## Hoover Commission Advises Reduction in U. S. Foreign Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Hoover Commission told Congress Sunday that the U. S. foreign aid program "despite many mistakes and waste, should be continued" but on a narrowed and reorganized basis.

Seven of the 12 Commission members attached a separate statement that called for "immediate substantial reductions," an evident plea for cuts in President Eisenhower's 3 1/2 billion dollar aid program now before Congress.

The main report, entitled "Overseas Economic Operations," declared that no more economic or technical aid should go to the European countries who were charter members of NATO—the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

**'Japan Excepted'**  
And, it said, no manufacturing or large industrial development should be projected for the "Asian-African arc" with the possible exception of Japan.

The original NATO nations have received about 50 billion dollars from this country since World War II.

The Commission, under the chairmanship of former President Herbert Hoover, was set up by Congress to look for ways to save money and to recommend government reorganization where necessary.

The Commission endorsed Eisenhower's plan to liquidate the Foreign Operations Administration (FOA) on June 30 and to shift its central function to an International Cooperation Administration (ICA) in the State Department.

**Smaller Sphere**  
However, it assigned to the new ICA a smaller sphere than Eisenhower had suggested. It proposed that 11 of FOA's operating duties be handed over to other existing agencies.

The report took an unusual form. In addition to it, the Commission put out a statement saying four of the dozen members were absent when the report was adopted. Yet 11 members signed various dissen- tments and statements— all but the chairman, former President Herbert Hoover.

The seven who demanded reduced appropriations—actually a majority of the Commission—pointed out that the 3 1/2 billions requested for the fiscal year beginning July 1 is 750 millions more than this year's figure and that more than half of the total is earmarked for economic rather than military aid.

"Surely, after 10 years, the time has come to apply some brakes to this overseas spending program," said the group, which included Sens. McClellan (D-Ark.) and Bridges (R-NH) and Rep. Brown (R-Ohio).

By contrast, Rep. Holifield (D-Calif) attacked a dissent attacking many of the formal recommendations as being an unwarranted intrusion in foreign policy.

**WCTU Sponsors Contest on Study Of Alcoholism**  
CHICAGO (UP)—An inter-collegiate oratorical contest, with state and national awards, will be sponsored by the National Women's Christian Temperance Union to encourage young people to study alcoholism.

Mrs. Glenn C. Hays, president, said state contests will be sponsored by the state branches of the WCTU in interested colleges and universities. State winners, she said, will be eligible to enter the national competition.

The contests are to promote research among young people on the harmful effects of drink in all spheres of life, she said.

The national winner will be awarded \$150, with \$100 and \$50 going to second and third place winners.

## Revolutionary Ridding Drive Sweeps China

HONG KONG (AP) — A new Communist campaign against "counter revolutionaries" is sweeping Red China from Kwangtung Province in the South to Inner Mongolia in the North. This is reported by Communist China's own newspapers.

The newspapers reaching Hong Kong contain long and frequent accounts of arrests, public trials and executions of "enemies of the people and the state."

In Shansi Province, 41 members of a "riot conspirators" gang were put to death recently. Apparently they were involved in unrest arising from food shortages.

Inner Mongolian newspapers reported that in one town authorities had ordered the arrest of 14 fugitives accused of counter revolutionary crimes. One account said:

"Five kinds of counter revolutionaries—bandits, secret agents, reactionary parties and cliques and chiefs of reactionary sects—are hiding somewhere locally without being brought to law."

(This indicated trouble within the capital of Inner Mongolia. The town listed was Hubehot, presumably Hubehot, the name the Communists gave a couple of years ago to Kweisui. At the time, Peiping Radio identified it as the capital of Inner Mongolia.)

## Paper Claims Davy Crockett Capitalist Tool

SEATTLE (AP) — Readers of the West Coast newspaper, The People's World, must be wondering if they ought to turn in their Davy Crockett hats.

It seems, according to the newspaper—which often has been identified in official inquiries as being Communist dominated—that Crockett was a tool of some confusing capitalistic conniving before he bowed out at the Alamo.

"It is ironic," the paper said in Saturday's edition, "that Crockett, sent to Washington by Western frontiersmen and then taken in tow by Northern capitalists, finally died for the power and the glory of Southern slave owners."

"Crockett, of course, did not sense the irony, nor is there any evidence of any perception on his part of where the Alamo fitted into the scheme of American history."

And, as if that weren't bad enough, Crockett's boast of killing 105 bears in a year showed that "in a wasteful Western tradition, Davy was something of a game hog."

That's what the paper said, kids. Any of you want to turn in your coonskins?

