Women's League Will Convene in Eugene

The biennial state-wide convention of the League of Women Voters of Oregon will be held in Eugene May 22, 23, 24. More than 90 delegates, observers and state board members are expected to attend from the 9 local and 3 provincial leagues in Oregon.

The nominating committee, of which Mrs. V. N. Freeman of Eugene is chairman, has proposed the following state officers to be voted on at the convention: President, Mrs. Ronald K. Campbell, Corvallis; 1st vice-president, Mrs. K. E. Montgomery, Eugene; 2nd vice-president, Mrs. Robert Wiener, Portland; secretary, Mrs. F. H. J. Dickmann, Corvallis; treasurer, Mrs. R. W. Weiss, Portland; directors: Mesdames Justin Smith, Medford; Charles Ford, Eugene; A. O. Mueller, Salem; Walter W. McGuire, Portland; Wesley S. Shaner, Astoria; D. W. Richardson, Salem; chairman of the nominating committee is Mrs. Peter DeWitt, Portland.

Convention business will also include by-law changes, adoption of a budget, discussion of organization problems, and determination of a program for the next two years. The state board has suggested two program items for the current agenda. The first of these, Measures to Revise and Strengthen the Constitution of the State of Oregon, is a continuation of the work that has been done in this field by the League in the last two years. The second item, Preservation of Our Constitutional Rights, ties in with one of the two national current agenda items that deals with individual liberties and the public interest.

In addition to these two items, three local Leagues have submitted suggestions that deal with state election laws and problems relating to adoption of children in Oregon. These will also be considered by the delegates.
