Library Use in Silverton Rises

SILVERTON—Television, which threatened library circulation a year ago, has not harmed the circulation count this spring at the Silverton Public Library, library employees said Monday.

The report submitted to the city council here Monday night, showed that circulation at the public library was up in April, 1955, a total of 283 over the 1954 April circulation.

However, the April circulation did drop almost 100 below the March circulation, Miss Nettie Hatteberg, circulation librarian, explained that this is the usual rule as spring advances each year.

Total circulation for April this year, according to the city reports was 1,174. There were 15 new readers added during the month and 35 books by gift and purchase.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., (UP) — Funeral services for Wilber A. Cochel, founder of the Future Farmers of America and for 20 years editor of the weekly Kansas City Star, will be held Wednesday. Cochel, 77, died Sunday after a long illness.

A noted farm journalist and educator in the Midwest, Cochel was responsible for the first gathering of rural boys on a national scale. He brought 800 farm youths to Kansas City in "their common interest of pride in the profession." His friend, Will Rogers, addressed the gathering. The meetings were continued here and the group grew into the FFA, whose membership numbers in the thousands and whose national conventions are held here annually.
