Civic Leaders Pay Tribute To Carl Hogg

Carl William Hogg, Salem businessman and civic leader who died unexpectedly Thursday at 61, was regarded by his associates as a most hard-working individual when engaged on a civic project that was really worth while.

He had held numerous state committee positions and was chairman of some. He had been active in the city's Community Chest, twice in campaign direction and once as president.

He has been active in various city and area development organizations which include the Chamber of Commerce, the Long-Range Planning Commission, the Willamette Valley Project Committee and the Highway 99 Committee.

War Veterans

He belonged to several civic, social and conservation organizations and was a member of two veterans organizations, having served in World War I.

Born in Oregon City Hogg came to Salem about 1930 and established the Salem store of Hogg Bros. Furniture and Appliance Co. with his brothers Otto and Oscar in 1932.

While maintaining an office at the store, 280 State St., Hogg had relinquished its management to Fred N. Carstensen who Thursday found Hogg dead from natural causes in his garage.

Going Fishing

Carstensen told Deputy Coroner Don Waggoner that he and Hogg were to have gone fishing and that Hogg was to pick him up at the store about noon.

When he failed to arrive, Carstensen went out to his 2185 S. High St. house and discovered him in the garage apparently stricken while lifting his outboard motor into the car trunk.

The car's motor was running and other fishing gear was loaded.

Carstensen called city first aid men who pronounced Hogg dead on arrival. Carstensen told Waggoner he last saw Hogg at 11:30 a.m. at the store.

Formed Partnership

Born Oct. 30, 1893 in Oregon City, Hogg first worked for the Oregon City Woolen Mills and later at the Busch Furniture Co. there. Shortly thereafter he and his brothers, who survive in Oregon City, formed their partnership.

Besides the brothers, Hogg leaves his widow, the former Winifred Dodge, and numerous nephews.

The Howell-Edwards funeral home is in charge of arrangements.

In picking Hogg as Salem's First Citizen for 1953, the Chamber of Commerce selected a man who was its president for the three terms 1942-1944 and vice-chairman of its Salem Long-Range Planning Commission.

A Republican, he was selected by former Gov. Charles A. Sprague to serve on the State Unemployment Compensation Council as representative and by former Gov. Douglas McKay to the state liquor control commission on which he served as chairman.

In 1951 he served as a delegate to the Republican National Convention and participated in the nomination of President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

GOP Delegate

In 1952 he was appointed chairman of the Industrial Development Council and was its president when he died.

In their comments, his friends and colleagues view Hogg's death as a tragic loss to the community and to themselves.

Rep. A. Loucks, a former Salem mayor, "I consider the death a loss of one of our senior first citizens and a tragic one for the community."

Elton Thompson, president of the Chamber of Commerce: "Salem is going to miss a very fine citizen."

Mayor Robert White: "It's a tremendous blow to me. I think Carl was a wonderful man and an outstanding member of our community."

E. Burr Miller, a personal friend and secretary of the Industrial Development Council: "Naturally it's a great shock to me and the many others in Salem who knew Carl and what a hard-working individual he was on anything worth while."

A. C. Haag, a personal friend: "He was one of the finest men in Salem and I think he made one of the biggest contributions to Salem."

William Hammond, vice president of Union Security, former state liquor administrator and past president of the Salem Chamber: "Carl Hogg was one of the most conscientious public servants I have ever known; his integrity and sincerity were beyond question, and his state, his city and his many friends have suffered a heavy loss."

lal E. Stevenson for the presidency again.

Shivers and national Chairman Paul M. Butler took a few puffs on the party peace pipe in a 15-minute conference in the pantry, at a breakfast at the Capitol of seven Democratic governors and Senate and House Democratic leaders.

Obscured in Smoke

But the exact extent to which things were patched up between national headquarters and Texas Democrats, who backed President Eisenhower in 1952 was obscured a bit in the smoke.

Butler told reporters: "If Democrats are realistic enough to look for converts outside the party, as they do, they have to be realistic enough to take back any penitents who want to return to the fold."

But he also said that "if they do, we have the right to assume they will support the nominee of the convention." From what Shivers said, Butler added, he assumes the Texas governor will support the nominee.

Against Adlai

Shivers repeated that he still is against Stevenson. But he said he assured Butler that he hoped next year's convention "can select a

man and a platform which all good Democrats can support."

Then the governor did a bit of hedging, too. He said he could support Stevenson only if the former Illinois governor changes considerably—he probably would even "have to change his name."

But to a question whether he would refuse to back Stevenson again regardless of whom the Republicans might pick, Shivers replied: "No, no; certainly not."

There was no overwhelming demand for a second try by Stevenson from Democratic governors and party officials who have been looking over 1956 prospects for the last two days.

In fact, there was an indication here and there that some men of power in the party may be somewhat less than enthusiastic about Stevenson.

Bon Marche Starts Suit Against Union

SEATTLE (U)—Within a few hours after pickets were stationed at Bon Marche stores in Seattle, Yakima and Spokane, the store filed suit here Thursday against the Teamsters Union (AFL) for one million dollars damage.

The suit in Superior Court charges the union is engaging in a jurisdictional dispute to which the Bon Marche is not directly a party. Judge Theodore S. Turner meanwhile granted an injunction against mass picketing.

The union pickets were established Thursday morning, keeping most of the 1,500 Seattle employees from their jobs. Supervisory employees manned counters and reported business was "near normal."

Allied Stores Inc., operator of the Bon Marches, said the strike originally stemmed from a dispute over whether teamsters or members of the Electrical Workers Union should deliver television sets.

