

All-Jersey Milk Drive Advances

Oregon's All-Jersey Milk program is making national progress, according to reports given Monday at the board meeting of the American Jersey Cattle Club in annual convention here this week. Headquarters are the Marion Hotel.

D. I. Dean, national milk committee chairman, Champaign, Ill., reported that Ohio and Pennsylvania were the latest two states to join the program, purpose of which is to promote All-Jersey products.

Originating in Washington State a few years ago, the plans reached a stand-still and on July 1, 1950 were revived in Oregon. "We are trying to give the states all the leeway they need," D. T. Simons, Fort Worth, Tex., national president said. "Each state sets up its own All-Jersey Milk standards under its own laws. Our only requirement I hope will remain that the product be completely All-Jersey."

The annual business meeting will be held Wednesday with the election of officers and other convention business. Club politics do not rate high, members stated, as only one position offers competition. Nominees for president and three regional directors are uncontested. These include Simons as a re-election for president; Stanley N. Chittenden, New Lebanon, N.Y., for Northeastern director; J. K. Stuart, Bartow, Fla., for Southeastern director; and Evan Reese, Waco, Tex., for Southwestern director.

Four nominees are seeking the one vacancy in director-at-large, a position held this past term by Roy McDonald, a newspaper editor from Chattanooga, Tenn.

Seeking this spot are W. N. Burney of Aurora, Mo.; John L. East of Zachary, La.; Matt Jennings of Fayetteville, Tenn.; and Joe Wittmeier of Onondaga, Ala.

Registration Tallied During the 1954 fiscal Jersey year the national club registered 53,442 native born Jersey females, 499 imported from Canada, 86 imported from the Isle of Jersey and 27 from other countries. In addition, 5,893 native bred bulls were registered, 71 from Canada, 15 from the Isle of Jersey and 14 from other foreign countries.

Oregon ranks ninth with 2,003 animals, Ohio leading with 5,159.

Overcross Due In Court Today

Casper Overcross will be arraigned in Marion County Circuit Court today on the charge he shot and killed his one-time neighbor Ervin Kaser last Feb. 17.

Overcross, who is being held in the Marion County jail on a first-degree murder charge, is expected to enter an innocence plea immediately after hearing the indictment returned May 16 by a grand jury which investigated the Silverton area slaying.

The Silverton carpenter was brought back Sunday from Fairbanks, Alaska where he had been employed on a construction project until turning himself over to authorities May 20.

Capone Gang Leader Dies Aboard Yacht

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Louis (Little New York) Campagna, notorious Capone mobster in the 1930s, died Monday after a heart attack aboard a pleasure cruiser at sea. Campagna, 54, suffered an attack aboard the vessel Nellie. A Coast Guard helicopter removed him from the ship, off the south-east coast of Florida, and brought him to the mainland. He died in Mercy Hospital here.

Police said the death was "from natural causes." Often arrested on a variety of charges, but rarely convicted, Campagna was an original body-guard of the kingpin mobster, the late Al Capone.

Campagna was last convicted in December 1943 in New York with Charles (Cherry Nose) Gioe and five others for conspiracy to extort one million dollars from movie executives. He served one-third of his 10 year sentence and was paroled.

Under questioning before the Senate crime committee headed by Sen. Kefauver (D-Tenn.), Campagna said his bookmaking operations in suburban Cicero netted him about \$30,000 to \$50,000 a year before he was convicted in the movie extortion case.

At last report, Campagna owned and lived on an 800 acre farm near Fowler, Ind.

Campagna's wife, Charlotte, wired for his body to be sent to Chicago.

Soviets Hold Fighter Edge, Twining Says

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Although the U. S. maintains a narrow advantage over Russia in long-range bomber superiority, the Soviets do hold an edge in fighter aircraft, Gen. Nathan F. Twining, Air Force chief of staff, said Monday. Visiting at nearby Virginia Beach for three days of golf during the Memorial Day week-end, Twining told a reporter that "We are not particularly concerned over this fact." He implied that superiority of American type fighters more than offsets the difference in numbers.

The Air Force chief also voiced deep interest in a public statement by a Texas Democrat, Rep. George H. Mahon in the House to the effect that he would ask for an additional \$200 million to step up bomber production.

"That would be a big help," Twining said.

Twining said the B52 program is "not necessarily behind schedule," but recent developments in Russia have indicated that a step-up in production is prudent. "We're producing so much for each eight-hour day, but of course the 200 million dollar appropriation would help," he observed.

He revealed that the Air Force is "ahead of schedule on establishing its mid-1957 goal" of 137 combat wings. However, to accomplish this goal, the Air Force will have to trim back the manpower volume of some support wings and groups.

Wadsworth Not Gun-Toting Type

SPOKANE (AP) — Wadsworth V. Martin, a graduating senior at Spokane's North Central High School, has been receiving mail from the army, navy, air force, marines, and various trade schools, asking for applications.

But Wadsworth just doesn't shape up as the gun toting type. Wadsworth is more interested in ballet, and ballet isn't listed among the opportunities offered by the service.

Besides, Wadsworth, a descendant of poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, is blond, eighteen — and a girl.

