

Albert Einstein Left Legacy of Quotations

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP)—Dr. Albert Einstein, who died Monday, left a large legacy of quotations on almost every subject.

Here are some of them:

Education: "It is in fact nothing short of a miracle that the modern methods of instruction have not entirely strangled the holy curiosity of inquiry; for this delicate little plant, aside from stimulation, stands mainly in need of freedom. Without this it goes to wreck (sic) and ruin without fail."

Fame: "It is an irony of fate

that I, myself, have been the recipient of excessive admiration and respect from my fellows through no fault of my own."

His philosophy: "The essential in the being of a man of my type lies precisely in what he thinks and how he thinks, not in what he does or suffers."

His life: "My life is a simple thing that would interest no one. It is a known fact that I was born and that is all that is necessary."

Clothes: "It would be a sad situation if the bag was better than the meat wrapped in it."

Pipe smoking: "Pipe smoking contributes to a somewhat calm and objective judgment in our human affairs."

Freedom: On becoming an American citizen in Trenton in 1940: "There may be men who can live without political rights and without opportunity of free individual development, but I think this is intolerable for most Americans."

War: "War seems to me a mean, contemptible thing. I would rather be hacked to pieces than take part in such abominable business."

Nuclear fission: "The discovery of nuclear chain reactions need not bring about the destruction of mankind any more than the discovery of electricity."

Success: "If a success in life, the rule might be expressed: a equals x plus y plus z, x being work and y being play and z keeping your mouth shut."

His profession: If he had it to do over again, "I would not try to become a scientist or scholar or teacher. I would rather choose to be a plumber or a peddler in the hope to find that modest degree of independence still available under present circumstances."

Crashed Jet's Pilot Sought

DAVENPORT, Wash. (AP)—An extensive air and ground search Monday failed to turn up any trace of a 30-year-old Air Force captain who bailed out of his F86D jet plane in rough country north of here.

Capt. Elmer P. Smith of Portland, Ore. sent a radio message to his home field at Spokane about 9:07 a.m. Monday, advising the base his fuel was low and he was leaving the plane.

The smashed plane was found later near Miles, Wash. close to the junction of the Columbia and Spokane rivers. There were reports that a parachute had been seen in the air but helicopters and a ground search party found no trace of the pilot. There were fears he may have landed in the water.

Witness Claims Mrs. Fong Told Of Girl's Death

PORTLAND (AP)—Robert Richards, a Portland bartender who said he was working as an undercover man for the police, was the principal witness Monday at the first degree murder trial of Mr. and Mrs. Wey Him Fong.

Richards said Sherry Fong told him on May 3 of last year that Diane Hank, a 16-year-old high school girl "committed suicide and that she had a note and the (girl's) clothes to prove it. She said the girl took barbiturates because she was jealous of Sherry's power and money and because she was in love with a man who was in love with Sherry."

The Fongs are accused of murder in the girl's death. Her body was found wrapped in blankets and rope near Washougal, Wash., in February of last year—more than a month after she disappeared.

Chicago Hotel Fire Kills One, Hurts Five

CHICAGO (AP)—One man died and five persons, including three firemen, were injured Monday in a fire which destroyed a four-story hotel on the West Side.

Damage to the Humboldt Park Hotel was estimated at \$150,000 by Fire Marshal Albert M. Peterson. Peterson said the cause of the blaze was not immediately determined.

6 Seek to Operate Timberline Lodge

PORTLAND (AP)—Lloyd R. Olson, supervisor of the Mt. Hood National Forest, reported Monday that six bids have been received from persons who wish to operate Timberline Lodge on the slopes of Mt. Hood.

He said the successful bidder will be announced in a few days.

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6 Women Jail Inmates Halt Nightly Sing

KLAMATH FALLS (AP)—Sleep, undisturbed by the loud churning of women prisoners, returned to the Klamath County jail Sunday night.

Jailer Fred Calfee said Monday it was his first good night's sleep since last Tuesday. That was the night six women prisoners began singing.

They started at dusk. They didn't stop until dawn, despite outraged protests from the jailer and other prisoners. The women were so pleased with their accomplishment, they kept it up every night after that.

