

Sport Goods Store By Riverside Park Okehed by Council

Salem City Council Monday night cleared the way for a retail sports store development in West Salem near the Wallace riverside park. Aldermen adopted a change in an existing sewer pipeline easement which will permit construction of a 60 by 120 foot store building on Wallace Road between Edgewater Street and the railroad tracks. Attorney W. W. McKinney said this project would require 18-foot footings, some of them along the easement strip, but not interfering with the actual pipeline. He said the proposed sports goods store would be operated by Gil Ward. Owner of the property is J. J. Russell. The Council also completed legislative action to deed an acre of city airport property to the state, for its construction of a building for the State Board of Aeronautics. The city is making no charge for the property but is reserving the right to reclaim the acre if the state ever abandons it as an aeronautics building site.

Presbyterians Okeh Plan to Ordain Women

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Presbyterians Monday approved a proposal to ordain women as ministers and criticized what they call a Roman Catholic "trend to exalt the figure of the virgin mother." The 167th general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America approved the women-preachers proposal by a standing vote. The preponderance in favor appeared about three or four to one. The proposal now goes to the church's 256 presbyteries, or local groups, for a final vote. Approval by the 905 voting delegates followed lively debate. Proponents declared, "The Bible teaches 'In Christ Jesus there is neither male nor female.'" Opposition arguments included: (1) Women are confused as to their intended role in life and (2) a woman couldn't give a church the strong leadership it needs.

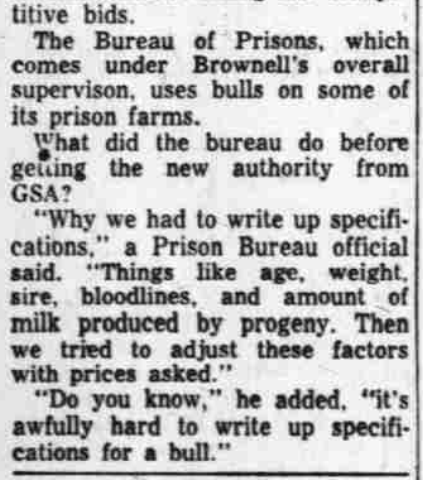
The statement critical of the Catholics was adopted by an "aye" vote, with no "noes" heard. There was no debate. The statement, prepared by the Presbyterians' Permanent Commission on Interchurch Relations said in part: "The festival in honor of the Virgin Mary, which marked the Marian Year of 1954, set in bold relief the status now accorded to the mother of our Lord in Roman communion. The pros and cons of ordaining women provided the liveliest business session yet for the assembly. The assembly moderator, Dr. Paul S. Wright of Portland, Ore., good-humoredly urged delegates as discussion became spirited to "think clearly and not to become too emotional. This is an important matter, not a rally."

Death Penalty For 'Turnpike Killer' Upheld

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UP) — The Pennsylvania Supreme Court Monday rejected the appeal of John Wesley Wable, 27, sentenced to die in the electric chair as the "phantom killer" of the Pennsylvania Turnpike. In an opinion written by Associate Justice Horace Stern, the high court affirmed the death penalty imposed on the baby-faced defendant, a former Fayette County farm hand, last Dec. 28. Wable, of Ohio, Pa., was convicted March 13, 1954, of the murder of Harry F. Pitts, Bowling Green, Va., who was shot to death July 28, 1953, as he slept in the cab of his parked tractor-trailer near the Donegal interchange of the toll road. The state contended Wable also was the robber-gunner who killed Lester B. Woodward, 26, Duncannon, Pa., as he slept in his truck along the toll road near Irwin, Pa., three days before Pitts, and seriously wounded John P. Shepherd, 35, West Alexandria, Pa., under similar circumstances near Libson, Ohio, a week later.

Brownell Allowed To Buy Bull Minus Competitive Bids

WASHINGTON (UP) — The General Services Administration Monday granted Atty. Gen. Herbert Brownell Jr. authority to buy a bull without asking for competitive bids. The Bureau of Prisons, which comes under Brownell's overall supervision, uses bulls on some of its prison farms. What did the bureau do before getting the new authority from GSA? "Why we had to write up specifications," a Prison Bureau official said. "Things like age, weight, sire, bloodlines, and amount of milk produced by progeny. Then we tried to adjust these factors with prices asked." "Do you know," he added, "it's awfully hard to write up specifications for a bull."

Murder Inc. Boss Guilty of Tax Evasion

CAMDEN, N. J. (UP) — Dapper Albert Anastasia, variously described as the leader and trigger man of the notorious New York "Murder Inc." mob, changed his mind in Federal Court Monday and pleaded guilty to income tax evasion. The 50-year-old Anastasia, smiling as he stood before U. S. District Judge Thomas M. Madden, said he was guilty of failing to pay \$18,743 in income taxes for the years 1947-48, as the government charged. Beyond that he said nothing in his two-minute court appearance. And to newsmen afterward he brushed off all questions with "No comment." Madden, set to preside at Anastasia's retrial scheduled for May 31 here, continued bail at \$10,000 and ordered the ex-convict—who has faced five murder indictments—to appear for sentencing June 3. Anastasia faces a possible maximum sentence of five years' imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine on each of two counts.

