

Highest Court Rules U. S. Securities Free Of Taxation by State

WASHINGTON (U)—The Supreme Court cited some of its earliest rulings Monday in reaffirming that federal securities are immune from state taxation.

The 8-0 decision struck down an attempt by Ohio to include federal obligations owned by mutual savings banks in computing a state intangible property tax. The banks had contended the obligations

Police Play 'Cat, Mouse' With Molotov

VIENNA, Austria (U)—Soviet Foreign Minister V.M. Molotov played cat-and-mouse Monday with Austrian security police trying to keep on his trail.

Told Molotov would visit a Soviet-run textile factory at St. Pölten, in the Soviet Zone, the police—as is customary with visiting dignitaries—alerted all officers along the route and had a radio car ready to follow him.

When the Russian convoy of five black Zis limousines—Molotov's in the center—set off from Vienna's Hotel Imperial, the Austrians fell into line.

But the convoy veered suddenly into a side street and let the police drive by. Then the Russians backed off and headed toward the Russian-administered oilfields at Matzen and Aderklaa.

The police made frantic efforts to find Molotov. Their newly-acquired radio car broke down. Then they learned Molotov was at the oilfields. The police raced there, only to find he had gone to the Vienna woods for a look over the city.

Finally, the police caught up with the minister at a Russian-run enterprise in Vienna, where he was chatting with workers. Then he went back to his hotel and the police were happy.

Rockies Area Records Snow

Snow, up to seven inches, fell on Montana, Idaho and Utah as wintry weather returned to the Northern Plains and Rockies Monday. Snow or rain continued to fall in parts of the Northern Rockies.

At Cut Bank, in Northwestern Montana, there already was six inches of snow on the ground. Idaho Falls, Idaho, had seven inches of snow. DuBois, Idaho, five inches. Salt Lake City, three inches. Great Falls and Butte, Mont., two inches. Helena an inch.

By nightfall, Laramie, Wyo., had two inches on the ground and it was still snowing.

Stockmen were warned to protect newborn calves and lambs against more snow and heavy rain in the Northern Rockies. Forecasters said it would continue through Tuesday.

Air Raid Sirens To Herald 'Attack' In Washington

SEATTLE (UP)—Residents here, and in some other cities in Washington, will hear air-raid warning sirens sound an evacuation signal for the first time sometime during the next weekend.

D. E. Barbey, State Director of Civil Defense, said the signal—a three-minute steady blast—will be sounded sometime between 4 a.m. Friday and Sunday afternoon as part of a statewide "surprise" test.

A limited degree of public participation has been asked.

Radio and television stations will be notified to broadcast word that the signal indicates a test and "not the real thing," Barbey said.

Two hours after the evacuation signal, a "take cover" signal will be sounded. This will be a three-minute wailing or warbling note, indicating that attack is imminent.

301 Selected for First Air Force Academy Class

WASHINGTON (U)—The Air Force Monday named 301 cadets for the first class of the Air Force Academy, opening July 11 at Lowry Air Base, Denver.

They were selected from more than 6,000 nominated by members of Congress to take the competitive entrance examinations.

The academy will operate at Lowry Air Base until its home at Colorado Springs, Colo., is ready for use, expected in the fall of 1957.

Solon Urges Second Atom Powered Ship

WASHINGTON (U)—The chairman of the House Merchant Marine Committee urged Monday that the United States build a "practical" atomic-powered merchant ship as well as the "Mississippi River showboat" proposed by President Eisenhower.

Rep. Bonner (D-NC) and other members of the committee did not come out against Eisenhower's plan to build an A-ship and send it around the world as a demonstration of how atomic energy can be put to peaceful uses.

But Bonner said the group is more interested in an experimental vessel which would be economically feasible and "actually carry some freight."

What the President apparently has in mind, Bonner said, would be some kind of an "international sideshow, carnival or Mississippi River showboat."

He announced he would introduce a bill for the construction of a second ship. He was backed at once by two Republicans: Rep. Tolleson of Washington, senior GOP member of the committee, and Rep. Cederberg of Michigan. Eisenhower hasn't yet asked Congress for the funds to carry out his idea, outlined in a speech three weeks ago.

The committee received a report Monday from Dr. W. Kenneth Davis, director of the Atomic Energy Commission's Reactor Division, on the prospects of developing atomic power plants for merchant vessels.

Davis said the plant proposed for the Eisenhower ship would be almost the same as the one installed in the atomic submarine Nautilus.

Churchill Sees World Peace Hope in New Kremlin Faces

WOODFORD, England (U)—Former Prime Minister Churchill said Monday night new faces in the Kremlin may mean renewed hope for the world's masses "who wish to dwell in peace."

The 80-year-old statesman gave his analysis of the world situation in a spirited campaign speech in this district he has represented in Parliament for a generation. He expressed great satisfaction with the agreement in Vienna last week end to hold a top-level Big Four conference such as he has been seeking for five years.

Monday night's speech marked Churchill's first personal participation in the campaign to get the voters to retain his Conservative Party in power in the May 26 election.

Pointing out there have been great changes in the Kremlin in the last two years, he said:

"We have a new scene. New men are masters in the Kremlin. 'It is by no means certain that there is not another 'new look' on other faces behind them which may still be most beneficial to the overwhelming masses of people all over the world who wish to dwell in peace with one another. . . . He did not spell out exactly what men and forces he had in mind. But he may have meant that Marshal Georgi Zhukov, wartime ally of the West and now Soviet defense minister, has taken a strong policy-making hand in Russia and is vetoing projects that might lead to a general war.

Churchill congratulated his successor, Prime Minister Eden, on the chances for a Big Four meeting "at the summit."

He said the united and strong Western Big Three powers can go to the meeting "seeking peace of the world, the welfare of all mankind, and that period of relaxed tension, disarmament, and all-round, prosperity which is within our reach and may soon be within our grasp."