They were put on bread and water rations, but that didn't stop them. Their bedding was taken away next. That didn't stop them. After five nights of it, though, they were ready to quit, and when Sheriff Murray Britton offered to restore their regular meals in return for silence, they accepted.

Britton said it was just in time. He said he was ready to turn a fire hose on them.

"They'd have been singing in the rain if they'd started again," he said.

Hungary Picks New Premier

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Communist-governed Hungary's Parliament Monday appointed Andras Hegedus, fiery farm expert, Premier to succeed purged Imre Nagy.

Hegedus was expected to get along with the nation's nine million, in contrast to Nagy, who had urged a better life for them.

In 1953, Nagy, 58, urged a policy of more consumer goods and a better life generally. For this he was fired at the behest of the Communist Party, now following the emphasis of world communism on heavy industries.

Hegedus, 40, was deputy premier. His Communist enthusiasm caused him to break with his former parents in 1939.

Slaying Attempt Trial in Newport Granted Recess

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP)—The trial of Richard Thomson, accused of trying to kill his business partner, was recessed Monday morning after Thomson's attorney indicated he would try to prove his client had been temporarily insane.

Circuit Judge Fred McHenry granted the recess until Tuesday on the motion of Dist. Atty. William Holland.

Thomson, 26, is on trial for the second time charged with assault with intent to kill James Meuler, 31, his former partner in an automobile agency.

Thomson was convicted and sentenced to prison but he was released on bail when the State Supreme Court ordered the case retried because of trial errors.

Relaxation Of Transport Control Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—A presidential advisory committee recommended Monday that the government relax its control of the transportation industry to allow greater competition among railroads, airlines, trucks and water carriers.

Greater reliance on "competitive forces in rate making" was declared by the transportation policy committee to be the "cornerstone of a modernized regulatory program."

A modern revolution in carrier methods, the committee said, has resulted in a situation where "in many respects government policy at present prevents or severely limits the most economical use of our transportation plant."

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.), chairman of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee, told reporters he had gained the impression that the report "is weighted in favor of railroads." He emphasized that he was making only preliminary comment.

The long awaited reports, prepared at the Cabinet level, called for new policies based on a 30 year change from virtual monopoly of transportation by the railroads to growing and varied competition by trucks, planes and water carriers.

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Tax Problem Facing New Eden Regime

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Eden's government faces up Tuesday to its first big dilemma—whether to cut taxes.

A general election is six weeks off and Britons, whose income tax rates exceed those of the United States, awaited with more than ordinary interest the 1955-56 budget which Chancellor of the exchequer R. A. Butler is laying before the House of Commons at 3:30 p.m.

The 52-year-old minister, who has a political career of his own to think about, confronted a two-edged problem.

If Butler cuts taxes, opposition laborites will be sure to accuse him of throwing a sop to voters with an eye on the May 26 general election.

If he doesn't, he will risk antagonizing Britons who consider tax relief in order because the country wound up the last financial year March 31 with a big budget surplus.

A possibility loomed that Butler would sidestep the tax issue. He could present only a partial budget providing sufficient funds to tide over the government until after the election.

Pickup, Car Collide; 1 Hurt

Three men were slightly injured at the Independence-Rickreall junction west of Salem Monday in an accident involving a car and a pickup truck, State Policeman Floyd Morrill reported.

Injured were Earl Wayne Smith and Emmitt Russell, both of Dallas and both in Smith's pickup, and Patrick Seefield, Portland, in the car. All were subsequently treated for bruises, cuts and lacerations by nearby physicians. Most injuries were about the legs. Both vehicles were badly damaged.

Twister Strikes Area in Illinois

LANARK, Ill. (AP)—A swirling tornado cut an eight-mile long path of destruction Monday night across Northern Illinois farms.

The twister tore buildings to shreds on at least five farms between this city of 1,350 in the northwest corner of the state and the town of Shannon, eight miles to the northeast.

It picked up cars from highways and dumped them in fields, tore down power lines and uprooted trees.

There were no reported injuries but several persons escaped death by inches.
