

City Councilmen Accept Access Roadway to Wallace Park Area

Salem got its roadway to Wallace Park Monday night as the City Council voted to accept an offer by Walter Musgrave for right-of-way property leading from Wallace Road.

The offer, withdrawn by Musgrave two weeks ago because he felt his intentions were being doubted, was renewed Monday. Under provisions of the offer the road will be called Musgrave Lane and any cost of improving the property along the way will not be charged to Musgrave as long as he holds ownership. Name changed.

Only other ordinance bill up for final consideration by the Council was one to change the name of Reservoir Street to Rio Vista Way. The request for the name change, endorsed by the City Planning Commission, was approved on third reading by the Council.

Approval of a project to codify the city's ordinances was given by councilmen who voted some \$3,850 to take care of the codification work and printing of 100 volumes of the result. They voted \$2,500 from the emergency fund of the 1954-55 budget to get the project underway. The rest of the fund will come from the new budget now under consideration.

Resolution Passes
A resolution authorizing acceptance of property for the extension of Evergreen avenue one block to Market street was approved. An ordinance bill to accept deed to the property and to dedicate the property for street purposes was up for first reading by the Council.

Under the project the city has agreed to meet the cost of paving the street.

Two resolutions for street improvement and two directing preparation of plans for sanitary sewers were oked by the Council. Engel avenue from Kingwood drive to Margaret street, and Grandview Place from Montrose to Summit avenue are authorized. The sewer projects are in Summit Drive from Kingwood Drive to the city limits, Grandview Place from Summit to Montrose, and in Cascade from Bonnie Way to Arrow street.

Petitions Accepted
Petitions for several street improvements and ones for a sanitary sewer were accepted and placed on file. The petitions call for improvement of Holliday Drive from Hansen avenue to Bandalara, Jefferson between Church and Cottage streets, N. 25th street between Englewood and Ellis avenues, and Urban Lane between Parkway and Kingwood drives. The sewer project is in Parkway Drive between Urban Lane and Glen Creek Road.

In other action, the Council approved a request from the Jory Packing Co. to construct a wooden loading platform ex-

Northwestern Growth Seen Above Normal

SALT LAKE CITY (U) — A Utah economist said Monday the Northwest can expect a growth 50 per cent higher than the national average.

Dr. Elroy Nelson said the five-state area is experiencing "almost boom conditions." Dr. Nelson, vice president of the First Security Bank of Utah, spoke at the opening general session of the business development section of the Northwest Electric Light and Power Assn. He said business activity in the area—Idaho, Utah, Montana, Oregon and Washington—is 5 to 15 per cent above last year. Retail sales he said, are about 10 per cent above last year.

The three-day conference continues through Wednesday. Representatives are attending from Utah, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia.

Request Approved
Approved a request by Howard E. Olsen for refund of a \$50 building moving permit. Olsen reported no street was used in the moving project, the building being moved across a vacant field.

Resolution Rescinded
Rescinded a resolution to establish a crosswalk across N. Capitol St. at Parrish Street after public school officials and students decided it was not needed.

Approved five sewer projects after public hearings failed to produce expected opposition. The projects are in Storz avenue between Portland Road and the east city limits, Engel Heights addition, Altmont Drive and Hillcrest Drive between Piedmont avenue and Kingwood Drive and in Northgate Addition.

Referred to the City Traffic Safety Council a resolution to make Miller street a through street between South River Road and S. Commercial street and to place stop signs on Saginaw, Fir and Fairmont where they intersect Miller.

Sanitary Sewers
Adopted resolutions approving plans and specifications for construction of sanitary sewers in Summit Drive between Kingwood Drive and the west city limits and in Cascade Drive between Bonnie Way and Arrow street.

Tabled for two weeks a resolution to give the State Board of Aeronautics a deed to one acre of land at Salem Municipal Airport for a building site.

Approved a Salvation Army request to permit an hour-long parade through downtown streets of a visiting band from its training college May 15. The band will play on downtown streets between 9:15 and 10:15 a.m. on Sunday.

Second Reading
Passed to second reading an ordinance bill sponsored by Alderman Walter White providing for a franchise for Salem Electric to operate a power distribution business in Salem at a fixed fee of 3 per cent of gross revenue every three months.

Approved bids of Stan Baker Motor Co. Salem, for furnishing a 3-ton truck and of Douglas McKay Chevrolet Co. for a 2-door sedan for use of the city engineer department.

Approved a divided contract between Salem Sand & Gravel Co. and Warren Northwest for providing some 1500 tons of asphalt for the city at the rate of \$4.49 cents a ton, and accepted low bid of Warren Northwest Inc. for furnishing asphaltic concrete for various street paving projects scheduled by the city this year.

