

Ike Asks Congress To Liberalize 1953 Refugee Relief Law

WASHINGTON (U) — President Eisenhower asked Congress Friday to liberalize the 1953 Refugee Relief Act and "reaffirm that the great tradition of sanctuary lives in America."

He requested 10 changes in the law, which has been criticized frequently as so restrictive as to be self-defeating.

Global Plan for Disarmament Asked of U. S.

BONN, Germany (U) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer called on the United States Friday to submit a new global disarmament plan to the Big Four conference this summer.

He spoke in a lower house debate that wound up with rejection of a Socialist proposal to postpone arming of West Germany as the newest member of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). The vote, 244-145, in favor of the proposal, was a surprise.

The Chancellor said, however, that world disarmament must be the primary and decisive issue when President Eisenhower, British Prime Minister Eden, French Premier Edgar Faure and Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin hold their "meeting at the summit."

Virgil T. Heath, who lived his boyhood in Gates, has been named Bureau of Land Management supervisor for Oregon.

Heath, who assumed his new duties last week, was transferred from Washington, D.C., where he had been BLM assistant chief for forest since 1953. His new offices are in Portland.

Heath worked in the logging woods of the Northwest and California from 1922 to 1935, and in 1935 graduated from Oregon State School of Forestry.

He then accepted a position with the U.S. Forest Service in Alaska, remaining there until 1952, when he transferred to Medford for a year's service there as district forester.

At Portland, Heath fills a vacancy created when Gwynne H. Sharer resigned to accept a position with a forestry firm.

Representatives of nine Marion-Polk area cities attended the latest in a series of League of Oregon City meetings held Friday night at the Senator Hotel.

The meetings in the current series are designed to acquaint members with legislative measures applying to municipalities. Also discussed Friday night were problems peculiar to cities and the matter of long-range planning.

City Manager J. L. Franzen, Salem, and Herman Kehrl, Eugene, executive secretary of the league, presided at the meeting. Some 50 persons attended. Ray Coulter, field and legal representative for the organization, reported on legislation and heading the discussion on planning was Mark Westling, Eugene, planning a public work consultant.

Farm Group Plans Meeting Here in July

The Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, its eye on the state's tax picture, will call a special meeting here in July to consider House resolution No. 4—the application of the emergency clause to tax measures.

Decision to hold the meeting was made Friday night at a session of the federation's board of directors at the Senator Hotel.

Reason for the special meeting will be to determine the degree to which new tax measures would apply to farmers.

Said federation president Ben Robinson, Imbler, Ore.: "Our goal is to see that every farm bureau member has opportunity to discuss the pro and con of tax issues so the federation can make a firm stand, one way or the other."

Also in line for possible discussion at the coming meeting will be the federation stand on the sales tax—a measure the organization now reportedly favors with reservations.

The directors Friday night reaffirmed their stand on the need to include the Pacific International Exposition in plans for Portland's proposed new recreation center.

Public Health Plans Outlined

A continuous public education program to combat tuberculosis and other diseases was outlined at a Friday noon meeting of the Marion County Tuberculosis and Health Association executive board.

Reports on programs aimed at improving public health, standards were given by Mrs. L. S. Shuford, health education committee; Lynn Woods, Christmas Seal sale committee; C. A. Schaefer, industrial health committee; and Mrs. Robert Gangware, who will have charge of leadership training courses for family life discussion groups.

Yearly medical examinations including chest X-rays and a rehabilitation program in aiding former tuberculosis patients were among programs outlined.

Garden Worker Suffers Attack
