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Tax Money Uses Given In Pamphlet

Oregon's State Tax Commission has an answer to the often asked question of "Where does the tax money go?"

It's all wrapped up in a concise 16-page pamphlet put out recently by the valuation division of the Commission to answer just such questions and the companion queries of "Who's responsible for high taxes?" and "What can I do about taxes?"

The pamphlet is available on request from the Commission and is being distributed to assessor's offices for public use.

Graphs and charts show where tax moneys go. Duties of taxing districts, county assessor and county sheriff in the application of property tax are explained. Tax terms like market value, true cash value, assessment ratio and assessed value are interpreted in simple terms. Procedures for legally protesting what may be considered as tax inequalities are outlined.

In short it gives most of the answers to tax questions except one—"How Do I Pay Them?"

Maison Plans to Retire As Guard Division Chief

Maj. Gen. H. G. (Fod) Maison, commander of the northwest's 41st Infantry Division of National Guard for the past four years, will retire from the post this summer, closing a civilian-military career stretching over 37 years.

Maison, who is also superintendent of the Oregon State Police, served nearly 24 years with the famed Sunset Division, joining the National Guard first as a second lieutenant in 1924 after World War I duty as an aerial gunner.

Successor to Maison, who took command of the 41st November 20, 1951, has not been announced, but the new division commander will come from Washington in a two-state agreement which provides for transfer of command between Washington and Oregon every four years. After Enactment

Retirement of Maison is expected to come shortly after the annual summer encampment of the division, scheduled for June 11 to 26 at Ft. Lewis, Wash. Legal details of the transfer of command may take several weeks, according to Maj. Gen. Thomas Rilea, Oregon adjutant general.

The 57-year-old general was born at Portland and is a graduate of the University of Oregon. He joined the state police in 1931 and was appointed deputy superintendent in 1937. He was appointed superintendent in 1946, a job he still holds.

Maison's military career covered many units of the 41st Division and went on active duty when it was activated in 1940. When the division went overseas to the South Pacific in 1941 he was a battalion commander of the Third Battalion, 162nd Infantry Regiment. In 1944 he was transferred to the 6th Infantry Division, commanding the 63rd and 20th Infantry Regiments before becoming assistant division commander in 1945.

Maison was promoted to brigadier general and given the post of assistant commander of the 41st Division Feb. 26, 1946. He held that position until assuming command from Maj. Gen. Raymond Carroll in 1951.

Much decorated, Maison wears the Silver Star, Bronze Star with cluster, Purple Heart, Combat Infantry Badge, Southwest Pacific Ribbon with arrow and three campaign stars, Philippine Liberation Ribbon with star, Distinguished Unit Badge with cluster and Philippine Service Ribbon. He also is one of few American officers to hold the Order of the British Empire for valor.

Herrera Given 2 Years Probation

Henry (Enrico) James Herrera was placed on two years' probation Monday on a forgery charge lodged against him in April. Herrera, who was returned here from Portland where he was being held by U.S. immigration authorities, pleaded guilty to the charge. He was arrested for passing a forged check for \$28.50. Herrera's address was given as Mexico City.

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Keizer Teacher Takes Post at Bryan University

Miss Mary L. Hammack, native of Oregon and Salem area teacher for the past 11 years, has been named assistant professor of education at Bryan University in Dayton, Tenn.

Miss Hammack received her bachelor of science degree from Oregon College of Education in 1945 and a master in education degree from the University of Oregon in 1949. Part of her graduate study was done at the University of Nottingham, England.

She taught at Keizer Grade School during the school year just ended.

Subdistricting Ballot Title Completed

Ballot title for the Marion County subdistricting proposal was completed Monday by the attorney general's office.

Under an act of the recent Legislature, the voters of Marion County will decide at the next general election whether to adopt a plan of electing state representatives by districts. Two would be elected from Salem and a group of suburban precincts; the other two Marion County representatives from remainder of the county.

The ballot title reads "Purpose: To divide Marion County into two state representative subdistricts and to provide for the election of two representatives from each subdistrict."

Ballot titles also were prepared on the proposed state constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to prescribe qualifications for office of county coroner and county surveyor, and on the proposed amendment to boost state legislators' salary from \$800 to \$1,200 a year.
