No-No Pitched by Cubs' Jones Against Pirates

Side Fanned in 9th; Brooks Beaten

Sad Sam Jones abruptly overcame a touch of wildness by striking out the last three men he faced to pitch the first no-hitter of the season Thursday as the Chicago Cubs knocked off Pittsburgh 4-0.

It was the first no-hit game ever by a Negro in major league baseball and the first by a Cub pitcher in 40 years. The last hitless major league game was spun by Milwaukee's Jim Wilson against Philadelphia June 12, 1954.

Jones, 29, packed the ninth inning with drama for a crowd of 2,918 at Wrigley Field as he walked the first three men, then retired the next two on straight strikes. He ended it all by firing a called third strike past Frank Thomas on a 1-2 count.

In the only other National League game, Del Crandall's lead-off home run in the 12th inning carried the Milwaukee Braves to a 2-1 victory over the first place Brooklyn Dodgers, who now have lost two straight.

In the American League, Washington's Maury McDermott outdueled young Herb Score to snap first-place Cleveland's winning streak at six games 3-0, and Chicago scored four in the ninth to beat Baltimore 6-2. Detroit and the New York Yankees were idle.

Manager Stan Hack admitted he was ready to yank Jones if the 6-4 right-hander had walked another man in the ninth. But he didn't tell Sam that and Jones just chewed away on his ever-present toothpick to whiff Dick Groat and Roberto Clemente. Then he curbed Thomas to death.

Jones, who came to the Cubs with outfielder Gale Wade and cash from Cleveland last winter in return for Ralph Kiner, walked seven and fanned six for the afternoon.

His mates backed him up with some brilliant fielding and 15 hits off loser Nelson King and Vern Law. One of the hits was Ted Tappe's homer.

Johnson Fight Probe Delayed

PHILADELPHIA — The scheduled probe of professional boxing in Pennsylvania especially last Friday night's nationally televised Harold Johnson-Julio Mederos bout has been postponed until Monday. The public hearings were scheduled to open Friday.

Albert Klein one of the state's three athletic commissioners said the delay was to enable further investigation before the open hearings begin. Boxing in Pennsylvania has been suspended 90 days by the governor pending an investigation of the sport.

Chemical tests made on Johnson since he collapsed in his corner after the second round of his scheduled 10 rounder against Cuban heavyweight Mederos have shown traces of barbiturate - type drug a medicine often used to induce sleep or relaxation.

Physicians and police report Johnson was drugged before he entered the ring.

Frailey Continues Home Run Rampage

The Town Senators, after outgunning Lewiston 18-11 at Waters Field Wednesday night, turned in about-face in last night's series finale, couldn't hit with men aboard and lost the Northwest League game 7-4. Hillis Layne's Broncs wrecked a 2-2 contest in the seventh inning with four runs.

There was a wee bit to shout about at that for Uncle Hugh Luby's kids despite getting beat. Outfielder Don Frailey, the rookie from Orland, Calif., blasted his third homer in as many nights and his fifth of the young season. The poke, a well-kissed one, disappeared over the right-center wall in the eighth inning with Tommy Agosta, who had walked, aboard.

But by then the ball game was gone, as the 4-run seventh had put it beyond recall for the resident flock.

Francis vs. Benton

Bud Francis had been going along in good shape in a hurling duel with Right-hander Jim Benton of the Broncs. Bud was nicked for a run in the second when Layne, who hit a ton during the four-game series, smashed a double and later scored on Joe Jacobs' infield single. Catcher John McNamara's homer over the left field fence in the fourth brought Lewiston its second run.

Salem got one in the first beat, and should have pocketed a buck-ettful. Benton walked four during the inning and gave up a run-producing single to Gene Tansell. But there was a nifty out-toss play on Floyd Robinson at third base that hauled Benton out of what could have been a woolf jam.

Tansell Triples
Robinson's walk and Tansell's long triple to right-center netted a second tally for the Solons in the third, and after Lewiston tallied in the fourth the count stayed at 2-2 until the fatal seventh.

