Nation Set for Time Change

Time turns its annual spring somersaults at 2 a. m. Sunday, and comes up with about half the nation's population on a new schedule.

The onset of daylight saving time, which some regions use and others spurn, throws the usual time boundaries into a scramble.

Generally, it's the thickly populated states and big cities that go in for the new schedule. This year, the shift to "fast time" will be made throughout New England, New York, New Jersey, Washington, D. C., Delaware, California and Nevada, nearly all of Maryland and Pennsylvania, most of Illinois and Indiana, the northern half of Ohio and a big pocket in Central Kentucky.

The rest of the country—the South, the great central region, most of the Western states and the Northwest, will adhere to regular time. A few cities scattered through this geographically predominant area will make the change—such as Los Alamos, N. Mex.; Butte, Mont.; and Mandan, N. D.

The Elgin Observatory, of Elgin, Ill., after a national survey, said about 70 million Americans will go on the new schedule. The other 81 million will stick to regular time.

Cross-country railroads generally will abide by regular time, while commuter lines will observe local policy. Most airlines simply will list their arrivals and departures by local airport time.

Oppenheimer Talks At Oregon University

New Probe in Dixon-Yates Pact Urged

WASHINGTON (U)—A new congressional investigation of the proposed Dixon-Yates power plant was urged Friday by two Democratic senators. But Atty. Gen. Brownell went to bat for the company chosen to manage the building job.

Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) said the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee, of which he is a member, should get a full explanation of why the Atomic Energy Commission approved the hiring of Ebasco Services, Inc., a utilities engineering firm, for work on the plant.

The New York engineering firm has been sharply criticized by some Congress members and by the General Accounting Office for its performance on a previous job at Joppla, Ill.

Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said he agreed that the reasons for the AEC's action should be developed. Atty. Gen. Brownell came to Ebasco's defense in a speech Friday night at Dallas, Tex. Brownell said Ebasco, in its work at Joppla, had been subjected to a "campaign of sabotage and terrorism" by labor racketeers who later were convicted of trying to commit "the largest extortion on record."

"These men had demanded the payment to them by the Ebasco Services, Inc., of New York, as the price of labor peace," Brownell said, "1 per cent of the entire amount of the Ebasco contract" at Joppla.

This demand amounted to \$1,030,000 in cash. When the money was not forthcoming, Ebasco (planned) with 18 months of jurisdictional strikes, sabotage of equipment, violence to workers, and every conceivable kind of intimidation.

"The trouble was so bad and lasted so long that eventually Ebasco was forced to relinquish the contract to another firm."

Brownell blamed the labor racketeers for the extra \$1 million dollars it cost to build the Joppla plant. This has been Ebasco's contention.

Parted Siamese Twins Said in Good Condition

CHICAGO (U)—Deborah Marie and Christine Mary Andrews, joined at their heads since birth, more than six months ago, spent their first day apart in very good condition.

The tiny Siamese twins were separated Thursday night in a 4½-hour operation by surgeons in Mercy Hospital.

Alternately sleeping peacefully, crying and feeding in their small oxygen tents Friday, they appeared to be withstanding post-operative shock well, doctors said.

Mrs. John W. Barrett, director of hospitals for the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago, said "the outlook is very favorable."

Court Hears Fong Story

PORTLAND (U)—Wayne Fong, accused of first degree murder in the death of a Portland high school girl last year, testified in his own defense Friday.

He said, the last time he saw the girl alive was the night of Jan. 6, 1954. His wife, Sherry Fong, also accused of first degree murder, told police the last time she saw the girl was the morning of Jan. 7 when she left for high school.

The body of the girl, Diane Hank, was found Feb. 26, 1954, in a roadside ditch near Washougal, Wash.

Mrs. Roosevelt Advises Delay in U. N. Revision

WASHINGTON (U)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt advised the government Friday to wait until the world settles down a bit before pushing for any changes in the United Nations Charter.

"I doubt that at the present we could improve the charter by a full dress revision conference," President Roosevelt's widow told a Senate foreign relations subcommittee which is studying the problem.

She described the present state of the world as "very troubled" and expressed doubt that the atmosphere was suited to "calm deliberations" on changing the rules of the international organization.

Brownell Claims Crime Invaded Labor Unions

DALLAS, Tex. (U)—Attorney General Brownell charged Friday night that gangsters waxed wealthy in the labor union field under the previous Democratic administration.

This was due to "lack of enforcement" of anti-racket laws, Brownell said in an address at an annual lawyers week meeting here.

Five Youths Arrested on Theft Counts

Five Salem area youths were in the hands of Marion County juvenile authorities after being arrested Thursday night on larceny charges. The youths range in age from 15 to 16.

City police said the arrests were made after investigation of recent thefts at a North Salem High School shop classroom and the prowling of a number of cars. Three of the boys were questioned about the school thievery and the other two were linked with the car offenses, according to officers. Questioning also concerned reported vandalism of flower beds, etc.

Police said 92 gas-tank caps from autos were found in one boy's home. Other loot uncovered in the cases included two snooker lights, two rear view mirrors, several cigarette lighters and tail pipe extensions, a gas blow torch and numerous radio parts reportedly were taken from the school shop. Officers said the shop thefts were made over a period of several days. The thievery took place after school hours.

Three of the youths appeared before juvenile officials Friday and the other two will appear today. Court hearings are slated for all.

Aide to Ike Barred From Corsi Case

WASHINGTON (U)—The White House refused Friday to let presidential aide Maxwell Rabb testify in a Senate inquiry into the firing of Edward Corsi as a State Department immigration adviser.

Corsi himself got in another blast at his critics and said the real issue "concerns the integrity of the public service in Washington—whether a man called to public service can be kicked around with impunity."

