

Tito Declares Policy Toward West to 'Remain Unchanged'

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—President Tito declared Sunday Yugoslavia is not changing its foreign policy and will not "maneuver behind the scenes." Yugoslavia via only wants good relations with East and West, he said, and will join no bloc — East, West or "third force."

It was Tito's first comment on Saturday's announcement that Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin, Soviet Communist Party chief Nikita Khrushchev and Deputy Foreign

Minister Andrei Gromyko will visit Belgrade for conferences late this month.

Addressing a celebration of the 10th anniversary of the liberation of Istria from the Nazis at Pola, a town on the Northern Adriatic Coast, Tito stressed that his government is determined to deal with the Soviet leaders only as equals.

Yugoslavia has told the Russians it wants to keep its friends and will tolerate no interference from

abroad — either East or West — in its internal affairs, Tito said.

The Kremlin consented to these conditions, he added, implying that Moscow asked for the meeting and that he agreed only after his terms were accepted.

"The whole West will know what we have discussed and what we have agreed upon," Tito said. "There will be no secret deals 'behind the curtains.'"

"Grateful to West"

"Yugoslavia is grateful to the West and particularly to the United States which has given and is still giving aid," he continued, but added that in the future, as in the past, Yugoslavia will not accept aid with political conditions attached.

"Aid is not a bribe," he said. "They in the West should not think that we are changing sides; we wish best relations with the West. We are not going to turn aside from this road, but we wish to have free hands to strengthen peace."

Yugoslavia, the President assured his audience, will join no bloc of nations, neither Eastern nor Western, nor has it ambitions to form a "third power" with India and the Middle East.

"Lasting peace in the world cannot be assured by bloc division, but should proceed along the path of cooperation and active international coexistence, regardless of the difference in political systems."

He called the Soviet offer to come to Belgrade "a daring decision by responsible Russian leaders to discuss unsolved problems."

Of the Soviet delegation, Tito said, "These are new people," not those who were responsible for "the tremendous pressure and insults" which Yugoslavia received from Russia in the past.

Newspapers in Italy viewed the forthcoming Soviet-Yugoslav conference as sounding the death knell of the Balkan alliance, which indirectly linked Yugoslavia to the North Atlantic alliance.

It Messaggero, one of Italy's largest independent newspapers, said: "One fact emerges from the forthcoming conference — the reality that the Balkan pact, in any case, is not enough to guarantee the defense of Italy nor the position of the West in the Mediterranean."

Neutral Tito May Shift Yugoslavia's U.S. Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. George (D-Ga.) said Saturday any pledge by President Tito of "absolute neutrality" as between East and West would call for reexamination of American military and economic aid to Yugoslavia.

George, who heads the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and Sen. Knowland of California, the

GOP leader, agreed in separate interviews that a visit of Russian leaders to Belgrade is aimed primarily at "neutralizing" the Yugoslavs.

Both senators described the expected "peace" bid to Tito by Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Communist Party boss Nikita Khrushchev as part of a Red maneuver to undermine Free World alliances and the proposed rearming of Western Germany.

Knowland said he believes the Russians also are attempting to "put themselves into a stronger bargaining position" for any top level Big Four conference.

He saw also a potential threat to Greece and Turkey if the Soviets can get a non-attack agreement with Tito which would let them move satellite divisions from Yugoslavia's borders.

George said he doubts that Bulganin and Khrushchev will be able to move Tito far from his present position, in which he is allied with Greece and Turkey and receives American aid.

"But if Tito said as a result of the conferences that he was going to be absolutely neutral, we would have to reexamine our aid to Yugoslavia," George said.

"If he indicated he was going to renew diplomatic relations with the Soviets, that would present a different picture than we have now."

George noted that the United States now is sending surplus agricultural products to Yugoslavia and furnishing Tito with some military supplies. Economic aid is scaled at about 40 million dollars yearly, with military assistance reportedly running somewhat higher.

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Lost California Girl Rumored On East Coast

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Berkeley police Sunday received and then discounted reports that 14-year-old Stephanie Bryan, subject of a widespread search since April 28, had been seen last Wednesday in Massachusetts.

Berkeley police Lt. H.F. Whaley said the report from Fall River, Mass., that a woman saw Stephanie walking down the street with a young man had been checked by the FBI.

"We believe the report is unfounded," said Whaley.

A search by 300 men Sunday of the rugged hill area from which the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Charles S. Bryan Jr. disappeared turned up nothing. Berkeley authorities said no further mass searches are planned.

Dr. Bryan said Sunday he had never heard of the woman who claimed she had seen the girl. The Bryans lived in Dartmouth, a Fall River suburb, from 1946 to 1952, when they moved to California.

