Magazine Says Ike, Zhukov Trade Letters

WASHINGTON (UP)—Newsweek magazine said Tuesday President Eisenhower and Soviet Defense Minister Zhukov have been conducting private correspondence lately. A White House spokesman said he knew nothing about it.

They undoubtedly were keyed to the military status of the offshore islands of Quemoy and the Matsus held by Nationalists within range of Chinese Red mainland guns.

They also presumably carried top Nationalist reactions to the new U. S. position of willingness to discuss the Formosa Strait tension with Red China.

Rolling Eyes Now Popular In Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—The latest stars to create a sensation in Hollywood can roll their eyes and wiggle their tongues and have to be locked up in the studio every night.

A collection of rubber miniature prehistoric monsters are the features of an actorless movie, "The Animal World," one of Warner Studios supercolossal productions for the year.

Producer Irwin Allen had good luck with another movie that didn't bother with live, two-footed actors, "The Sea Around Us."

"It was the biggest financial success RKO had, twice as big as Jane Russell, and it won an Oscar. So I decided to make another picture without actors—a documentary on animals," Allen said today.

"I love to make pictures without actors. No temperament and they're always on time in the morning because they're the only actors you can lock away at night."

Script History
For his "script" the producer chose history—the creation of the earth three billion years ago and the arrival of life two billion years ago.

Models of the dinosaurs and other scary thespians "act" via animation on miniature sets of forests and plains. "The animal world" will show dinosaurs for the first time in gorgeous wide-screen color, complete with bloody wounds as they do their usual battle to the death on the edge of a cliff.

Dinosaur toys and a book, "The Animal World," will saturate the stores soon. Allen expects the Davy Crockett coonskin cap fad will be replaced by moppets clutching dinosaurs.

The rest of the movie will show the development of animals and their place in legend and history, from Hannibal to modern zoos and household pets.

As for "The Sea Around Us," the movie-makers of "The Animal World" actually are scientists and explorers around the world.

World of Film
Nearly two years ago Allen wrote every zoo, university, museum and government in the world asking for film of animal life.

His office at Warner Studio by now is crammed with cans of film—lion scenes from the Union of South Africa, films of microscopic organisms from the University of Netherlands, scenes of leopards and tigers from the British Museum.

"Admiral Byrd turned over all of his penguin and polar bear films to us," said Allen. "We will have eventually 3,000,000 feet of film, of which we'll use 10,000."

The movie company shot part of the picture at the museum of natural history in New York.

Oscar-winner Allen used to produce Groucho Marx comedies, and he is happy to have switched from slapstick to science.

"This is a far cry from Groucho," admitted the producer. "Some nights I dream of being chased by dinosaurs but Groucho protects me."

Reds Planning Neutral 'Wall'

LONDON (UP)—Russia and Communist China Tuesday night were reported planning to set up a wall of neutral states across Europe and Asia separating the Communist and anti-Communist worlds.

This reported Communist plan will be studied by U.S., British and French diplomats who meet here Wednesday to plan an early conference with Russia on easing cold war tension. The outcome of their talks undoubtedly will shape future allied dealings with Red leaders.

Proposals from the meeting will go to Secretary of State Dulles, British Foreign Secretary Harold MacMillan and French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay in Paris May 8.

Arguments on O&C Question Presented

Naval Base Blast Kills 5, Hurts Several

NEWPORT, R. I. (UP)—Five persons were killed and five others were injured Tuesday when an explosion wrecked a secret torpedo testing building at the U. S. Naval Base here.

All the casualties were from Rhode Island and Massachusetts. The ear-splitting blast wrecked a concrete building in the underwater ordnance station on the fringe of the sprawling naval base.

Identification of the casualties was withheld pending notification of kin.

Rear Adm. Joseph H. Wellings, base commander, said compressed gas used to fire torpedoes touched off the explosion that knocked down a wall of the building and tossed the roof intact several yards.
