

Oregon's Demos Seek \$97,403,550 Sum for Projects in Northwest

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oregon's Democrats in Congress Wednesday asked the House Appropriations Committee to recommend \$97,403,550 in the year beginning July 1 to provide the Pacific Northwest with a "minimum program of essential projects."

Their requests calls for construction to start on Hills Creek, Cougar and Ice Harbor dams and advanced planning for an early start on the John Day and Green Peter-Whitebridge dams.

76 Dead, 83 Lost in Japan Ferry Tragedy

TAKAMATSU, Japan (AP) — Disaster came out of the fog of the inland sea Wednesday to the ferry Shiun Maru, loaded with 356 gay Japanese school children and 484 other passengers.

With disaster came panic and death for perhaps 159 Japanese, many of them children. The Shiun Maru was spotted on the steel prow of the railway ferry Uda Maru and sank within five minutes.

Twelve divers searched for bodies in the sunken hull. The Shiun Maru lies barely submerged in shallow waters off the northwest coast of Shikoku, Japan's smallest home island.

The divers searched for the bodies of 83 missing. Among the missing were 75 school children. Some children might have survived had they not rushed back to the cabins after their belongings and gifts.

5 Pro Tem Circuit Judges Appointed

Five circuit judge pro tem appointments were announced by Chief Justice Harold Warner of the State Supreme Court here Wednesday.

John Gordon Gearin, Portland, will serve in Lane County for six days, as of last Monday.

Barnett H. Goldstein, Portland, is serving in Marion County for a period of 20 days.

Frank J. Van Dyke, Medford, will serve 13 days in Multnomah County, starting May 16.

William W. Bartle, Eugene, will serve six days in Multnomah County beginning May 18.

Judge E. H. Howell, Canyon City, has been assigned to Polk County to assist in the trial docket there.

Bank Debts Up in Salem

PORTLAND (AP) — Bank debts, which reflect check volume, increased at Eugene, Portland and Salem in April, the Federal Reserve Bank reported Wednesday.

The gain was 20 per cent over the previous April at Eugene, 10 per cent at Portland, and 6 per cent at Salem. The totals were \$75,334,000 at Eugene, \$819,176,000 at Portland, and \$81,853,000 at Salem.

For the first four months of the year Eugene's debts were up 24 per cent, Portland's up 16 per cent, and Salem's up 3 per cent.

Liberace's 'Mom' Must Keep Name Mrs. Casadonte

HOLLYWOOD (UP) — Liberace's mother, Mrs. Frances Casadonte, 62, Tuesday dismissed her petition to change her surname back to that of her piano playing son's.

Mrs. Casadonte divorced the television star's father, Samuel Liberace, a retired French horn player from Madison, Wis., in 1941, and two years later married Alexander Casadonte, who died 10 years ago.

Salem Boaters To Sponsor Races Sunday

The Salem Boat Club is sponsoring professional outboard motorboat races starting at 1 p.m. Sunday in the bridge area to raise money for the improvement of Wallace Marine Park.

Although admission is free, those attending will be encouraged to buy "booster ribbons" either at the gate Sunday or Saturday at downtown and West Salem banks, Robert Hullett, publicity chairman, said. Ribbons cost \$1. Bleachers to accommodate 1,000 people will be erected in the park.

The course will be 1½ miles. Professional drivers will be here from California, Washington and Idaho, as well as Oregon.

Boaters are asked to launch their boats before 10 a.m. Sunday if they must use the park's boat ramp. No boats will be allowed on the course during the race, but U. S. Coast Guard patrols will permit local boaters to pass through the course between heats.
