Compilation of New Laws Now Underway

Compiling the laws of the 1955 Legislature was started here Thursday under direction of David O'Hara, in charge of the State Elections Bureau.

O'Hara said he hoped to have 3, when all laws, except those with the task completed prior to August the emergency clause, become operative. Laws bearing the emergency clause became effective when signed by the governor and filed with the secretary of state.

New Contracts Raise Pay of Retail Clerks

Pay increases for employees of major food stores in the Salem and mid-Willamette Valley area are being signed this week, it was reported Thursday.

The increases range from 5 to 10 cents per hour, plus extra time for Sunday work, according to John Moore of Salem, secretary of the Retail Clerks Union, Local 992. Moore said contracts between the union and food store operators are being signed now and are retroactive to May 1.

Local 992 jurisdiction includes Marion, Polk, Linn, Yamhill and Benton counties.

Price increases to union clerks also were granted recently this week in the Portland area, according to Associated Press reports.

Employment Rise Curtailed By Weather

Weather during April held the anticipated rise in spring employment to a minimum, reports the State Unemployment Compensation Commission. As a result, an estimated 3,400 workers in the Marion-Polk County area were without jobs.

However, the figure is 19 per cent less than it was for March. Workers continued to be called back in lumber and logging operations but snow at higher elevations continued to plague logging work.

A slight rise in employment of skilled tradesmen was noted but demand for building laborers continued to lag. Little change was seen in wholesale and retail trade employment.

State unemployment compensation benefit payments were paid to 2,055 individuals during the week of April 16. New and additional claims for unemployment filed during April were up 22.8 per cent over the same period in 1954.

Since the start of the 1954-55 benefit year, an estimated 1,100 workers have exhausted their benefit rights. This is about 10 per cent above last year.
