

Neutral Reich Plan Attacked by Faure

PARIS (U) — French Premier Edgar Faure came out Friday against the idea of a neutralized Germany as unrealistic. He said he favors the prospective top level conference of the Big Four, but that it should not halt West German rearmament.

Some diplomatic observers believe Russia's consent to a neutralized Austria under the independence treaty to be signed in Vienna Sunday, may be designed to prepare the way for a similar offer to Germany.

Faure Pledges Support for Premier Diem

PARIS (U) — French Premier Edgar Faure Friday pledged his support to the U. S. backed government of Premier Ngo Dinh Diem in South Viet Nam, the part of the country free from Communist control.

He said both the United States and France want to put South Viet Nam into the best possible shape for the election of 1956. That is when the South and the Communist-run North are due to vote on reunification.

"I have said in the past," Faure told the newsmen, "that the Diem government was not adapted to its mission. I am eager that everything be done so that it will be so adapted."

"We may have different degrees of hope, but it is certain that our desires are the same."

Faure said nothing about Bao Dai, who apparently is to remain as chief of state of South Viet Nam, but not to return there. Diem wants elections for a constitutional convention that would probably force out Bao Dai, who has been living in France for 13 months.

Criticism of Reclamation Work Feared

WASHINGTON (U) — Reclamation Commissioner Wilbur A. Drexler said Friday he believes a task force report will be critical of Western reclamation development.

He said his feeling was partly based on questions asked him when he testified before the commission.

"I feel the group is essentially against Western irrigation development," he declared.

Drexler expressed his opinions at a news conference called to defend the reclamation program against what he said are attempts by critics to "discredit and bring to a halt efforts to help meet the West's critical water shortages."

One "critic" named by Drexler was former Gov. Leslie A. Miller of Wyoming, who heads the Hoover task force group drawing up recommendations about federal activity in the fields of reclamation and water supply. Another was Raymond Moley of Newsweek magazine.

Miller, in an article in the May Readers Digest, contended that building Western irrigation works "at enormous expense" is wasteful when "no new farm land is needed to feed America today."

Drexler was asked if he believes the task force will bring in adverse recommendations on the reclamation program.

"I have a feeling they will be critical of reclamation as being subsidized by the government," he answered.

He added, however, that he did not believe the report will have any particular effect on Western resources development.

The reclamation commissioner told reporters he called the news conference because "it is time to take a close look at the indiscriminate attack of those critics who are attempting, by every means at their command, to destroy public confidence in our efforts to assist the arid Western states in meeting their water needs."

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'Dead' Rocket Takes Off; 3 Soldiers Die

EL PASO, Tex. (U) — A supposedly "dead" target rocket was fired into life by an acetylene torch at Fort Bliss Friday, killing three men and seriously injuring three.

The small World War II rocket, used as an anti-aircraft gun target, was being dismantled when the torch ignited its propellant charge. The rocket screamed through a motor shop on its 110-yard flight, hitting the men as it went through the doorway.

Dead were Pvt. William J. Harrison, 22, of Cambridge, Md.; Pvt. Myron A. Baxter, 22, of Allentown, Pa.; and Pvt. Gene K. Martin, 27, of Marlin, Tex.

Harrison and Baxter were killed instantly. Martin died about four hours later.

Pfc. Wilfred Wassenberg, 24, of Marysville, Kans., one of the injured, was cutting the rocket up for scrap when it fired. The target, 5 feet long and 6 inches in diameter, did not carry an explosive charge.

The rocket narrowly missed several men in the shop, emerged through a window and just missed a group of men working on a gun carriage. It came to rest in a vacant field.

Plunge Kills Heir to Auto Parts Fortune

PASADENA, Calif. (U) — The 40-year-old heir to an auto parts fortune was killed Friday in a 12-foot plunge over an embankment on his mother's estate, and Friday night his estranged fourth wife said through her attorney she suspects foul play.

Mrs. Anita Lipton Warner wants an inquest called in the death of Thomas W. Warner Jr., whose father developed the Borg Warner Co., subsequently merged with General Motors.

Her counsel, S. S. Hahn, said she would demand the body and seek to be named administratrix of his estate, expected by Hahn to exceed two million dollars.

The lawyer said the estranged wife is hiring private detectives to check Warner's activities and companions in the hours preceding his death early Friday.

Officers said Warner, once married to actress Anne Sterlin, had lived several months at the home of his mother, Mrs. Nettie M. Warner, 76. She was reported suffering from shock and under the care of her physician in the big mansion at 891 S. Orange Grove Ave.

Census Bureau Confirms It— Men Are Getting Scarcer

WASHINGTON (U) — The Census Bureau has confirmed here what every unmarried woman knows: Men are getting scarcer.

This was a side product of a bureau study of the increase in urban and rural civilian populations from April, 1950, when the last general census was taken, to April, 1954.

The study disclosed that both in the cities and on the farm the number of men compared with the number of women declined.

There are still more men than women on the farms, however, and fewer men than women in the cities.

The bureau said that in this period a long term trend to more rapid growth of city population than rural population was reversed.

In the four years, it said, the rural civilian population increased 6.3 per cent while population in the cities went up 5.6 per cent. In the 1940-1950 period city population increased about 20 per cent while rural population went up only 3 per cent.

The reversal after 1950, the bureau said, reflected the rapid growth of suburbs.

In 1950 there were 934 males for every 100 females in the cities by 1954.

But on the farm the ratio was nearly 1044 males for every 100 females in 1950 and dropped to 934 by 1954.
