

Truman Accuses GOP of Foreign Policy 'Trickery'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Harry S. Truman accused the Eisenhower administration Saturday night of political fraud and trickery in the field of foreign policy.

Russ Generals, Officers Agree To Visit U.S.

MOSCOW (UP)—Two Soviet generals and seven former officers accented Saturday the invitation of a Chicago veteran to come to Washington to celebrate the linkup of U.S. and Soviet forces on the Elbe River on April 25, 1944.

The invitation came from Joseph Polowsky, a former private who was among the 91 American soldiers present at this historic moment of World War II. The answer came from nine of the Red Army fighting men also present.

The reunion is set for Washington if the U.S. government approves. The U.S. Embassy said Saturday the nine former officers had not applied for visas.

Pravda, the official Communist Party newspaper, brought the nine Russians together and gave apparent Soviet approval of the project. Polowsky wrote Pravda last month proposing the 10th anniversary meeting.

Pravda published the answer today in a long article on the Elbe anniversary.

The signers included Lt. Gen. J. V. Baklanov and N. I. Lyamin and seven other former officers ranging in rank from lieutenant to colonel. The generals were not further identified.

The former President and the 1952 contender spoke at a huge, \$100 a plate banquet honoring Speaker Sam Rayburn — the beloved "Mr. Sam" of legions of Democrats.

Truman's speech was a raking attack on the administration. He accused it of bad management and blundering, as well as playing "political tricks with the grave and serious issues of both foreign and domestic policies."

For one thing, he lit into the administration for its announcement in 1953 that the 7th Fleet would no longer be used to "shield" Red China from Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalists.

"The Republican administration must have known," Truman said, "that the picture of an unleashed Chiang Kai-Shek invading China was a barefaced political fraud."

"But the idea behind all this was to attempt to discredit the sound policy of the Democratic administration which was carefully designed to limit the conflict in the Far East."

Hope For Cease-Fire
"And now the Republican administration is desperately trying not only to limit the conflict in Asia, but to get a permanent cease-fire there. I fervently hope they do."

"But the administration, by this unfortunate political maneuver in its State of the Union Message, (in 1953) has enabled the Communists to picture us as instigating and preparing an attack on China and has embroiled us in controversies with almost all our allies in Asia and in Europe."

"If we are face to face in Asia with the prospect of war, a war which the administration says may have to be fought with atomic weapons, nobody is going to get any political advantage out of it. If we are pushed into the abyss of a new war, the whole world may tumble into that abyss with us."

Party Goals
Stevenson, in a much briefer

speech than Truman's said the Democratic Party must stand for three basic things if it is to be true to itself. He named these as social progress, civil freedom and peace.

On the score of peace, he said: "Woodrow Wilson gave his life blood to the fight for the League of Nations. Franklin Roosevelt spent his last energies planning for the United Nations."

"Both dared accept the horror of war to save the nation worse horrors — but only in the conviction that out of the agony of war we could pluck a new resolve to win peace for all suffering mankind."

5 Perish, 62 Missing Under Japan Slide

SAEBO, Japan (AP)—A mountain landslide that thundered down on a nearby West Japan coal mining village Saturday night left 5 persons dead and 62 missing—apparently buried alive under tons of mud and rock.

An army of diggers, hampered by unceasing rain, Sunday had recovered only five bodies of the miners and their families trapped in their shacks when the earth, loosened by a four-day torrential downpour, broke loose.

Police Chief T. Honda said he had no hope of finding any of the missing still alive.

He ordered 218 persons living near the disaster area evacuated to a schoolhouse until the danger of more slides is past.

The tremendous cascade loosened by the heavy rains, came roaring down the mountainside on the edge of this former imperial navy base in Southwestern Kyushu at 6 p. m. Saturday.

Ashland Youth Tops Speech Meet Winners

CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon's 1955 high school speech champions were named Saturday at Oregon State College.

Richard Lamb of Ashland was the only two-event winner in the two-day tourney. He won both impromptu speaking and extemporaneous.

Thirty-seven schools competed and there were 161 contestants. Concordia of Portland retired the class B debate trophy for schools with less than 300 students. Other winners included Judy Keller of South Salem High School, second place in panel discussion.

Plans Collapse for Russian Editors' Trip to United States

WASHINGTON (AP)—Arrangements for a tour of this country by 11 Soviet editors collapsed Saturday. Washington and Moscow officials blamed each other for the impasse, which also seemed likely to cancel two other projected Russian visits.

The crux of the stalemate was a requirement in U. S. immigration law that all unofficial visitors must be fingerprinted when they receive their visas overseas and sign a statement accepting responsibility for any delays in their departure from this country.

Announcing that the Russian editors were "unwilling to comply with the legal requirements," the State Department said: "The United States government

regrets that the trip of the Soviet editors will not be realized."

U. S. officials said the same rules would apply to two other projected Russian delegations—a group of farmers invited to see how hogs and corn are raised in Iowa, and nine Red Army officers invited to a World War II reunion here.

MOSCOW (AP)—Moscow University announced Saturday it has issued invitations to educators from U. S. universities to attend its biennial celebration May 7.

It has also asked distinguished guests from other countries in the West and the rest of the world.

Blaze on Tug Under Control

SEATTLE (AP)—The Coast Guard said Saturday the tug Pilot of Coos Bay, Ore., sent out a frantic call for aid at 6 p. m., reporting herself afire, but radioed later the fire was under control.

"It's still hot down there," the tug advised an approaching Coast Guard plane. The pilot was about 18 miles south of Tillamook Bay.

There were no reports of injuries and the number aboard was not known although a crew of three would be normal.

The Coast Guard said the Pilot was 44 years old. The 56-foot vessel is owned by Sam W. Geer and berths at Coos Bay.

Cause of Fire At Aumsville Undetermined

AUMSVILLE — Source of the \$200,000 fire that destroyed the door plant of the Willamette Builders Supply Co. Thursday has not yet been determined, it was reported Saturday by Joseph W. Gault, Corvallis, deputy state fire marshal.

Harold Leever, Salem owner of the operation, has said he would rebuild.

Gault investigated the fire Thursday and Friday.

Lloyd Riegel, Salem state policeman who conducted the preliminary investigation, said he also listed the cause as undetermined.

Firemen from six communities prevented the quick-spreading fire from leaping to the plywood plants and other Willamette operations. The plant as a whole employs 250 men. Thirty-two worked in the door factory.

Heart Attack Fatal as Doctor Writes of Theft

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UP)—Police disclosed Saturday that a wealthy Milwaukee physician died here three days ago while writing a note in his apartment here that a "red-haired stranger" had stolen a large sum of money, perhaps as much as \$100,000 from him.

"Please find him . . . I fear a heart attack coming on . . . please call a priest," the note said.

Police disclosed only Saturday that Dr. Albert P. Napientek, about 60, died last Wednesday. His body was found slumped over a desk in his apartment. The note was on the desk, unfinished.

Danish Farmers Stage Lockout

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP)—A nationwide farmers' lockout, that in a few days may cripple Denmark's main export trade, went into effect Saturday at midnight.

The lockout was ordered by the main farmers' organization as a reprisal against a week-long strike by farm workers, demanding an eight hour work day.

Oklahoma City to Get Cowboy Hall of Fame

DENVER (AP)—Oklahoma City, which set no limit on its willingness to pay whatever necessary for the proposed Cowboy Hall of Fame, was given the go-ahead on the museum Saturday by trustees of the site.

The decision came on the second ballot behind closed doors after the trustees had heard last minute urgings from Colorado Springs, and Dodge City, Kan.
