

Meat Cookery Show Tuesday

Martha Logan in the person of Miss Julia Ohnysty, a member of the staff, will conduct a cooking show Tuesday night at North Salem High School, in which meat cookery will be featured. The show is at 7:30 and free tickets may be obtained at participating food stores.

The program will be an extensive one, including a number of unusual recipes for cooking meats. A fully-cooked ham will be glazed, a chicken will be marinated in lemon and fried in the oven, and meat roasting will be discussed.

The home economist will prepare a frankfurter crown roast and arrange a table-ready meat plate. Another showy dish will be a braunschweig pineapple, and yet another, cheese bread.

The meat expert will discuss buying, storage and cooking of many meats. Those attending the evening show will receive Martha Logan's meat cookery book.

The Northwest Grocery Co., valued at more than a million dollars, will join United Grocers, Inc., valued at more than two million. The separate names will be retained, but headquarters will be in United's big new depot near Milwaukie, Ore.

The consolidation becomes effective June 13. Northwest has cash-and-carry depots in Portland, Oregon City, Salem and Eugene. United serves grocery retailers in Oregon and Southwest Washington.