The store said this dispute was settled by an agreement to use only United Parcel Service for such deliveries.

A teamster spokesman said the strike was caused by a breach of contract. He said not only television sets but linoleum and other merchandise had been delivered by craftsmen instead of teamsters.

The spokesman said, however, that the picketing in Yakima and Spokane involves a dispute over welfare programs and alleged failure of the store to pay money into health and welfare funds.

The strike has not been sanctioned officially by the Seattle Central Labor Council but work was interrupted on an addition being built on the downtown store.

Animals Have Emergency Ambulance

DETROIT (U)—Detroit now provides its animals with an emergency ambulance service approximating that given humans.

The animal service includes five cruising ambulances, all connected by two-way radio with the Michigan Humane Society's station. Central dispatcher is Alfred Keppen, a retired police lieutenant.

Keppen speeds an ambulance to an animal injury scene. The animal is taken to one of Detroit's 38 neighborhood veterinary clinics and then to the Michigan Humane Society Hospital.

Members of the Southeastern Michigan Veterinary Medicine Assn. agreed to provide the emergency service free.

Keppen's calls often total 225 or more a day. Not all of his emergency calls involve injuries. For instance the radio recently carried this: "Dispatcher to ambulance — a robin in a chimney at 920 Hyacinth. This is urgent."

GRANTS, LOANS TO CONTINUE

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of State Dulles told Congress Thursday he sees no early end to America's mutual security program of grants and loans to friendly nations.

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Bao Dai's Rule Declared Over In Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (U)—A feel-stamping, shouting 4,000-man national congress declared by acclamation Thursday the end of ex-Emperor Bao Dai's rule over South Viet Nam as chief of state.

At the same time another congress, made up of 700 local and provincial councilors and tribal chiefs, demanded that Bao Dai's powers be given now to American-supported Premier Ngo Dinh Diem leaving it to an elected national assembly to depose Bao Dai.

Both congresses called for general elections within four to six months to choose the National Assembly and set up a workable government. They urged Diem in the meantime to use his national troops to crush the Binh Xuyen rebels, his foes in South Viet Nam's week-old civil war.

The executive committees of the two congresses split over whether to give Diem full power to organize the elections. The national congress wanted the Premier to form a provisional government which would prepare for the voting. The second group favored giving Diem himself full power to make these preparations.

When all details of their formal resolutions have been finally settled, Diem will forward them to Bao Dai with a request that he choose among them. Bao Dai, once emperor of the small Indochinese state of Annam, was appointed chief of state of Viet Nam by the French in 1949. He has been living on the French Riviera more than a year.

Out of the two political meetings came one fairly certain conclusion: Bao Dai is finished in Viet Nam. Also there appeared to be little support for the American idea of a constitutional monarchy as the surest means of establishing a stable government in the country.

State to Dedicate Forest Area to Nelson S. Rogers

PORTLAND (U)—A 3,700-acre forest in the heart of the Tillamook burn will be dedicated Friday to the memory of Nelson S. Rogers, state forester nine years until his death in 1949.

Rogers led the campaign to reforest the 354,000 acres destroyed in three fires on the Tillamook burn area.

About 300 foresters, lumbermen, conservationists and public officials will take part in the ceremony at Camp Rogers on the Wilson River Highway, 33 miles east of Tillamook.

State Forester George Spaur will open the program at 1:30 p.m., introducing Mrs. Rogers and other members of the family.

A plaque marking the N. S. Rogers state forest will be unveiled. There also will be an 11-mile field trip in which visitors will be able to see the reforestation progress.

OREGON CITY (U)—Oregon City's new \$160,000 elevator was dedicated here Thursday night with Mrs. Paul Patterson, wife of the governor, doing the formal christening.

A parade preceded the event, and several thousand residents crowded around the foot of Seventh St. for the ceremonies.

The elevator carries residents between the two levels of town, the business district at the foot of a steep bluff, and the residential area above.

Police Probe New Clue to Missing Girl

BERKELEY, Calif. (U)—A report of "fingers sticking out of an automobile trunk" sent Berkeley police to Modesto Wednesday night in their search for missing 14-year-old Stephanie Bryan, who vanished a week ago.

The report came from Robert Eugene Small, operator of a service station at Keyes, seven miles south of Modesto on Highway 99. Modesto is 70 miles southeast of Berkeley.

Small said he saw three fingers of a human hand protruding from the trunk of a car that drove up for gas. When he called the driver's attention to it, the man roared away so fast that he peeled rubber off his tires.

Small said the car was a light grey, two-door 1950 sedan. The description is similar to that of a car seen on the tunnel road the day Stephanie disappeared. Witnesses have said they saw a young girl struggling with a man there.

Small did not get the license of the car, because it had no rear plates. He did not see the driver clearly enough to give a description of him.

Stephanie, daughter of a Berkeley radiologist, vanished on her way home from school last Thursday. Her parents fear she was the victim of a kidnaper. An intensive search so far has failed to unearth a single tangible clue.

Shot Fatal to Rail Striker

MT. PLEASANT, Tenn. (U)—Charles Wright, a striking employee of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, was shot to death Thursday in a highway incident which resulted in halting strike negotiations in Washington.

Union representatives walked out of the negotiations, angrily accusing the railroad of responsibility for the killing.

Meanwhile, Hugh T. Shelton of Columbia, a legal representative of the L & N Railroad, said four men arrested in the shooting were not armed guards as union spokesmen had said.
