

U. S., Japan Swap Tariff Concessions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has agreed to swap tariff concessions with Japan so the Japanese won't become dependent on Red China for trade.

Acting under President Eisenhower's tariff cutting authority, the government has decided to reduce duties on 131 million dollars worth of Japanese goods, ranging from Christmas tree bulbs to tuna.

At the same time, the Eisenhower administration also agreed to cut tariffs on some 48 million dollars worth of machinery, raw materials and equipment from 16 other countries, partly to encourage them to lower duties on Japanese goods.

In return, Japan agreed to reduce its tariff duties on nearly 50 per cent of the goods it imports from the United States — affecting some 397 million dollars annually in American exports.

The Japanese-American agreement, signed at Geneva, Switzerland, Wednesday, after nearly four months of negotiation, was the first ever concluded with Japan under the 1934 reciprocal trade law.

The State Department, announcing it Thursday, termed it a "notable achievement in the President's foreign economic program."

State Department spokesmen, aware of domestic fears of competition from cheap Japanese goods, said the tariff cuts would not imperil vital American industries or create unfair competition.

Hot Weather Hikes Salem Water Demand

Water use in Salem more than doubled when the hottest sun since 1952 started baking the city this week.

Drain on the city water supply was 18 1/2 million gallons Wednesday and probably at least that much Thursday, reported City Water Manager John Geren.

The 24-hour consumption figure is read at 9 a.m. each day.

This compares with a daily consumption of 7 or 8 million gallons which had been consistent for several weeks until just a few days ago.

Water was being delivered on demand with no difficulty, and the early torrid spell served to make entirely satisfactory testing of two new water pumps in the city system, Geren stated.

"We just couldn't have kept up the pressure and provided enough water on the Kingwood and Candalaria Heights without those new pumps," Geren said.

He explained that many new families have been added to water service in those areas in the past two years. There wasn't a water problem last year because relatively mild weather prevailed all summer.

The additional 1,000-gallon-a-minute pump on Candalaria helps keep storage capacity up while water demand is high. The 750-gallon pump which replaced a smaller one serves the Kingwood water tank the same way. Both were installed this spring.

Geren reported that water level in the big Turner hill reservoir, which measures about 600,000 square feet at top, was down about 1.3 feet.

But this reservoir is so big the water level can drop 20 feet without trouble, Geren explained, and this normally allows the city to pick a good break in the weather to refill the storage lake by the mains from the Santiam River.

The water use was no record, but was considered very high for June, which comes far ahead of peak canneries and other industrial use of water. Late-summer hot days, with cannery water use, have drawn as much as 22 million gallons.

Dallas Kids Flock to New Swimming Site

DALLAS—Youngsters flocked to the city park at the west end of Academy street in droves late this week as Rickreall creek was dammed for swimming.

The dam, together with associated concrete walls and diving boards, forms the municipal swimming pool. Its installation is the highlight of early summer park activities each year.

Lifeguard this summer is Ed Callier, high school instructor. His services were made possible through funds raised by the Dallas Woman's club, Red Cross and the city. Swimming classes will be available later in the season.

Government plans to inaugurate a pilot program to train personnel in the field and to do increased research work were also explained by Hill.

Area's Fire Districts Ban Open Blazes

Recent fire-hazard weather has prompted Salem area fire districts to issued orders prohibiting unauthorized burning of trash or other material out of doors.

The orders, issued by the city of Salem, the Liberty-Salem Heights fire district, and the Four Corners and Keizer fire districts, go into effect in those districts today.

Outside burning may be done in enclosed containers, such as a steel barrel with a cover, or in adequate incinerators. For other type of burning, such as large trash piles or grass, permits must be obtained.

Salem residents may obtain permits at city hall or any of the city's outlying fire stations, according to Fire Chief Ellsworth Smith.

Liberty-Salem Heights residents may obtain permits from Chief Norval Hiron or from Neale Cheney at Dickson's Market. Chief at Keizer is John Mekker.

