## New Globes for Israel Printed in Hebrew Tongue

CHICAGO (UP) — A Chicago manufacturing firm announced it has turned out the first terrestrial globes ever made using Hebrew text. An order from the Israel government called for 15,000 units, including both eight-inch political globes and 10-inch physical models. L. I. Replogle, president of the firm, said the models show about 1,500 place names. To insure accuracy, his firm's cartographers worked closely with a printer and a scholar in Tel Aviv. The globes, the firm said, will be used primarily by Israeli school children.