That rang down the curtain, temporarily and perhaps permanently, on a hearing by a Senate judiciary subcommittee on Corsi's ouster and the handling of the program to let some 214,000 refugees enter the United States.

Meanwhile, Gov. Averell Harriman of New York revived a state committee on refugees and appointed Corsi as one of its 17 unpaid members. The group was directed to aid the settlement of refugees who enter New York State.

A prominent New York Republican, Corsi was fired after a 90-day career as special assistant to Secretary of State Dulles on immigration affairs. He has said it was Rabb who first approached him about the job and told him the refugee immigration program needed pushing.

As a result, the subcommittee invited Rabb to testify. Rabb is secretary to the Cabinet and an assistant counsel to President Eisenhower.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty told reporters: "The White House believes that confidential assistants to the President should not testify in regard to confidential matters in the White House offices or between the departments in the executive branch of the government."

Proposal Would Add Apples to Forecast Ban

WASHINGTON (U)—Apples will join cotton as a crop on which the Agriculture Department must not make early season price or production forecasts, if Congress adopts a proposal approved Friday by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

For many years, experts at the department have been prohibited by law from predicting price trends of cotton when the crop is just shaping up.

Sen. Robertson (D-Va.) got the Senate committee to add "apples" to this taboo by complaining that recent apple forecasts by the department had been so wrong as to "cause serious losses to commercial dealers."

Robertson's proposal on apples was added to the Agriculture Department's appropriation bill. Senate rules bar legislation in appropriation bills if any senator raises a point of order against it.

Further Rail Strikes Loom Through South

Further crippling of railroad service in the strike-beset South was threatened Friday night.

Picket lines were formed at the joint yards of the Frisco Lines, Illinois Central Railroad and the Central of Georgia Railroad at Birmingham, Ala., posing a threat to the lines' freight operations.

Non-operating unions have been on strike against the Louisville & Nashville Railroad at Birmingham and elsewhere in the South for 41 days.

P. L. Shackelford, strike director for these unions, said the Birmingham pickets represented employees of the L & N, Frisco and Seaboard Railroads.

He said the picket lines were established because Frisco management had broken an agreement with the unions not to interchange material with the struck L & N.

On some other fronts, the nation's strike picture took on more hopeful tones Friday as mediation moves materialized in major telephone, textile and electronics disputes.

A prompt mediation move also followed a breakdown of negotiations at the Parke, Davis & Co. Detroit plant, a major producer of Salk polio vaccine, although no immediate walkout was threatened.

In New York, attorneys for both sides in the strike at the big Sperry gyroscopic plant at Lake Success agreed to accept a state Supreme Court justice as mediator.

Bank Robbery Arrest Made

VANCOUVER, B. C. (U)—Robert Lewis, 24-year-old cafe operator of White Rock, B. C., 32 miles south of here, Friday was charged with the \$3,000 armed holdup of a suburban branch of the Royal Bank of Canada.

The charge was laid after Lewis and another suspect appeared in a police identification lineup. No charge has been laid against the second man but he had not been released late Friday.

The two were arrested while they slept Friday morning. Police said they had recovered a "substantial part" of the \$3,000 which was stolen Thursday.

The robbery was the second this week. Two men escaped with \$150 Monday from a downtown branch of the Toronto-Dominion Bank.

Police Chief Walter Mulligan announced Friday eight city patrol cars would be outfitted with mountings for Thomson sub-machine guns in an effort to give banks better protection against bandits.

FBI Arrests Nixon Caller

WASHINGTON (U)—Secret Service agents Friday arrested Clifford W. Bryan, 34, of Los Angeles after, they said, Bryan had phoned Vice President Nixon's office several times demanding an appointment.

He was charged with illegal possession of a gun and turned over to Washington police. The agents said he made no threats against Nixon.

Yielding of Quemoy, Matsu 'Never Requested by U. S.'

TAIPEI, Formosa (U)—High officials of Nationalist China said Friday the United States at no time has so much as hinted the government should yield the offshore islands of Quemoy and the Matsus in the interests of peace with Red China.

They said, furthermore, if such a suggestion is being brought here by Adm. Arthur W. Radford and Walter S. Robertson, Far Eastern specialist of the U. S. State Department, it is to be regarded in advance as "absurd—ridiculous—unthinkable—impossible."

Admiral Radford, chairman of the U. S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Robertson are due Sunday for talks with President Chiang Kai-Shek.

Nationalist officials, who declined to be quoted by name, said this is the picture on their visit from the Formosan viewpoint:

1. Chiang had known two days before it was publicly announced that Radford and Robertson were coming.

2. The only information here as to the purpose of the visit was that it was based on Article 4 of the U. S. - Nationalist mutual defense pact calling for consultations "from time to time regarding the

implementation of this treaty."

3. There's no question the situation has grown critical through the lightning-swift buildup of Red air bases closer to Formosa.

4. But any suggestion for easing this tension by having the Nationalists give up Quemoy and the Matsus "would be preposterous—its execution disastrous." It might weaken support for Chiang both on Formosa and among Chinese overseas.

WHEAT, FEED SUPPLY HIGH
WASHINGTON (U)—The Agriculture Department reported Friday that stocks of wheat and livestock feed grains in this country on April 1 were the largest on record for that date.

Pendleton to Get Air Defense Base

PENDLETON (U)—Announcement that a big Air Defense Command installation will be located here was made Friday by Mayor Norman Gorkle after a conference with officers from Western Command Headquarters at Hamilton Air Force Base, Calif.

The facilities, the mayor said, will be on a 100-acre site in the general area of the municipal airport in west Pendleton.
