Washington To Continue Polio Program

SEATTLE (AP)—Eighteen local health officers from throughout the state voted Saturday to continue with the Salk poliovirus immunization program as soon as possible.

The decision was reached after carefully reviewing all available information about the vaccination program and receiving assurance from State Health Department officials that the vaccine allotted this state is safe and effective.

Dr. J. A. Kahl, director of the health department, said vaccine to be used here is all from the Parke-Davis & Co. of Detroit and "has shown itself to be safe in more than a million doses given to date," they are ready to proceed with

Some of the health officers said their vaccination program Monday May 16. Others indicated they will wait until May 23.

"Some polio cases should be expected in the children who are vaccinated as well as in those who do not receive the vaccine," Dr. Kahl said. "The reason being that the child already is infected with the polio virus and is coming down with the disease when the vaccine is given."

Ward Battle Closes With Barr on Top

CHICAGO (AP)—The long, bitter struggle for Montgomery Ward & Co. wound up Saturday with John Barr, 47, as top man.

Barr—a relatively obscure Ward executive when the fight began last August—was named chairman and president at the first meeting of the new directors of the huge mail order firm.

Directors met immediately after election inspectors brought in the final tally on votes cast at the April 22 annual meeting. This showed, as expected, that Ward's management placed six members and Louis Wolfson three members on the nine man board.

Wolfson, 43, had hoped to gain control by electing at least five directors, but he appeared to be satisfied to go along with the new setup at the big mail order and retail firm. He felt, however, that Ward's should have a different man as president while Barr serves as chairman.

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Bauxite Deposits Located in Salem Hills



Bauxite deposits in the Salem Hills area south of the city are shown on this map. Report of the deposits by the state department of geology and mineral industries is based on several test borings throughout the area. Shaded areas, principally in the Rosedale-Sunnyside district, show where test borings indicated deposits some 14 1/2 feet thick.

State Bulletin Gives Report On Ore Probe

The April issue of the Ore-Bin, bulletin of the state department of geology and mineral industries, contains a second progress report on investigations of bauxite deposits in the Salem hills south of the city.

An accompanying map shows the geologic detail of the area from Prospect Hill to Battle Creek east of the Sunnyside district.

Numerous borings of the earth were made to get an idea of the extent of the bauxite deposits. While no estimate is given as to the volume of the ore reserves the authors, R. E. Corcoran and F. W. Libbey conclude an area of 1,500 acres is underlain with bauxite laterite with an average thickness of 14 1/2 feet. The overburden averages three and one-half feet.

Armed Forces Clothes Buying Probe Planned

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chairman McClellan (D-Ark.) said Saturday the Senate investigations subcommittee is about to unfold a story of "corruption" in millions of dollars worth of clothing contracts for the armed forces.

He said that while a gift of at least one home freezer is involved, "it goes beyond that to actual cash payments."

McClellan said the subcommittee will start public hearings Wednesday in an inquiry into a "fresh" case of money changing hands in connection with contracts for white sailor hats, raincoats, garrison caps and other clothing items.

"It involves corruption, not mere inefficiency or incompetence," he said.

McClellan withheld most details, but said in an interview that about 10 different contracts totaling several million dollars are involved.

He said the subcommittee's inquiry related to the way in which contracts were carried out as well as to the way they were awarded. Some of them date back to 1952. Witnesses will include manufacturers who received contracts and government employees.