AMA Requests Doctors Accept Polio Program

CHICAGO (AP) — The American Medical Assn. announced Monday it has asked its members to cooperate in a voluntary government priority plan for polio inoculations of children 5 through 9 and "the vaccination program will move ahead."

Dr. Walter B. Martin of Norfolk, Va., president of the AMA, said "The AMA has been assured that technical problems relating to the safe manufacture of polio vaccine have been worked out, and the vaccination program will move ahead."

In a statement released through AMA Chicago headquarters, Dr. Martin said "The rechecking of manufacturing procedures and laboratory data following the outbreak of polio in a few vaccinated children has caused unavoidable delay."

"In the midst of such tension, the Eisenhower administration is to be commended for conducting a careful and scientific review of the entire situation before permitting continuance of the program."

"In behalf of myself and the AMA board of trustees, I have assured President Eisenhower that the nation's physicians will cooperate in 'limiting polio vaccination to children from 5 through 9 until the vaccine is available in larger supply."

Factory Burns At Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — Damage was estimated at \$40,000 in a fire at the Western Foam Latex Co. in the Northwest Portland industrial district Monday.

The blaze was discovered at about 3 p.m., and raged out of control for almost an hour before firemen subdued it.

Cause of the blaze was not determined immediately.

Berry Picker Supply Good

PORTLAND (AP) — No shortage of pickers is expected for this year's strawberry crop, a spokesman for growers reported Monday.

Transient pickers already are arriving from California and students and family groups are expected to round out the crews. He estimated that some 27,000 will be employed by mid-June in Multnomah and Washington counties.

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Debbie's Mom Denies End Of Romance

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Debbie Reynolds' mother Monday branded as "a pack of lies" reports that her actress daughter was mailing the ring back to crooner Eddie Fisher.

A columnist quoted Debbie's brother, Bill, as blaming Fisher's manager for the break-up of the highly-publicized romance.

The brother, reached on the reports, admitted that he had talked with the columnist but said: "I don't know anything about this. I would never stick my nose into Debbie's affairs."

Mrs. R.F. Reynolds said her son is a sound engineer at NBC-TV while the columnist, Sheila Graham, is the star of her own TV show there.

"Bill, naturally, felt he had to talk with her when she got him in a corner but the answers he gave are not the ones that were printed."

The Hollywood story, quoted the brother as saying that Debbie had informed him from Honolulu that she was mailing the ring back to Fisher because "she wants a man, not a puppet."

Mrs. Reynolds said if Debbie should fall out of love with Fisher or vice versa, "they'll hear it from each other first, not through the newspaper. This whole story is a pack of lies."

British Rail Strike Strands Thousands

LONDON (AP) — A nationwide rail strike overshadowed the sunshine of booming Britain's Whitsun holiday Monday. It threatened a quick — if temporary — slide in the austerity of the postwar years.

Thousands of holiday tourists trying to get home from seaside were stranded in London late Monday night. More than 30,000 arrived from Kent and Sussex play-spots in buses and by hitch hiking, only to find there were no trains in which to complete their journey home.

Hundreds of weary travelers bedded down for the night on the wooden seats of railroad station waiting rooms.

The liner Queen Mary arrived at Southampton from New York with 1,227 passengers — and no boat trains to carry them. Three hundred got away by car. Special buses took nearly 400 more. About 500 stayed on board for the night awaiting more buses Tuesday.

In London, Labor Minister Sir Walter Monckton and other members of a "crisis committee" met to find ways of keeping the nation's lifelines open.

The strike started at midnight Saturday, with 70,000 locomotive engineers and firemen walking off the job demanding more pay. Monday night no peace move was in sight.

Chinese Reds Asked to Free 52 Others

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States called on Red China Monday to follow up the release of four American fighter pilots by granting freedom "swiftly" to 52 other Americans held behind the Bamboo Curtain.

At the same time the government welcomed the releases as a start toward relieving international tensions.

India's special ambassador, V. K. Krishna Menon, who broke the news of plans to release the pilots, has told U. S. Ambassador John Sherman Cooper at New Delhi that he believes other Americans, particularly 11 other airmen, will soon be freed.

The State Department issued this announcement after the news came through from New Delhi:

"The United States government is gratified that the prolonged and unwarranted separation which these airmen and their families have endured with such great patience and fortitude will soon be brought to an end.

"It is the earnest hope of this government that the release of these airmen signifies the intention of the Chinese Communist regime to act swiftly to release the other American citizens, civilian as well as military, whose continued imprisonment in Communist China has profoundly aroused the American people.

"Such action on the part of the Chinese Communist regime would eliminate one cause of international tension."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nearest relatives of the four U. S. airmen released by the Chinese Communists will be flown to Honolulu to greet them for a "reunion," the Air Force announced Monday night.

Secretary of the Air Force Talbott said he had talked personally to the relatives of the airmen and all had accepted his invitation to make the flight.

The families will travel together in a special plane, Talbott said, with all their expenses paid by the Air Force. The plane will leave from here and pick up the families enroute to Honolulu.

Talbott said the fliers will be given a thorough physical checkup in Hawaii and then flown home to the mainland with their families.

The secretary said his move was taken so that the relatives "may enjoy the earliest possible reunion with these officers."
