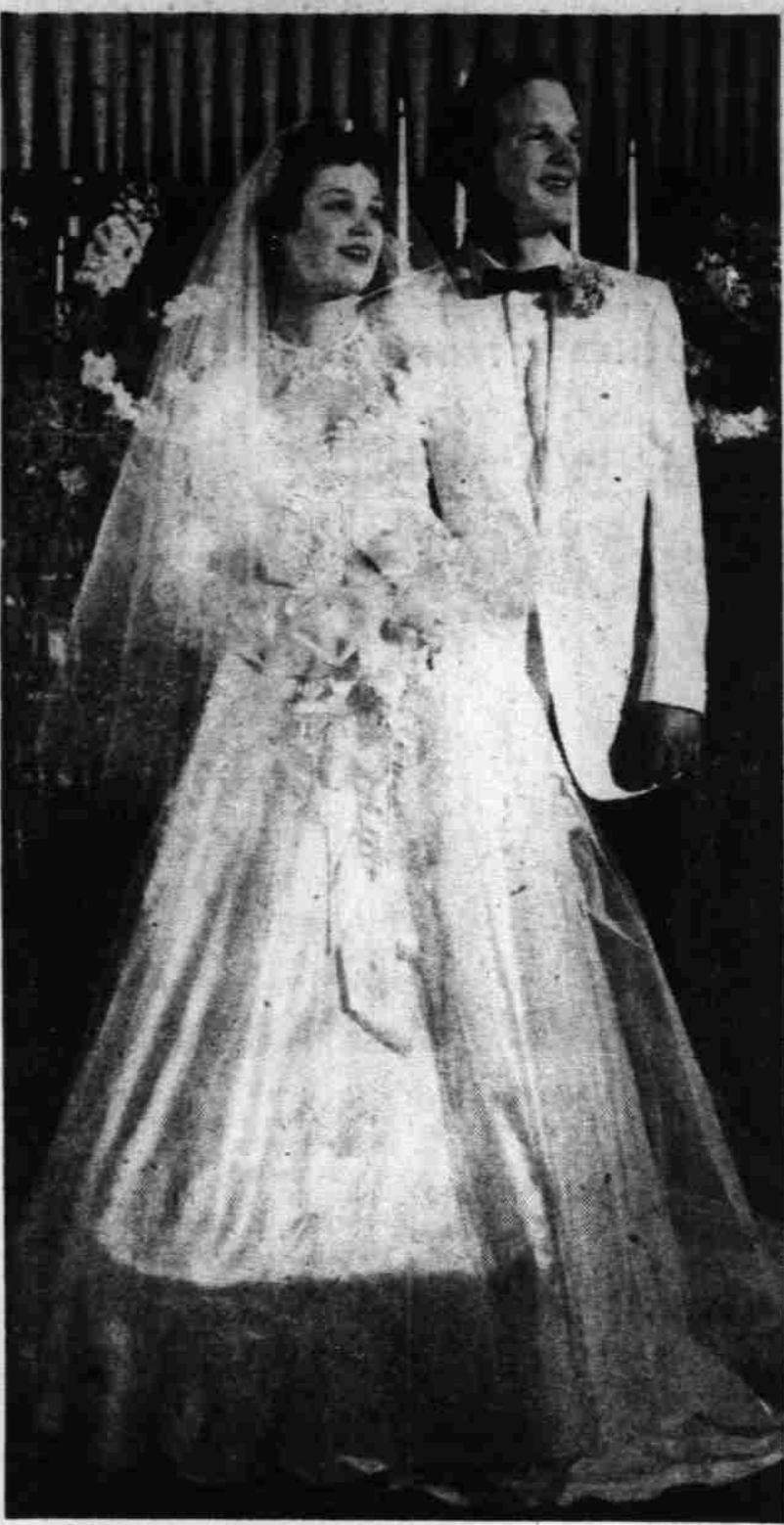

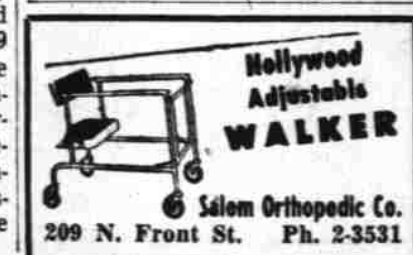

Dennis Patch YWCA Board Speaker

The YWCA held its regular monthly board meeting and membership meeting Tuesday at the YW. Mrs. Robert Gregg, president of the association, presided. Committee chairmen gave their regular reports and Mrs. Gregg invited the board to attend the Labor Management Council Institute to be held at the YMCA on April 19.

The main item of business was voting on the amendment, which deals with registration fees for men, boys and children.

Mrs. C. M. Collins, chairman of the public affairs committee of the YWCA presented the program. In the absence of Harvey Wright, Dennis Patch from the Department of Education spoke on the problems which will be encountered by the Indians on the Klamath Falls Reservation, when their status as wards of the Government will be terminated in 1958.

The State of Oregon, through the State Board of Education, will administer a special education program starting May 1. The goal of this program is to educate, not only the young people among the Klamath Indians, but also the adults. Program for adults will include such topics as banking, taxes, home sanitation, child care, and acquaintanceship with services of public and private agencies.

Mrs. Forrest Lemm and Miss Pat Gentle presented the problems faced by migrants. These include lack of voting opportunities because of no permanent residence; exclusion from national labor relations act; no social security; inability for public welfare.

The speakers emphasized the feeling of insecurity which is faced by migrant families because of irregularity of work and by the children who never have an opportunity to put roots into a school or community life.
