### Sweet and Sour

#### Grocer Now has Sour Cream for Everyday Use in Sauces, Desserts

Sour cream, which is a comparatively new product for the grocer's dairy case, fills a need created by modern pasteurization of sweet milk and cream. Since most milk is put through this process, which slows down bacterial action, women have found difficulty in souring milk and cream and have had to resort to the artificial souring by use of vinegar or lemon juice. This gives the same effect as naturally soured product but just does not taste as good.

So now again we can go back to grandmother's recipes, where sour cream gave a certain flavor that can't be limited in home-made sour cream.

Here for instance is a frozen dessert that uses sour cream, and which has luscious flavor.

**MACAROON MOUSSE**  
2 cups sour cream 1/2 cup sugar  
1 square unsweetened chocolate 1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup sugar 1/4 cup macaroon or cake crumbs  
Blend sour cream with chocolate that has been melted over hot water. Add sugar and remaining ingredients and pour into refrigerator tray. Freeze until mushy, stir and beat with a spoon then return to freezing unit until firm. Serves 4.

You can make a mighty good chocolate frosting with sour cream like this:

**CHOCOLATE CREAM FROSTING**  
3 squares semi sweet chocolate 1/2 cup sour cream  
2 tablespoons sugar 1/4 cup chopped nuts  
Melt chocolate in double boiler. Add sugar and sour cream. Blend thoroughly and either fold in nuts or sprinkle over top of icing when on cake. This will frost a 9-inch cake.

Or you can use your sour cream on fruit thusly:

**BROILED PEACHES**  
6 peach halves, fresh, frozen 6 tablespoons brown sugar  
en or canned 6 tablespoons sour cream  
Arrange drained peaches in a baking pan. Fill hollows with blended brown sugar and sour cream. Broil under low heat for 5 to 10 minutes.

Both cream cheese and sour cream appear in this recipe for asparagus:

**CREAM CHEESE ASPARAGUS**  
2 pounds asparagus, fresh 1 teaspoon lemon juice  
1 package cream cheese 1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup sour cream 1/4 teaspoon pepper  
Cut asparagus in 1/2 inch pieces, discarding tough pieces. Cook in water until tender, drain. Blend cheese, sour cream and the lemon juice until smooth. Heat slowly, stirring constantly. Add asparagus and salt and pepper. Cook 5 minutes. Serves 4 to 6.

And finally, it goes into macaroni:

**MACARONI AND CHEESE**  
4 cups cooked macaroni 2 tablespoons chili sauce  
1 cup sour cream 3 drops tabasco  
1 cup cottage cheese 3/4 teaspoon garlic salt  
1/2 cup chopped onion 1 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Combine macaroni with sour cream, cottage cheese, onion and seasonings. Turn into greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees) for 50 minutes. Serves 6.
