David Carson and Lowell Spagle of Salem both earned straight A averages in their course work at least 12 academic hours.

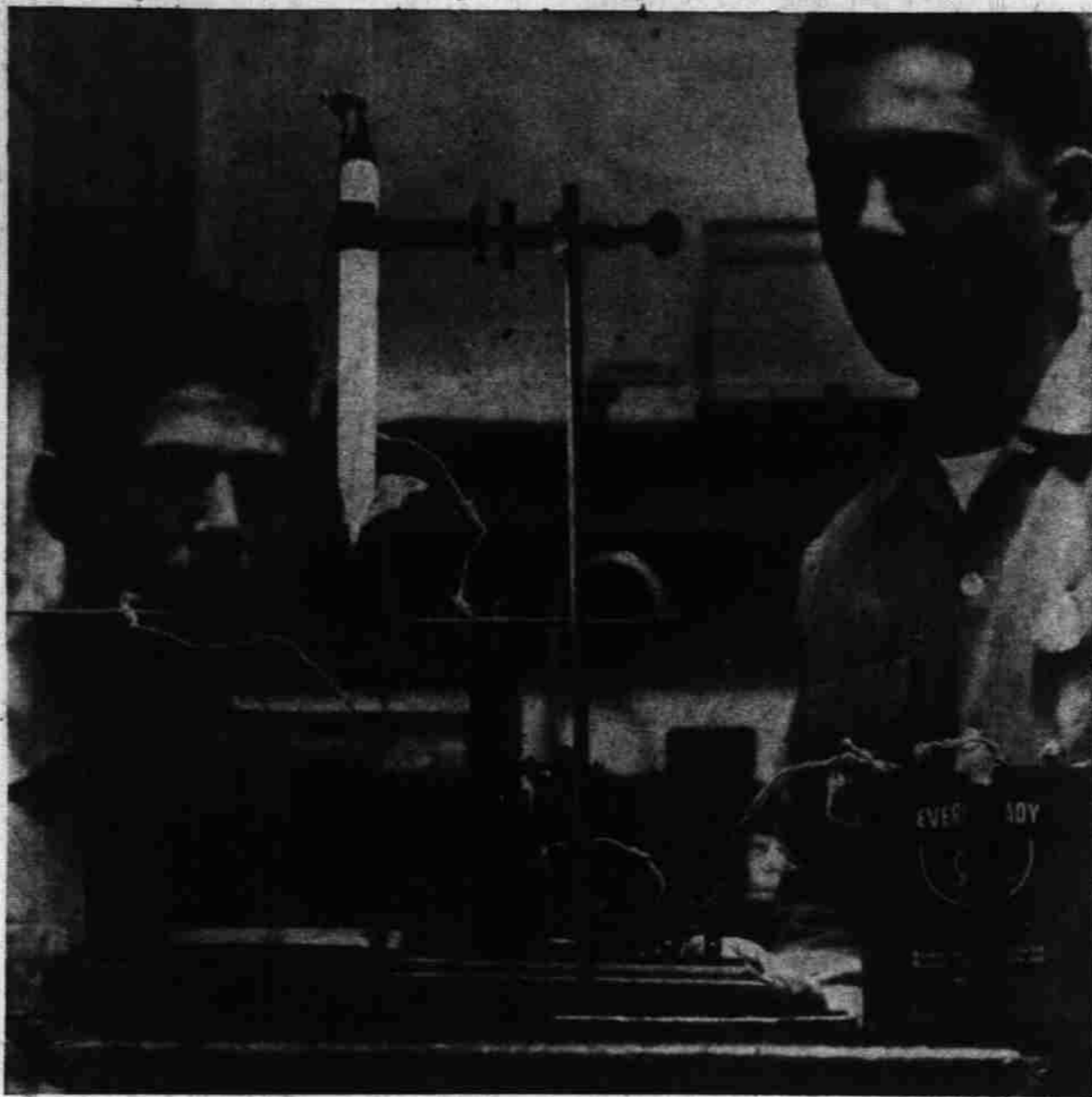

Her husband, Dr. Ernest Warrington, was for many years on the religion department staff at Oregon State College. He retired several years ago. From Sept. 1, 1953 to June 1, 1954, the Warringtons resided in Salem where Dr. Warrington temporarily headed the adult Christian education section of the First Presbyterian Church staff.

Surviving in addition to the husband are several children, including Dr. W. R. Warrington, a Portland physician.

Continuing of Development Unit Favored

The executive committee of the Salem Chamber of Commerce went on record Tuesday favoring the continuation of the Oregon Development Council "on an expanded basis," and the transferring of its headquarters from Portland to Salem.

The action was taken as a protest to pending legislation which would abolish the commission instead of granting it the 20 per cent increase in its \$50,000 annual budget as has been requested.

The chamber said moving the offices to Salem would bring them nearer the center of population and in proximity to other major state functions.

Also favored by action of the chamber Tuesday was a senate bill which would prohibit cities from levying business taxes such as Portland has invoked.