FALL RIVER, Mass. (AP)—Police disclosed Sunday that a girl resembling the missing Stephanie Bryan, 14, of Berkeley, Calif., was reported seen last Wednesday in a Fall River eating place.

Police said a woman — whom they refused to identify — told authorities she saw the missing school girl in the company of a man about 25 years old.

Production in U.S. Reaches New Record

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Commerce Department said Sunday the nation's total production zoomed 8 million dollars to a new record annual rate of 370 billions during the first three months of this year.

This topped slightly the previous record for three months, the second quarter of 1953, when gross national production — total dollar value of all goods and services produced in the nation — reached a \$369,900,000 annual rate.

Both the first quarter figure for this year and the previous record figure were seasonally adjusted annual rates.

Since there has been little change in price levels during the intervening 21 months, it appeared that actual production in the first quarter of this year, as well as the dollar value of the production, had bounced back to the previous record high.

During April, May and June of 1953 when total production set its previous record, the consumer price index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics ranged from 117.7 in April to 114.5 in June. In the first three months of this year, the index held steady at 114.3.

Tokyo Host to International C of C Meet

TOKYO (AP)—Twelve hundred world business leaders were urged by speakers at the opening of the 15th congress of the International Chamber of Commerce Sunday to contribute capital and "know-how" toward wiping out Asia's poverty.

The six-day congress, convening in Asia for the first time, heard this continent variously described as "poverty gripped," "the poorest region on earth," under-developed and needing economic liberation.

The Russian bloc of nations was not represented at the 46-nation meeting of private free enterprise businessmen. The closest reference to Reds came from Camille Gutt of Belgium, president of the ICC.

He denounced "false prophets who hold out hopes of an immediate paradise through revolution or war or perhaps simply through deficit financing." He called on the businessmen to develop world thinking within the framework of their belief in "private initiative and the dignity of man."

Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama welcomed the business leaders.

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Solons Vary On Design of Air Academy

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP)—Architectural designs for the Air Force Academy to be built in the shadow of Pikes Peak were unwrapped Saturday amid mixed reactions from congressmen flown out from Washington.

The architects said the buildings "through their great simplicity of design are timeless in their architecture."

But some of the score of senators and representatives tabbed the designs "heavenly," "radical," or "modern and futuristic."

One, Rep. Hardy (D-Va.), told a report he heard someone say "the academy looks like a modernistic cigarette factory. I'm not saying that's my idea but let's call it unique."

Sen. Welker (R-Idaho) described the design to a newsmen as "heavenly. I have nothing but thrills in my heart for the cadets who will enjoy this academy."

He said he thought the design for the buildings to cost \$8 million dollars should include "more Western architecture—more good red, Colorado stone."

The models were unveiled at the Colorado Springs Fine Arts Center by Secretary of Air Harold E. Talbott. Nearly 100 newsmen flown from throughout the country viewed the designs after the congressional preview.

The rolling, pine-covered Rocky Mountain foothills where the academy will be built seven miles north of Colorado Springs were termed by the architects as "50 per cent of the design."

The buildings for the nation's third service academy will be constructed of combinations of aluminum, stainless steel, glass and marble, travertine and native granite.

Coeur d'Alene Lake Yields Body Of College Youth

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)—The body of 22-year-old John Calvert of Great Falls, Mont., was recovered from the icy waters of Lake Coeur d'Alene Sunday, just one month after the search for the missing youth began.

Sheriff H.H. Haner said the death was being listed as suicide. The body was discovered by a resident of this North Idaho area who was fishing. Identification was made through papers found on the body.

The search for the Washington State College student was started after officers were advised that his car was found abandoned near the lake.

Car Plows Into Marching Unit; 29 Soldiers Hurt

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—Twenty-nine persons were injured at Lackland Air Force Base Sunday when a car plowed into a formation of basic trainees marching to K.P. duty.

Nine of the injured were hospitalized with fractures and some 20 others treated or examined after the accident, which occurred shortly before dawn.

A. C. C. Roger K. Simpson, 3709th Military Basic Training Squadron tactical instructor, was listed as driver of the car.

Simpson told authorities he was on his way to work and failed to see the marching group because of darkness and light mist until it was too late to stop.

News Censor Policy Begun By Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP)—The government of Honduras ordered censorship Sunday for press messages sent abroad "during the present international emergency" with Nicaragua.

The government, in announcing this step, said it was taken "because of certain false reports filed x x x by some press agents (correspondents) and the attempt of Mr. (Harvey) Rosenhouse, agent of Time magazine, to try to send a message containing alarming information which might make more serious the present state of relations between Honduras and Nicaragua."

A spokesman at Time magazine in New York said that Harvey Rosenhouse, a roving correspondent for the publication, arrived in Honduras from Guatemala on Saturday, on assignment to report the border situation.
