Verna Hiskey, member of Powers Creek 4-H Club east of Silverton, topped her nine competitors for first place in the 4-H Showmanship contest Saturday at the Marion County Jersey Cattle Show.

This is one of the big youth events of each year's show and taken part in by both 4-H Club members and Future Farmers.

Winning second place was Linda Lee of Aumsville and George Darland, Middle Grove, placed third. Vernon Vogt was first place winner in the Future Farmers' division.

Early Breeder

An interested visitor at the show, in addition to many at Salem to attend the American Jersey Cattle Club Convention now in session, was S. W. Atkins, who was one of Oregon's earliest breeders, having 100 head of registered Jerseys at his Spring Hill Jersey Farm at Newberg, a half century ago. Present too, were the three remaining charter members of the Oregon state club and the Marion County club, Henry Zorn of Aurora, Warren Gray of Marion and Stanley Riches of Turner.

Rossmore Farm of Mt. Angel took all four championships, although the grand champion bull, Imp. Keepers Prince Designer, is owned by Stanley Levin, who has managed Rossmore for the past two years. His lease expires June 1.

Junior Champion

Junior champion was Glen-dow Aims Intensifier, owned by Rex Ross, owner of Rossmore farm, and who will again manage it after Wednesday.

Grand champion cow was Brookside Galintha Twinkle, bred by Floyd Bates of Salem, and bought three years ago as a calf by Ross at a state sale at Pacific International Livestock ring in Portland.

A junior yearling heifer, Design Lofty Craig, won for Rossmore the junior female championship. Also coming out of the junior yearling heifer class was Valiant Design Twinkle, which won the junior championship in the 4-H division for Joe Kloft of Salem. Larry Klein, Aumsville won senior 4-H champion on Kings' Lucky Jewell, an aged cow.

Three Firsts

Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Brock of Salem, took three firsts out of the four groups in competition. In the production cow class first went to Radar, Golden Blonde with 619 pounds of butterfat at a four year old. They placed first in senior get of sire on the get of Imported Radar and first in produce of dam on the offspring of Radar Starlet Prince. Verna Hiskey placed first in Young Breeders' herd.

At the close of the judging, Lawrence Gardiner of Memphis, Tenn., who had placed all of the animals, was presented with a Pendleton blanket from the Marion County club, Rex Ross making the presentation.

There will be no June wedding bells for Eddie Fisher and Debbie Reynolds, although the singer says he and Debbie still are engaged. The wedding is postponed indefinitely.

They have a problem. Between now and June 17, when Debbie is due to start working in a new movie, Eddie hopes to go to Hollywood to discuss it with her. Now he glumly admits things aren't going smoothly, but he refuses to say why.

"I think it is something that should be just between Debbie and myself," the singer said in an interview in his hotel apartment. "Everyone has things to discuss, don't they? That's the reason for an engagement."

Engaged Last October

Their engagement was announced formally last October at a big Hollywood party.

Now a lot of plans have changed. The 26-year-old singer says he can't move to California, because his television show has to come from New York City. Debbie took off on a plane trip, but in the opposite direction from Eddie. She went to Korea to entertain, and is due back this weekend.

"She called me one day and said she was going to Korea," Eddie said. "I was surprised. I think it's great for her to do it, naturally."

He has had regular letters from Debbie since she left. "From Hawaii, from Wake Island, from Formosa... all over."

Constant Attention

The constant attention they got wherever they went had nothing to do with their big problem, he insisted. Eddie is almost stubbornly loyal to the public that turned him from a poor Philadelphia teen-ager into a wealthy, popular singer.

He doesn't date other girls, he says indignantly, "because I'm engaged." Two weeks ago he splurged on a white Mercedes-Benz sports car, and he's getting ready to move to a new apartment with a terrace.

It'll still be a bachelor apartment, though.

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Old Fire Engine Returning Home

ALBANY, N. Y. (UP)—The Lansingburgh fire engine — "pride of the bucket brigade days of 1791" — is going home.

The 164-year-old pumper is still in working condition but hardly the type to cope with a bad fire these days. It was retired many years ago and taken over by the state museum in Albany because the city of Troy had no room to house the venerable machine.

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Disney Productions Report on Earnings

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Walt Disney Productions, which introduced the extremely successful "Disneyland" weekly television program this year, grossed \$9,876,175 in income for the six month period ending April 2, 1955.

In a letter to stockholders, President Roy O. Disney reported the figure was more than double the \$4,331,827 grossed for the same period last year. Net profits for the 1955 period totaled \$430,048, Disney said.

Coon Rejects Criticism of John Day Dam

WASHINGTON (UP)—Rep. Coon (R-Ore) Saturday fired back at critics of his bill for joint local-federal construction of John Day Dam, declaring:

"When it gets down to talking facts, you'll notice that the opposition suddenly runs away and starts yelling about 'giveaways' and 'partnerships'."

He made his remarks in a radio broadcast to be released in Oregon Sunday.

Principal critics of the Coon proposal have been Oregon's Democratic Sens. Morse and Neuberger. It provides means for local utilities to pay an estimated 90 per cent of the dam's 310 million dollar cost—that portion chargeable to power generation—in return for which they would be given 50-year contracts for the dam's power output.

"All this bill is," Coon said, "is a practical way to get the dam built now without having to wait for Congress to appropriate the money."

Coon also mentioned the proposed series of debates to be held by himself and Neuberger this fall on merits of the bill.

"This subject is so important, particularly since it has been so distorted by those who would keep away from Oregon much needed public works projects, that it should be explained at every town and hamlet and crossroads of the entire district," he declared.

"It is my sincere hope," Coon added, "that Senator Neuberger will read the bill before we begin the debates."

Jordan Says Libby Dam Not Feasible

MISSOULA, Mont. (UP)—Former Idaho Gov. Len Jordan said Friday the proposed Libby Dam in Montana is not feasible due to difficulties in arriving at agreement with Canada on plans for the storage reservoir.

Jordan told members of the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Committee, "We should not close our eyes to the possibility of working out a cooperative agreement" with Canada.

Frederick Stueck, a member of the Federal Power Commission, told the CBIAC meeting that President Eisenhower's policy of encouraging private enterprise in building dams has encouraged a greater development of power resources.

Stueck said this has been indicated by a greater number of applications for licenses to build dams. Applications on file now are for dams with generating capacity almost double those in applications on file two years ago, he said.

The chairman of the Interstate Committee on Water Resources said many of the current applications are for projects in the Northwest.

Jordan is chairman of a committee which made a special study for the American section of the International Joint Commission on U. S. and Canadian potential projects on the Columbia River and its tributaries.

Pipeline Diggers Equipped With Geiger Counters

BOISE (UP)—Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp. isn't overlooking the possibility of finding uranium as it lays a pipeline from the San Juan Basin of Colorado and New Mexico to the Pacific Northwest.

Vice President Robert R. Her-ring said Friday that the digging machines were equipped with Geiger counters, and a subsidiary uranium company has been formed—just in case.

Solons' Debate Topic Widening

WASHINGTON (UP)—The subject matter of that projected series of debates between Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) and Rep. Coon (R-Ore) may be widening.

An offer to sponsor one of the series by the Oregon Toastmasters Club of Portland mentioned the Hells Canyon issue rather than the original question — the merits of Coon's bill for joint local-federal construction of John Day Dam on the Columbia River.
