

Committee Kills New Distribution Of State Senators

The House elections committee Wednesday killed off the bill aimed at changing the distribution of state senators in the Oregon Legislature.

County Court Publication Cutback Loses

The Senate state and federal affairs committee Wednesday tabled a bill that would have removed the state requirement that county courts publish monthly in newspapers a schedule of the county expenditures.

County courts wanted the legislation which would have substituted for newspaper advertising a bulletin board posting of the expense list and furnishing copies to citizens on request. The House had passed the bill.

Carl Webb, of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association, opposed the bill and told the Senate committee that no savings would result to counties (in advertising costs) if many citizens requested copies of the expense lists.

Bernard Mainwaring, publisher of the Capital Journal, declared that, especially in the smaller counties, the advertised expenditures are watched closely by businessmen and others to see who's getting the county business and whether there is any indication of favoritism. He said the publication results in government economy, because officials know any one can easily see how the county money is spent.

The Senate committee also decided to act by Friday on the legislators' salary resolution before it. Members indicated they agreed that legislators' pay should be at least \$2,400 but wanted to sound out some of the other Senators before sending the House-approved measure to the floor.

It would submit to the voters a proposal that legislators be paid, instead of the present \$1,200, a salary of \$2,400 for the biennium and expenses of \$10 a day for up to 90 days of a legislative session.

Senate Passes River Pact Resolution

The Senate Wednesday passed a resolution calling for continuation of the study and negotiation of a Columbia river compact.

A compact between Columbia basin states was approved by delegates from those states just before the Oregon Legislature convened in January, but neither the Washington nor the Oregon Legislature has found itself ready yet to ratify the compact.

Sen. Paul Geddes (R), Roseburg, said it had come up too late for a full understanding by the people at this time. But he said the compact is very important to the Pacific Northwest and the study should be continued.

Sen. Robert D. Holmes (D), Gearhart, who opposed the compact as it now is written, said the scope of the membership was not as broad as he had hoped it would be from a political standpoint and from a standpoint of differing views on public and private power.

Simplification Of Recounts Wins Approval

Legislation to provide a simple method of getting recounts of election results was approved by the Oregon House of Representatives Wednesday and sent to the governor.

The bill, with support from both parties, is the aftermath of last fall's close election in which U. S. Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Democrat, barely defeated ex-Sen. Guy Cordon, Republican.

Cordon supporters wanted a recount, which now can be obtained only by bringing suit in each county and proving fraud.

The bill would let any candidate or party official obtain a recount within seven days after the election. A bond of \$10 for each precinct to be recounted would have to be posted, with a limit of \$8,000 for the state.

A battle over distribution of basic county aid to districts shaped up as the Senate Education Committee voted 4-3 to change the formula.

It would freeze grants at present levels, but use expected increases for equalization of education. The effect would be a loss in state aid for Multnomah and several eastern Oregon counties.

A bill to allow sale of fortified wine in grocery stores was killed by the House Alcoholic Control Committee.

Bills approved by the House and sent to the governor would create an Oregon Centennial Commission to plan the celebration of Oregon's 100th birthday in 1959, and permit the governor to evacuate civilians, distribute food and medicine, and regulate utilities in the case of enemy attack.

The House sent to the governor bills to restrict prizes in fishing derbies to \$25 in value, and to make civil defense workers swear they never have believed in violent overthrow of the government.

Legislative action was completed by the Senate on the bill to legalize use of radar to catch speeding motorists. Radar now is used by several Oregon cities, but there has been doubt as to whether this is a violation of the anti-speed trap law.

Milk Labelling Bill Passes

A bill restoring the milk labeling requirements of the old milk marketing administration and putting a minimum butterfat content of 3.8 per cent on fluid milk sold in Oregon was passed by the House Wednesday with three dissenting votes.

Rep. Arthur P. Ireland (R), Forest Grove, objected that most dairies were already selling 3.8 milk and that the law was not necessary. He claimed that some southern Oregon milk producing areas were low and butterfat and that the 3.8 minimum requirement would work a hardship on them.

He said new controls would not be put on dairymen.

Meat Inspection 'Pilot' Plan Gains

The House Livestock Committee favors appropriating \$75,000 to have a "pilot" program for state meat inspection. The committee did this in an amendment to the bill, which originally would have authorized \$400,000 to have state meat inspection.

Additional money for the pilot program would come from higher meat dealer license fees if another bill is approved.

Livestock Industry To Be Discussed

PRINEVILLE (AP)—Recent developments in disease control, predatory animals control and other livestock industry matters will be discussed here Saturday at the annual meeting of Crook County stock growers.