Chicken Prices Topsy Turvy

PORTLAND (UP) — Buyers were paying more for chickens at the farm Monday than they were at Portland processing plants. This unusual situation resulted from keen competition for frying and roasting chickens. T. E. Fallhee of the federal market news service said buyers were offering 28 to 29 cents a pound at the farm, while the price stayed at 28 cents at the plants.

Tigard Pedestrian Dies on Highway 99W

PORTLAND (UP) — Nels Berg, 68, Tigard, was killed while walking along Highway 99-W near Roamers Rest, southwest of Portland, Sunday night. Police said he had been brushed by a car, then struck and killed by another car.

Ike Says GOP Follows Line of U.S. Founders

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Eisenhower said Monday night the Republican Party may be a minority party on a statistical basis, but it is not expounding a minority doctrine in upholding principles of the founding fathers and the rights of "free Americans."

"We are not trying to go back to horse cars," Eisenhower said. "We are not trying to fly to Mars." He said the Republicans are trying to advance the interests of a prosperous America by applying the experience of the past to problems of the future.

The chief executive spoke informally at a GOP "kickoff for 1956 dinner." A crowd estimated by party officials at 1,600 gave the President a ringing chant of "We want Ike."

Chlorine Gas Leak Plagues Michigan City

MONTAGUE, Mich. (UP) — Evacuation of this Lake Michigan community was averted Monday after workmen throttled a chlorine gas leak at the 15-million-dollar Hooker Electro Chemical Plant here. Billowing clouds of the deadly gas rolling from a broken pipe led to an erroneous report of a fire at the plant's liquefying vat half a mile from the city limits. Firemen said the pink-tinged gas clouds gave the appearance of fire. The gas line break occurred at about 1:30 p. m. Montague city officials quickly ordered the town evacuated, but only 300 school children actually were removed before the gas line was repaired two hours later. Axel Pederson, Muskegon County sheriff, said the break occurred as workmen were repairing lines from the liquefying vat building. Shutoff valves were closed immediately to check the flow of escaping gas. Four workmen were overcome by the gas. They were revived at the plant dispensary. All were reported in good condition.

P38 Dedicated To Maj. Bong

POPLAR, Wis. (UP) — A World War II P38 stood in Poplar today as a memorial to Maj. Richard I. Bong, "America's ace of aces." More than 5000 persons gathered here Sunday to dedicate the memorial to the air ace who shot down 40 enemy planes in the South Pacific. Bong, a native of Poplar, died at the age of 24, 10 years ago when his jet plane crashed in California on a test flight. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl T. Bong, unveiled the P38. The plane, of the type Bong flew, has stood here for years without being officially dedicated.

Labor Leader Speaker at Baptist Meet

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (UP) — A Kentucky labor leader told the American Baptist convention Monday night that automation is a boon to mankind and will lead to a two-hour work day. Factories operating almost automatically with little human labor will send living standards soaring, Albert Whitehouse said in a speech prepared for the 1,600,000-member convention's annual meeting. Whitehouse, director of District 25, United Steelworkers of America, (CIO) is also a vice president of the National Council of Churches. He is a member of the First Christian Church of Covington, Ky. Earlier, Frank A. Nelson, a Racine, Wis., manufacturer, was nominated for the presidency of the convention. His election Tuesday is assured since he is unopposed. Others nominated: Matthew W. Hill, Olympia, Wash., first vice president.

Land Bought for 99W Bypass of Central Corvallis

CORVALLIS (UP) — A key land purchase to make possible rerouting Highway 99W to a stretch along the Willamette River bank drew approval of the City Council in a special Saturday night meeting. The proposal is for the city to put up \$55,000 and the State Highway Commission \$45,000 in buying the 17 acres on which the Corvallis Lumber Co. is located. The company closed recently because of lack of logs. The proposed highway location would bypass the business district. The present highway runs through the business section.

PORTLAND (UP) — Allan L. Brown, 8, was injured fatally when struck by an automobile as he attempted to cross a street here.

Indian Relocation Bill Sponsored By Sen. Morse

WASHINGTON (UP) — Indian families soon to be flooded out of their traditional home at Celilo Falls by construction of The Dalles Dam would be relocated at federal expense under terms of a bill introduced Monday by Sen. Morse (D-Ore). The bill calls for relocation by the Department of the Interior and authorizes transfer of \$210,000 from the secretary of Army to secretary of the interior to carry out the program. Morse, terming the Indians "a casualty of the march of progress," said they are without funds or other means to obtain new homes. He said that he and Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore), who co-sponsored the bill, would seek prompt action on it.

Canada Forest Blazes Rage

HALIFAX, N. S. (UP) — Forest fires raged in two Canadian provinces Monday and officials said only a break in weather conditions could halt the flames in the tinder-dry woodlands. Near Chapeau in Central Ontario, more than 100 square miles of bush country was a charred ruin as the province's biggest fire since 1948 continued out of control. The Lands and Forests Department pressed more than 2,400 men into service over the weekend to fight 85 fires in Ontario, but 80 were still burning late Monday, seven out of control. Liverpool continued to be a danger spot after being hard hit Sunday. More than 14 fishing boats and 70 buildings were destroyed by flames there.
