Bearcats Top Whits in Meet

Benson Sets Record; Larry Thompson High

WALLA WALLA (Special)—Willamette continued its dual meet domination here Saturday as they edged by the Whitman College thinclads, 63-63, in a cinder test that saw two new meet records set, one by Willamette's Dean Benson in the high hurdles.

Larry Thompson of Willamette was high point man, garnering 14 on first in the javelin and pole vault and a tie for first in the high jump. Coach Ted Ogden reported that it was the first time that Thompson had thrown the spear and that he took only one heave to win.

Benson shaved one-tenth of a second off the old 120-yard high mark, covering the distance in 14.6, which was still slower than his fastest time so far this year. He also won the low hurdles.

Whitman's Harold Perrot set a new meet record of 1:56.5 in the 800.

Strangely enough, Willamette won every field event and two hurdle races and Whitman was first in every running event.

Willamette scored a sweep in the broad jump, won by Tom Voigt with a leap of 20 feet, 5 1/2 inches, and Whitman swept the 2-mile, won by Ed Perrot in 1:41.

The lean Kansas cowboy, who says he is bothered badly by any wind over five miles an hour, was clocked at 4:07 in winning the race by a wide margin over his former Kansas teammate, Art Dalzell, and five other runners.

Wind Bothersome

Steve Gromek held the Chicago White Sox to five hits while the Detroit Tigers regained second place with a 7-1 triumph. The defeat dropped the Sox to fourth, behind the Yanks.

Harvey Kuenn and Al Kaline continued their sensational pace with each Tiger clubbing Chicago pitching for four hits. Kaline's four singles left him at .412 and Kuenn's triple, double and two singles boosted his mark to .380. The Tigers had 15 hits in all.

Yogi Berra's three-run double in the ninth gave the New York Yankees a 9-6 comeback victory over the Boston Red Sox after trailing at one stage by a 5-0 score.

Elston Howard, taking over the left field job for the Yanks, came through with four hits, including his first major league homer. Manager Casey Stengel used six pitchers and Boston used four in a game finally won by Tom Morgan and lost by Ike Delock.

After Mickey Mantle's homer gave the Yanks the lead for the first time in the eighth, Boston came back to tie. Berra's double came off Ellis Kinder with the bases loaded in the ninth, two runs scoring on the hit and the third when catcher Sam White dropped the relay throw at the plate.

Tribe Still Leads
As a result of the day's action, Cleveland still was in first place with a one-game margin over Detroit and the Yanks were 1 1/2 games off the pace. Chicago was one and two games back in fourth spot.

Bob Thurman came through with a three-run homer as a pinch hitter in the eighth inning for Cincinnati's 8-7 edge over the Chicago Cubs in a game delayed by rain.

In night action, Brooklyn's Dodgers maintained their fantastic pace, beating Philadelphia and Robin Roberts 6-3 for their 20th victory in 22 games. Milwaukee outlasted St. Louis 9-7 and Baltimore ended a four-game losing string 5-4 over Washington.

The Braves almost got No. 20 by forfeit. Umpire Art Gore threatened the action when fans showed beer cans on the field after Gore thumbed Roberts, rookie pitcher Jack Meyer and Earl Torgerson off the bench in the seventh.

Jones Homers Pair
Roberts was belted off the mound in the fifth, trailing 6-2, for his third defeat in six decisions.

Carl Erskine gave up home runs to Willie Jones, who hit a pair, and Del Ennis but didn't have much more trouble gaining his fifth victory. Roy Campanella led the Brooks' 13-hit barrage with three doubles as the Phils lost their eighth straight and fell into the cellar.

Willie Certain Swaps Would Win in Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—The oncharing Nashua brought no fear to the stout heart of tiny Willie Shoemaker.

Jabbering like a happy canary despite his reputation for silence, the 23-year-old Willie asserted:

"My horse had too much run left in him when Nashua came up. He was running easy. His ears were pricked."

"Nashua came up on us—and I knew who it was. I tapped Swaps once and he scooted. That's when I knew we were going to win. I knew he had enough left."

Nashua made his move turning into the stretch.

No Excuses Made
Eddie Arcaro made no excuses for the beaten favorite, who reportedly runs as he sees fit and doesn't respond to punishment.

"Nashua was a perfect gentleman today. He wanted to run and he wanted to win. He didn't have any trouble. And he didn't have any excuses except Swaps."

Shoemaker said Swaps gave him just one anxious moment.

"When he pulled into the stretch and he saw the starting gate off to the side, he hesitated. I hit him and he came on again."

Shoemaker said he hit his mount "maybe half a dozen times" coming up the stretch to "keep his mind on his business."

Rates Swaps Best
Without pause, the small Californian—native of El Paso, Texas—called Swaps the finest 3-year-old he has ridden.

"He may be the best horse of any age I ever rode," he added. Shoemaker, called Silent Shoe because he rarely says more than "three words at a time" in conversation, talked and talked as reporters questioned him.

"Winning the Derby was my biggest racing thrill by far," he said. "It beat winning the riding championship. There's so much glamor in this derby race."

In winning the 1953 jockey laurels, Shoemaker established a record by coming home first 480 times. He repeated as the top rider in the land in 1954.
