Indian School Will Graduate 51 Students

CHEMAWA — Diplomas will go to 51 students at Chemawa Indian School's graduation exercises next Friday at 10 a.m. in the school auditorium.

The high school department will graduate 24, while the special five-year Navajo department will graduate 27.

High school students included one from Alaska, four from Oregon, nine from Washington, six from Montana, one from Idaho, two from North Dakota and one from Oklahoma.

Don C. Foster, Portland area director of Indian Affairs, will give the commencement address.

To Enroll at OCE

Other speakers will include high school valedictorian Joseph Coburn, whose subject will be "Youth Speaks." He plans to enroll at Oregon College of Education in September. He is a member of the Klamath tribe.

Salutatorian George Umtuch Jr. also plans to enter college in September. With Coburn, he was selected to play in the State Class B Shrine's football game in August. He is a member of the Warm Springs-Wasco-Yakima Tribes.

Will Work at Salem

Navajo honor students George Barber and Ella Albert plan to work at Salem after they graduate. Both came to the school from New Mexico. Both will speak at commencement exercises.

Buccalaurate services will be held at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, May 10, in the school auditorium. Father Kevin Murphy, principal of Serra High School, Salem, will speak. Father Austin Johnson of St. Louis, Ore., Parish, and the Rev. A. A. Talbot, leaders of Catholic and Protestant groups at Chemawa, will offer the invocation and benediction.

Musical numbers will include the A Capella Singers, directed by Mrs. A. H. Johannaber, and an instrumental group under direction of V. J. Matt.

Ankeny Grange Celebrating 40th Anniversary Tonight

JEFFERSON — A program Saturday night will celebrate Ankeny Grange's 40th anniversary. Those who have been members for 25 years will receive silver pins and certificates.

Of the 80 charter members, only four remain. They are Mrs. Mary Farr of Salem, Eugene Finlay and Mr. and Mrs. George Marlatt, all of Jefferson.

A group of farm families, from the communities now known as Sidney, Talbot and Ankeny Hill, met May 15, 1915 at the Union schoolhouse to discuss organizing a Grange. Tables were spread under the oak trees and following the basket dinner, Union Grange was organized. Helping organize were a Mr. and Mrs. Whitehead of Turner.

First Officers
First officers elected were F. B. Simpson, W. F. Wintermantel, Mrs. Charles Roy, Walter Roy, George Sharp, Mrs. George Sharp, Frank McCormick, R. P. Nye, and Mrs. Mary Farr.

After a few meetings in the schoolhouse, it was evident that a larger building was needed, and it was decided to build on land offered by the William Wintermantels. It also was voted to change the name to Ankeny Grange, in honor of Henry Ankeny, an early pioneer of this community.

Pomona Grange presented Ankeny a Bible at the first Pomona meeting held in Ankeny hall. The Bible still is in use.

Young People Joined
For several years the membership decreased. Some moved away, others were taken by death. Then, in 1927, a number of young people joined, and many activities were

enjoyed. There were dramas, readings and plays, coached by Orna Emmons; musicals directed by Roswell Wright.

Ankeny was proud of its drill team, captained by Roswell Wright. It captured third place at State Grange at Silverton in 1932, winning a \$25 prize. Later, in 1936, the team, this time captained by Jake Brown, won a prize at State Grange at Lebanon.

Youngest Master
In 1928, Freddie Wintermantel was elected master of Ankeny and held the distinction of being the youngest master in the state of Oregon at that time.

The Home Economics club was organized in 1930, with Mrs. J. O. Farr first chairman.

Silver star certificates were given to Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Farr Mrs. Edna Reeves and Eugene Finlay at Ankeny's 30th anniversary celebration May 5, 1945.

The Grange Hall has been used as a community center all of its 40 years. Other Granges have been entertained, many bridal and stork showers have been held, county extension meetings, and of late years, flood control programs have been formulated and discussed at the hall.

Present officers include Carl Hutchison, master; Kenneth Van Cleave, overseer; Maggie Marlatt, lecturer; Winnifred Zehner, secretary. There are 61 paid-up members.