Approved Transfer
Approved transfer of a package liquor license for Highland Market, 800 Highland Ave. to George Kangas on recommendation of the city police department.

Approved construction of a poster panel at 1789 Fairgrounds Rd. by Foster and Kleiser on the condition that the poster carry no liquor, tobacco or other suggestive advertising because of its proximity to Jason Lee Church. The condition was made by Alderman David O'Hara at the request of the congregation.

Illness Fatal To Salem Man

Otto A. Boetticher Jr., 51, 550 N. Summer St., died Monday in a Salem hospital after being ill since last October. He entered the hospital about six weeks ago.

Boetticher, born May 29, 1903 in Salem, had for the past eight years been master mechanic for a lumber company in Klamath County, California. While in Salem previously, he worked for other lumber companies and had his own construction business here.

He was a member of the Elks lodge in Crescent City.

Besides the widow, Mary Ann Boetticher, he leaves two daughters, Judy Marie Boetticher, Salem, and Mrs. Betty Rashko, Salem; one son, W. O. Boetticher, Sweet Home; four grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Freda Skopli, Eugene; father, Otto Boetticher, Salem, and mother, Mrs. Ida Boetticher, Salem.

Jair, Nyhus Sentenced to Penitentiary

DALLAS, Ore. — Earl L. Jair and Raymond J. Nyhus of Salem Monday afternoon were taken to the Oregon State Penitentiary to serve sentences of up to seven years.

They were found guilty by Polk County Circuit Judge Arlie Walker who sentenced them to seven years for the theft of an automobile belonging to Richard J. Murphy of Fall City, three years for the burglary of the Davis Sporting Goods Store in Falls City and two years for the burglary of the Brush College store. Sentences are to run concurrently.

The pair, who had twice escaped from the Polk County jail, had waived indictment and pleaded guilty to the charges.

For the time being, at least, they have escaped sentences for three additional charges preferred against them by Salem police following their 3 a.m. Monday capture in the 500 block of South Commercial Street. They were larceny of an auto, possession of stolen property and escape.

Multimillionaire's Son Accused of California Killing

VAN NUYS, Calif. (U) — A technical

writer jailed in the slaying of an old friend was identified Monday as the son of multimillionaire Dr. Armand Hammer of New York City, president of United Distillers of America, Inc., and of the Hammer Art Galleries there.

The father flew here Monday to stand by his son, Julian Hammer, 26, booked on suspicion of murder after a fatal quarrel early Sunday.

Bruce Whitlock, 28, was slain with two shots from a .45 caliber revolver at Hammer's home after a celebration of Hammer's birthday. Hammer told police he shot in self-defense.

He said the quarrel started over a 10-year-old gambling debt that was raised to \$400 during the dispute by a double-or-nothing toss of a coin.

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Solon Urges Explanation of Vaccine Plans

WASHINGTON (U) — Chairman Spence (D-Ky) of the House Banking Committee Monday called Surgeon General Leonard A. Schee for questioning on the government's handling of the Salk polio vaccine program. He also invited Secretary of Welfare Hobbie to testify.

Spence praised Schee as a "good public servant, doing the best he can in a tough spot." But he said the halt in vaccinations "has caused a lot of apprehension among parents" and "We think we are entitled to an explanation."

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash) announced the Senate Commerce Committee, which he heads, will start an investigation next Monday into what he called "muddled confusion" in federal handling of the vaccine.

Magnuson said in a statement: "If we are not convinced that standards and procedures are sufficient, we will immediately initiate legislation to halt its unregulated distribution in interstate commerce."

Time to Work
"By setting the date ahead one week we are giving the agencies involved sufficient time to work out the solution themselves. If they don't, the Congress will have to step in."

Magnuson expressed fear of "black marketing" in Salk vaccine. So did Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn). Kefauver said he would introduce legislation freezing all vaccine, except that contracted for by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and putting it under ration control.

The administration takes the position that the vaccine can best be distributed through the present voluntary system. The White House has said, however, it will ask authority to buy up commercial supplies if necessary to make sure every child gets his share.

500 Laid Off In Lumber Mill Dispute

COOS BAY (UP) — An estimated 500 woods employees of the Coos Bay Lumber Company have been laid off by the company in the latest action in a dispute with the AFL Plywood and Lumber and Sawmill Workers unions.

Trainmen between Powers and Coos Bay were also laid off. The action announced Monday by Coos Bay general manager A. W. Forrester, brought to 1750 the number of men idled by the dispute, which began last Tuesday.

AFL workers at the company's Coquille plywood plant walked off their jobs over the hiring of a drying operator at that plant. The union charged another man should have been given the job.

The firm's Coos Bay operations were shutdown when AFL employees from Coquille raised picket lines, which CIO employees here refused to pass.
