Summersall. Coolidge Chief Of Staff, Dies

WASHINGTON UP - Death Saturday overtook another of the nation's famous old soldiers - Gen. Charles Pelot Summersall, army chief of staff in the Coolidge administration.

The distinguished soldier-educator who tried to wake up America on the preparedness issue long before the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor died at 11:50 a. m. at Walter Reed Hospital. He was 85. Gen. Summersall had been a patient at the hospital since last August.

Gen. Summerall was chief of staff of the Army in 1926-30. He had been the country's oldest ranking soldier since the death of Gen. staff during World War I in which 'No Trace Left' Summerall distinguished himself in France.
