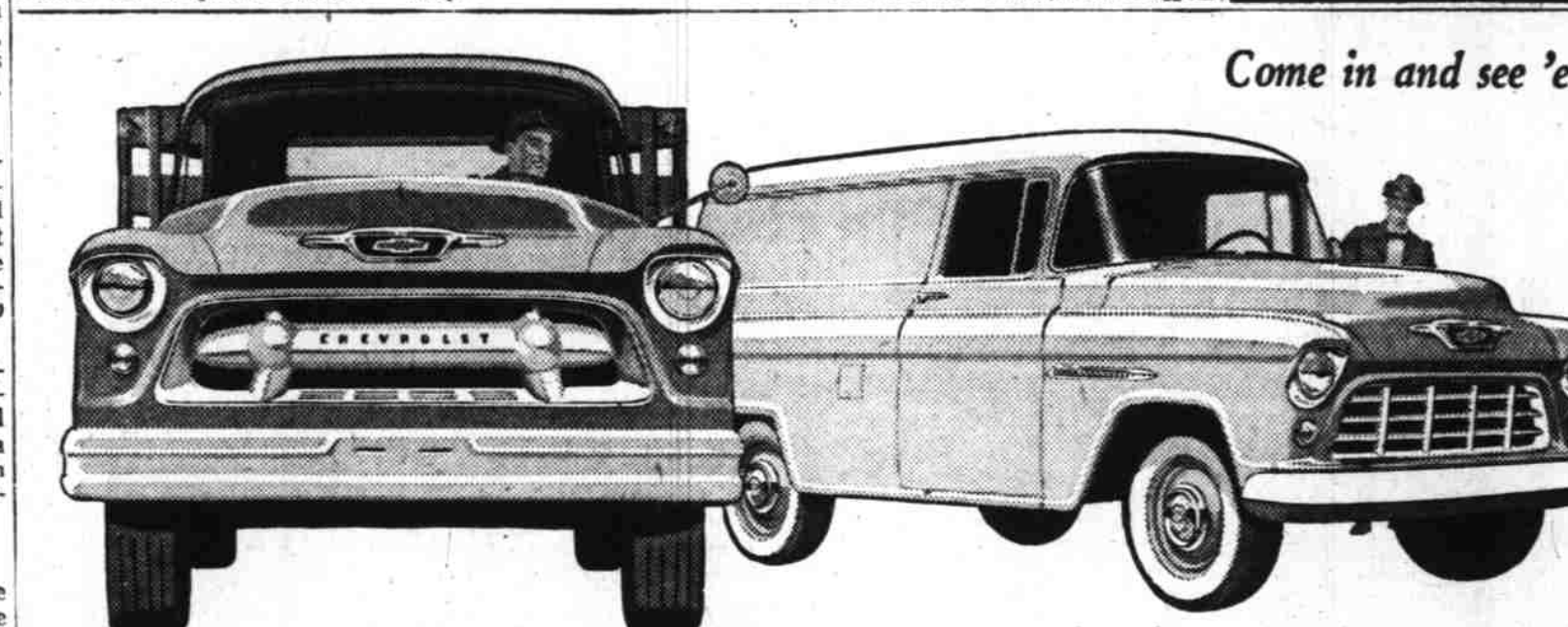
