Minimum Pay Ballot Title Now Complete

Ballot title for a proposal of the recent Legislature which would remove from the original state constitution adopted in 1859 establishing the minimum annual salary of the governor and secretary of state at \$1,500, state treasurer at \$600 and justices of the State Supreme Court at \$2,000, was completed by Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton Friday.

The proposed repeal will be referred to the voters at the next general election.

A proposed amendment referred to the voters by the 1955 Legislature would remove the prohibition against the state being interested in the stock of any company, association or corporation to the extent of permitting the state to accept, hold and dispose of any such stock which is donated or bequeathed to the state.

Ballot titles for all referred measures and constitutional amendments are drafted by the attorney general's office.
