

County's Health Department Seeks \$136,875 to Operate

A budget of \$136,875 to operate Marion County's Health Department next year was outlined Tuesday before the county court and budget committee.

The county's share of the budget would be \$72,916, as compared to the \$58,236 provided by the county last year. Remaining funds necessary for health department operation come from several sources, including the city of Salem and several school districts.

The department outlined its most pressing needs as adequate office space, salary adjustments to meet merit-system standards with six salary steps, and additional personnel.

A request for \$8,000 for rent, County Health Officer Willard

Stone said, would allow the department to seek new facilities considered essential to maintain public health services. The department currently occupies about 2,400 square feet in the Masonic Building. About 5,000 square feet are considered necessary, the budget committee was told.

Budget considerations Tuesday morning were devoted largely to discussion of salaries for county road crews who submitted a three-point request calling for a 25 cent per hour pay raise, adjustment of salaries to provide equal pay for equal work and provision to allow accumulation of sick leave up to 90 days.

21 Represented
The requests were voiced by Leo Butts, general representative of the Oregon Public Employees Council, an affiliate of the American Federation of Labor, speaking for 21 county road crew members also were present.

"The question," Butts said, "is not are we going to charge taxpayers more, but are we going to build more roads subsidized by road employees?"
Butts said road employees had not had an increase in take home pay since 1951, a statement which was questioned by County Judge Rex Hartley who quoted raises given out at the past five budgets.

Workers, however, maintained that pay increases have been offset by cutting out Saturday work, eliminating time and half pay.

Salaries Low
Road crew salaries for shovel operators, dozer operators, graders and common laborers, Butts said, are about \$1 below those paid in industry. He also said that at present some persons start to work at a higher hourly wage than others who have been with the county for several years.

At present, the county pays \$1.81 for a shovel operator, \$1.76, dozer operator; \$1.56-1.81, grader; and \$1.41, common laborer.

Manton Carl, former budget committee member and Hubbard-area farmer, who attended the meeting, spoke out against any raises, commenting that "those who pay the bill say that if there is to be any change at all it should be a reduction."

Difficult Time
Carl pointed out that some farm labor is receiving 90 cents an hour and that the farmer is having a difficult time meeting his expenses now.

Before the morning hearing on road crew requests, the budget group had heard proposed budgets from County Engineer John Anderson, County Agent Ben Newell, Civil Defense Director Wallace Wharton, and Ridley Miller, veterinarian's service officer.

Newell's budget request calls for a \$1,022 increase over last year; the veterinarian's office wants an additional \$600; and the civil defense request is for the same as last year, \$9,500.

The catapulted balloon crashed through a window and Carolyn Heckman, 19-year-old Portland co-ed, was cut slightly by flying glass. No charges were preferred after the students agreed to cease fire by dismantling their "Big Bertha."

Relations Between Surgeon-General, Dr. Salk Strained

WASHINGTON (AP) — Problems of the polio immunization program seem to have imposed some strain on relations between Surgeon General Leonard Scheele and Dr. Jonas Salk, chief developer of the vaccine.

Salk did not attend a session of scientists Monday to discuss the problems. Questioned Tuesday by reporters, he would not say why he was absent but said "Scheele knows." He added the reason was not, as had been previously reported, that he had other commitments.

When Scheele in turn was asked about Salk's absence, Scheele said: "Ask Dr. Salk; I'm not the person to say why he was not here."

High School Graduating Units Okehed

Salem District School Board Tuesday night gave its tentative approval to high school graduating classes of 239 students at new South Salem High School and 319 at North Salem High.

For the first time Salem will have two public high school commencements—both Monday night, June 6, in the respective school auditoriums.

The lists of graduates submitted by the school principals were approved for award of diplomas, conditional upon the completion of the year's school work by the 538 seniors. The total compares with 549 graduates a year ago when the last single graduating class received diplomas.

Commencement Speakers
Commencement speakers will be Dr. Frank Bennett, president of Eastern Oregon College of Education and former Salem schools superintendent, at South Salem High, and Mark Hatfield, Willamette University dean and a state senator at North Salem.

In another major action at the regular school board meeting last night at the School Administration Building, the board appointed Harry Mohr as teaching principal for the new Candalaria elementary school next year.

Mohr joined Salem School District faculty in 1940 and has taught and coached at Leslie Junior High since 1942. He is now completing work on a master's degree.

\$7,000 Landscaping Job
The board authorized landscape architect Arthur Erfeldt, Portland, to proceed with detailed plans and specifications for a \$7,000 landscaping of South Salem High School grounds on which bids will be called in time for fall plantings. Meanwhile, work on the lawn contract is underway at that school.

School directors looked over preliminary plans of varied tree, shrub and ground cover around the new school and adjacent Leslie Junior High. Among features of it were yellow azaleas on the south side, cotoneaster and juniper varieties for banks, a dozen flowering cherry trees for the "blank wall" at northwest corner, use at appropriate spots of beech, pine, oak, sweet gum and other trees.

Other board actions:
Bids ordered called on folding doors to divide Parrish gym; station wagon, panel delivery and pickup truck; asphalt tile flooring for the Candalaria, Auburn and Richmond school projects now under construction; acoustic material for North Salem High halls.

Final approval to the \$5,177-321 school budget for next year, including total \$2,676,644 tax levy. Nobody appeared at the final hearing.

Church Informed
Informed Capital Baptist Church that school board policy wouldn't permit use of Morning-side School for church purposes during this summer, as requested; because other churches are located in the vicinity and Leslie Methodist Church is planning to build across the street.

Set a new policy that high school as well as junior high school students could remain for their final year at a school they had been attending even if their family moves into an area served by the other resignations from teachers Ralph Hassman and Mrs. Charles Oeding.

Hired as teachers Mrs. Vivian Wilcox, a Pocatello, Idaho, elementary teacher the last 19 years; John W. Jacobs, 39nd High School teacher six years, for science teaching; Glen Harold Smith, Woodburn, now at Willamette University for master's degree, to teach English and speech; Glen Mick, Harrisburg principal two years, as a teaching principal for Halls Ferry School; Richard G. Buckovic, Seio High School teacher, as substitute for agriculture teacher William McKinney next year; new college graduates Mrs. Ellen Bailey, Enterprise; Kayrene Butler, Corvallis; Jesse Presley, Corvallis.