## Dental Health Ignorance Hit By Association

CHICAGO (UP) — Many children are growing up to be dental cripples because ignorance about dental health is still too widespread, according to the president of the American Dental Association.

Dr. Daniel F. Lynch, Washington, D. C., said "the toll taken by dental decay alone in terms of tooth loss, difficulty in eating, blighted appearance and even facial deformities is staggering and needless."

Lynch said emphasis on children's dental health is the only sound approach to the nation's dental problem.

He urged that the following procedures be carried out for all children to help promote life-long dental health:

1. A nutritious diet low in sweets.
2. Proper use of the toothbrush right after eating.
3. Early detection and treatment of dental defects to prevent more serious ills later.
4. Fluoridation of community water systems to reduce dental decay among children by as much as 65 per cent.

## Coroner Dies In Multnomah

PORTLAND (AP) — Dr. F. Floyd South, 63, the Multnomah County coroner, died at his home Saturday night, apparently of a heart attack. His office will be filled temporarily by Dep. Coroner Earl Shea until the county commission appoints a successor.

South was coroner from 1941 to 1945 and from 1949 until his death. A physician and surgeon, he served in the Medical Corps in World War II and also was a veteran of World War I.

He was graduated from the University of Oregon Medical School and started his medical practice in Portland in 1924. He was a member of the medical school surgical staff and served with the State Board of Health from 1935 to 1939. He was a lifelong Democrat.

## Man Arrested For Alabama Bank Robbery

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — A Florida man accused of participating in an \$86,727 Alabama bank robbery was arrested Sunday after police checked reports a "heavy spender" in local bars and nightclubs had given a waitress \$300 and told her to "bet it on anything you want to bet on."

Thomas Navarro Pendley, 22, Clearwater, Fla., was arrested by federal, state and local officers. A federal warrant had charged him with taking part in the robbery May 20 of the First National Bank at Jacksonville, Ala.

Two other men had been arrested earlier in connection with the holdup and a fourth is still sought. Pendley surrendered meekly, emerging with hands up from the apartment of a night club waitress where he had taken refuge. Bismarck Police Chief Don E. Schoneman said the man was unarmed.

A search of a room he had rented here disclosed a .32 caliber pistol, a .410 shotgun and a suitcase containing ammunition. Schoneman said another suitcase Pendley had taken to the apartment of the waitress, Dorothy Marsden, contained \$6,015 and that \$500 was found in a dresser drawer in Pendley's room.

Chief Schoneman said a routine search had already been underway due to the man's "heavy spending" when authorities learned he was wanted in the Alabama robbery.

The chief said Pendley admitted his identity, but told officers he obtained the money from gambling.

## Gunman Robs Store In Vancouver, Wash.

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — A masked gunman escaped with an undetermined amount of money Saturday night from the Valley Farms market and creamery here. The bandit, armed with two pistols, fled in a green pickup truck belonging to one of the market employees.

## Downed Flier Nearly Passed For Russian

HONOLULU (AP) — Capt. Harold E. Fischer said Sunday he tried to pass himself off as a Russian pilot when he was captured in the Korean War.

"It was just a bluff, but it darn near worked," Fischer said in an interview. He also disclosed that his Sabrejet was not shot down but apparently was disabled by debris from a MIG he blasted.

"When they grabbed me, I made out like I was outraged," he said. "I told them — in what I thought was a thick Russian accent — 'You can't do this to me.'"

"Some of the Chinese swallowed it and looked like they wanted to let me go, but then they found my plane."

Fischer, 30, a Swea City, Iowa, farm boy who rose to be a double jet ace in the Korean War, was reunited in Honolulu with his parents last week. He and three other U.S. pilots were released by the Reds at Hong Kong Tuesday.

When his captors found the wreckage of his plane, Fischer said he thought the end had come. "I found it isn't hard to die," he added, "once you feel certain that you're going to die."

## Plane Retraces Historic Route Of Lewis, Clark

WALLA WALLA (AP) — A four-place plane, "The Princess Black-eagle Special," left here early Sunday en route to St. Louis and a retracing of most of the historical Lewis and Clark route.

The plane carried Pilot Dr. C. Don Platner, of Walla Walla, Princess Norma Jean Blackeagle of the Nez Perce Reservation at Lapwai, Idaho, and James Durgan of Olympia, representing Gov. Arthur Langlie.

The plane is due in St. Louis just before noon Monday.

The party will be guests at a civic function arranged by the Chamber of Commerce and the Federation of Churches for the presentation of a Bible. The flight symbolically re-enacts the trip in 1804 to St. Louis by Chief Blackeagle of the Nez Perce Tribe and one of Norma's forbears.

The Bible will be flown back to Walla Walla and will be used at the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of 1855 here next Saturday and Sunday.
