

Oregon Polio Vaccination Project Postponed Until Safety Assured

 PORTLAND (U) — The Oregon public polio vaccination program Wednesday was called off until full safety assurance is received, Dr. Harold M. Erickson, the state health officer, announced.
 Vaccine is scheduled to arrive Saturday for the free inoculation of all first and second grade school children. That word was received a short time after the U.S. Public Health Service had ordered Cutter Laboratories of San Francisco to call back its vaccine.
 Dr. Erickson said he was told

however, by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis that Oregon's Salk vaccine will be from an eastern laboratory. He was informed there will be enough to meet the state's needs. Earlier the Oregon board had complained its allocation was inadequate.
 Erickson said 1,000 sets of vaccine from the Cutter Laboratories had been received by Oregon

Erickson said a meeting will be held on the matter by the Oregon State Medical Society's public health committee. He added that there will be no mass inoculations until it is assured there will be absolute safety.

Chou's Offer 'Very Good,' Says Nehru

CALCUTTA, India (U) — Prime Minister Nehru of India Wednesday night described the offer of Red China's Premier Chou En-Lai to negotiate directly with the United States as "very good," if not precise.
 Arriving home from the Asian-African Conference in Indonesia, Nehru told reporters that the fact Chou's offer was made opened up many prospects which he is sure are being considered by the countries concerned.
 Chou's offer can be made more precise later, he added.
 In Rangoon earlier Wednesday, Nehru told newsmen there should be no difficulties — or very few — in organizing an informal U. S. - Red China meeting on a Formosa ceasefire.

Assembly of God Meeting Expects 400

MEDFORD (U) — The Oregon district council of the Assembly of God will continue its annual meeting here Thursday with registration expected to increase to 400.
 Some 300 were on hand at the opening business meeting Wednesday to hear progress reports. They were told that the denomination now has 190 Oregon churches, 15 more than a year ago, and 424 ministers.
 Reports were made by the Rev. Atwood Foster, Salem, district superintendent; the Rev. Lester Young, Brooks, treasurer, and the Rev. N. D. Davidson, Portland, secretary.
 The sessions will end Friday.

Sandy Bank President Dies

SANDY (UP)—Walker A. Proctor, 90, president of the Clackamas County Bank at Sandy for the last 37 years, died Tuesday in a Portland hospital.
 Proctor, born in West Virginia, had lived in the Gresham-Sandy area for 67 years. He was a former Clackamas county commissioner and an ex-legislator.

Plant Near Medford to Supply Lumber Firms

MEDFORD (U) — A plant is being built at Gold Hill, 13 miles northwest of here, to manufacture gang saw and allied equipment for the lumber industry.
 Production is expected to start in about 60 days.

Japanese Red Leader Seized

FUKUOKA, Japan (U) — Police Wednesday seized another of nine Japanese Communist leaders who went underground in 1950.
 Hiroshi Hasegawa, once on the party's central committee, was found at work in the Communists' West Japan Bureau. He was charged with refusing to answer a subpoena.
 Two others of the nine have been captured. A fourth, Yoshio Shiga, came out of hiding last year and was elected to the Diet (parliament). He never was prosecuted.

Government Restricted by Law Advised

CHICAGO (U) — Former President Truman said Wednesday night "the only guarantee against a society of fear and cruelty is the principle that the government is not above the law."
 "Recent history (of other countries) has demonstrated that the unrestrained use of force by government is just as great a danger to human progress now as it was ages ago," Truman said in a speech at the annual dinner of the Decalogue Society of Lawyers.
 The former president was in Chicago to receive the society's 1954 award of merit for outstanding service to humanity.

Administration 'Fails to Back Airport Needs'

SEATTLE (U) — Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) asserted Wednesday night skyrocketing air transportation needs are not being met by the present administration.
 The Democratic chairman of the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee said in an address before the national convention of the Airport Operators' Council.
 "Negligible federal assistance in airport development to meet the facility demands of air transportation, and interference with federal commissions in carrying out the expressed will of Congress, are two of the most important handicaps we face."
 Congress has before it a request for 101 billion dollars for highway construction, Magnuson said. But only 11 million dollars is sought for the entire airport system over the country, he added.
 "It is true that the need for a nationwide system of super highways is actual and pressing," he continued, "but we also need airports, just as much if not more than highways."
 "They provide the key to the most essential facility of our national defense."
 Walter P. Quist, Minneapolis parks and airport official, told the Council they should work to develop areas near airports into parks, camping sites, nurseries, outdoor museums, playgrounds and wildlife sanctuaries.
 "Land removed from the tax rolls must be used to the greatest possible extent," he said.
