70 Seniors Await Diplomas at Silvertown Union High School

SILVERTOWN—Seventy students will receive diplomas at the first Silvertown Union High School commencement program June 1 at 8 p. m. in the school gymnasium. There will be 16 seniors graduating from other high schools as tuition students, because of the change to a Union High School district the past year. District board 7J approved for this year only that those students be permitted to graduate from the school they had attended previous to the organization of the new district. Next year's senior class will consist of approximately 100 students.

HUBBARD—James L. Wilson, a former master of Maplewood Grange, died unexpectedly of a heart attack Thursday at his home two miles west of Hubbard. He was 61.

Services will be at 2 p. m. Monday at the Ringo-Cornwell chapel, Woodburn. Burial will be in Belle Passi cemetery with Masonic rites by the Donald Lodge.

Corn Brings Good Demand

CHICAGO—A good demand for corn futures helped strengthen an otherwise weakened market on the Board of Trade Friday.

Wheat closed 3/4 cent higher to 1/2 cent lower, and rye 1/4 cent higher to 1/2 cent lower. Soybeans were unevenly 1/4 cent higher and lard was 12 cents higher to 5 cents a hundred pounds lower.

The Department of Agriculture estimated there were 12 per cent more cattle and calves on feed April 1 than a year earlier. This stimulated demand for corn. Some of the buying interest spilled over into small grains which also might find some feeding demand in the figures.

Rails, Motors, Steels Gain in Stock Market

NEW YORK—Rails, motors, and steels were buoyant Friday as the stock market advanced to its fourth straight new record high.

The market had many gains of 1 to 2 points and some running on higher. Losses as a general rule were small.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up \$1.00 at \$164.80, its highest level. New peaks also were scored by the average's components. Industrials were up \$1.40 at a record high of \$222.50, rails were ahead \$1.20 at a new high since 1929 of \$134.30, and the utilities were up 30 cents at a new high since 1931 of \$184.80.

There were 1,232 individual issues traded of which 636 advanced and 340 declined with 117 new highs and 8 new lows for the year registered.

Volume was the best of the month at 3,180,000 shares. That traded Thursday. Then the market went up slightly in a hesitant manner.