Permits in the Four Corners area may be obtained at the Four Corners Barber Shop and Four Corners Hardware Store during business hours.

Zhukov Hopes To Continue Writing Ike

MOSCOW (AP) — Marshal Georgi Zhukov said Thursday he hopes to keep up his "very nice exchange" of letters with President Eisenhower, whom he described as an old military friend.

The Soviet defense minister made the statement at a gay British embassy garden party in honor of Queen Elizabeth's birthday. Premier Nikolai Bulganin was also there and tossed off a number of toasts with British Ambassador Sir William Hayter.

Zhukov was in a cheerful mood as he chatted with reporters. He was asked what was in the correspondence, which Eisenhower confirmed at a news conference in Washington on April 27.

"We have agreed for the time being not to reveal the contents of our correspondence," Zhukov replied.

Eisenhower, indicating Zhukov initiated the correspondence, has declined also to disclose the contents. That, Eisenhower said, was up to Zhukov. When reporters pointed this out, Zhukov made a remark about a secret agreement.

Police Probe Traffic Death Of Eugene Tot

EUGENE (AP) — State police continued an investigation Thursday into the traffic death of five-year-old Fred Terry, Jr., of Eugene, but had found no indication of criminal action.

The boy was killed when he ran between two parked vehicles into the path of a car driven by Rama Tiffany, 17. She said there was no time to stop after she saw the youngster.

The driver of one parked vehicle said he had motioned to the boy to cross after looking to see that the road was clear. The boy hesitated, he said, then dashed out into the road. The driver said that he had looked carefully and was absolutely certain at the time he motioned to the boy it would be safe for him to cross.

Attlee, Eden In Feud Over Rail Strike

LONDON (AP) — Labor leader Clement Attlee accused Prime Minister Eden Thursday of mishandling the nationwide railway strike and said his policy could worsen Britain's industrial crisis.

Eden angrily denied the charges. "Their exchange threw the opening session of the new House of Commons into an uproar. Cheers and catcalls came at intervals. To the cheers of his supporters, the 72-year-old Socialist chieftain said Eden "perhaps inadvertently put forward a new doctrine (in a radio broadcast last Sunday) that no negotiations can take place without a return of the strikers to work."

He seized his first opportunity to attack the Conservative government's handling of the crippling strike by 67,000 engineers since the Conservative's decisive victory over the Labor Party at the polls May 26. Eden struck back immediately.

"I do not think Mr. Attlee has given an accurate account of the broadcast. There is no question of laying down a new doctrine at all. It was never in my mind that there should be no discussions or conversations of any sort before work was resumed, and they are in fact at this moment going on."

Representatives of the striking Associated Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen (ASLEF) and the British Transport Commission, which runs the state-owned railways, held their first full across-the-table talks since the strike over wage differentials began 12 days ago. After two hours, they adjourned until Friday.

Huge Sulphite Mill Planned At Cosmopolis

ABERDEEN (AP) — A 20-million-dollar-plus sulphite pulp mill is being planned for nearby Cosmopolis by the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. Plans still are in the formative stage, company President J. P. Weyerhaeuser, Jr., said Thursday. They call for completion of the 400-ton capacity sulphite mill in 1957 and it would give work to about 300 persons, he added.

About 300-500 men will be employed during construction. After the mill is completed, additional employment will be created at the firm's Willapa, Clemons and South Olympic tree farm properties, as wood requirements of the plant are established, Weyerhaeuser said.

The plant is being designed to produce bleached sulphite paper pulp for sale to paper board and paper manufacturers. Bleached sulphite is a major raw material used by paper mills for writing, printing and other high grade papers and paper board.

Wallace Road Rail Track Repair Planned

A Southern Pacific work crew from Albany will make repairs to the company's track crossing on Wallace Road in West Salem, beginning Monday, it was announced Thursday.

The work, on ties and rails, will last two days, during which time traffic will be detoured via Edgewater, Patterson Ave. and 7th St. The crossing will be closed from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m., open other hours both days.