Benton started the surge with a single and was bunted to second. The next play was the one that broke the Solons' back. Gordy Beecroft grounded to Tansell and he had Benton thrown out a mile at third. But Agosta dropped the throw and everybody was safe. Raul Dieppa and Joe Riney followed with singles, and two errors were committed on Layne's grounder. When the Senators finally got the ball pinned down, four runs were in.

They didn't need it, but the Broncs got another run in the eighth on a walk and Jacobs' double. Lots of Threats
Salem threatened in almost every inning, as Benton walked 13 batters to go along with the six hits he gave. But 14 runners left stranded on the bags tells the story better than words.

Lewiston had 13 hits off Francis and Bill Walsh, who hurled the ninth. The latter escaped a weird inning himself, for he gave up three hits and a walk, yet wasn't scored upon. A terrific throw from Jack Dunn in center field, cutting down Riney at the plate, saved Walsh's hide.

The series ended at 2-2 and the Senators now take on the Spokane Indians in a four-game set. First mix gets under way tonight at eight o'clock, and Bill (Red) Whitson will be on the mound for the Solons. A single game Saturday at 2 p.m. (note the time) and a doubleheader Sunday, also at two o'clock, will round out the first home stand with Eddie Lake's Tribe.

Salem took three of four from Spokane last week, at Spokane. Only 451 for last night's game, but it was so cold the pop vendors didn't need any ice in their buckets. The stuff froze all by itself, right along with the customers.

North Salem High Vikings and the Jefferson High Lions Thursday swept to impressive victories in the Class A and B divisions of the District 7 track and field meet in McCulloch Stadium. And in doing so, Ken Hunt's Vikings and Ray Howie's Lions qualified numerous athletes for next week's state finals at Corvallis.

The Vikings, showing strength in the dashes, scored 135 1/2 points. South Salem had 83 1/2, Stayton 44 1/2, Serra Catholic 41 1/2, Woodburn 30, Molalla 29 1/2, North Marion 20 1/2, Gervais 20, Silverton 15 1/2 and Cascade 11 1/2 in the Class A division.

Points were scored on a 10-8-6-4-2-1 for the first six places. In the B division Jefferson had 142 1/2 points, St. Paul 74, Scio and Mill City each 62, Chemawa 37, Gates 35, Oregon School for the Deaf 26 and Sublimity 10 1/2.

Despite a cold wind and spasms of ice-like rainfall, the striving kids racked up two new records in the Class A division and four in the B.

The new marks in the A class were notched by North Salem's Kraig Gately in the pole vault and Stayton's Bob Roy in the discus. Gately soared 12' 2" to wipe out the old mark of 12' 1" by Shields of Molalla in 1942. Roy spun the platter 153' 5", erasing the previous high of 138' which was held by Dunton of Woodburn since 1942.

The Bees had a new mark in the discus also, with Scio High's Ed Novak doing 125' 7" to lower the record of 122' 6 1/2" racked up by Gervais' Norm Keppinger only last year.

Scribe Picks Rocky To Kayo Challenger

SAN FRANCISCO — If Don Cockell doesn't show more against Rocky Marciano than he does in the gym, the little fat man will be just another horizontal British heavyweight Monday night at Kzar Stadium.

"He's a horrible gym fighter," you are warned before he climbs through the ropes at his training camp in suburban San Rafael. After it's over, you are advised to pay no attention to what you saw. Jack Solomons, the British promoter, shrugs off Cockell's work-outs.

"Never Shows Anything"
"In London, I can't even get the boxing writers to bother to look at him in training," he said. "They say he never shows them anything. He just practices his moves but never executes them."

The challenger's manager, John Simpson, hastens to explain that Don dislikes public workouts, feels it's "a bit rotten" to show up his sparring partners.

American observers who never have seen Cockell fight must draw their conclusions from what they see. To put it mildly, there has been no rush to climb on the invader's band wagon. Obviously ill at ease in a head guard, Cockell has a disturbing habit of walking in with his head in the air. Harry Matthews found out what happened when he made the same mistake against Marciano.
