

Rep. Coon Denies Agency Prepared John Day Dam Bill

WASHINGTON (Special) — Rep. Sam Coon (R., Ore.), had "expert technical consultation during the preparation of the bill" he is sponsoring for "partnership" construction of John Day Dam, but any suggestion that he played no part in drafting the bill is "false," declared Coon.

This was the eastern Oregon congressman's reaction to a newspaper story reporting that the inspiration for a scheduled series of debates between Coon and Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D., Ore.), stemmed from a doubt in Neuberger's mind that Coon was author of his own bill.

"It was said that I had no part in the preparation of the legislation and further, that information on the legislation is being prepared by some agency other than this office," said Coon in a prepared statement.

'Charges False'

"I wish to categorically state that both of these charges are false," said Coon. "Of course, I had expert technical consultation during the preparation of the bill. No one person is well enough informed on technical

Tito Unyielding; Slav-Russ Document Shows

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Yugoslavia signed a declaration of principles with the Soviet Union Thursday night, but President Tito apparently did not yield an inch of his independence.

Nikita S. Khrushchev, Communist Party boss in the Soviet Union who came here a week ago pleading for a political reconciliation with Tito, will leave Friday empty-handed, judging from what is now known.

Khrushchev, who led the six-man Soviet delegation here and did most of the talking, didn't even sign the declaration. He sat smiling at the green baize table of the Gardijski Dom (Guards palace) Thursday night, a Hero of the Soviet Union Medal prominent on his lapel, as Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin scratched his name with Tito's on the document.

Not Mentioned

Relations of the Communist parties in the two countries were not even mentioned in the declaration. The principle points it made were:

1. Yugoslavia supports "the satisfaction of the legitimate rights of the (Communist) People's Republic of China with regard to Taiwan (Formosa)."
2. Yugoslavia and the Soviet Union support a settlement of the German question "on a democratic basis, in conformity both with the wishes and desires of the German

people and with the interests of general security."

3. Both governments support "a system of collective security in Europe based on a treaty."
4. The role and authority of the United Nations should be strengthened, and Communist China should be given a seat in the U. N.
5. The two governments have decided to conduct their future relations "in a spirit of friendly cooperation" and conclude arrangements for improving economic relations.
6. "Respect for the sovereignty, independence, integrity and equality among states in their mutual relations and in their relations with other states."
7. "They (Russia and Yugoslavia) have agreed to take further steps toward the normalization of their relations and the promotion of cooperation between the two countries, convinced that this lies in the interests of the peoples of both countries and is a contribution both to the decrease of international tension and to strengthening of peace in the world."
8. The two countries favor the "furtherance of mutual and international economic cooperation and

peaceful coexistence among nations regardless of ideological differences or differences of social order. . . . Compliance with the principle of mutual respect for, and non-interference in, internal affairs for whatever reason, whether of an economic, political, or ideological nature. . . ."

9. They condemn aggression and "all attempts to subject other countries to political and economic domination."
10. They recognize "that the policy of military blocs increases international tension, undermines confidence among nations, and augments the danger of war."
11. They hold that "all nations should make further efforts to achieve positive results and agreements in negotiations on questions so vital for the peace of the world as the reduction and limitation of armaments and the prohibition of atomic weapons."
12. The countries agreed to "take the measures necessary to do away with the consequences arising from the disruption of a normal treaty basis in the economic

assistance to underdeveloped areas through the United Nations."

13. To "facilitate cooperation among the social organizations of the two countries," they called for "the exchange of socialist experiences and a free exchange of opinions."
14. Nothing Startling (In Washington, the State Department declined immediate comment on the joint statement, saying more time was needed to study it and receive reports from American diplomats on the scene. But responsible U. S. officials said privately there seemed to be nothing new or startling in the vague declarations.)
