## Tests Show 186 County Pupils Need Treatment for Hearing

One hundred and eighty-six Marion County elementary school pupils were found to need medical attention for their hearing in tests completed recently by the State Board of Health.

Another 98 were said to need watching for possible hearing defects that might show up later. The tests were conducted from January to March in schools of North Marion County.

All told, 4,139 pupils from

grade one to junior high school age were tested. Those singled out will be examined again in next year's program, to be arranged by Dr. Maurice D. Vest, director of the state board's maternal and child health section, who will arrive in Salem June 1.

Dates for the new series of tests are expected to be decided during Dr. Vest's visit. The tests will include Salem elementary school pupils and all new first graders in the remainder of the county.

Object of the program is to detect hearing defects before they become too serious. The project is sponsored by the state board, in cooperation with local and county health officials, and school officials.

Marion County health officials said that out of 267 singled out in 1953 for possible hearing defects, all but 82 showed improvement when re-tested this year.

## 2 Apprentice Pipe Fitters to Enter Contest

Robert W. Mentzer, pipe fitter apprentice, and James D. Goetzinger, plumber apprentice, both of Salem, will compete with several others from over the state in a competitive examination at Oregon State College June 18.

Apprentice making the highest score will be eligible to enter the international contest at Purdue University in Indiana in August and compete for nearly \$2,000 in prizes.

The Oregon contest is sponsored by the state master plumbers and pipe trades association; the international contest by United Association of Journeymen and Apprentices of the plumbing and pipe fitting industry of the United States and Canada.

The contests are an annual affair.

## Man Held Here On California Larceny Charge

A Long Beach, Calif., man now in Marion County jail on a petty larceny charge was ordered held Thursday for extradition to California on a robbery charge.

LaVern E. Griffith, 30, was taken to Marion County district court and Judge E. O. Stadler Jr. ordered him held for Long Beach officials until June 16.

Griffith, Sheriff Denver Young said, was convicted of the robbery charge in Long Beach and was out on bail awaiting sentence when he came to Oregon. The California charge was placed against him after he allegedly took \$20 and a bottle of whiskey from a woman.

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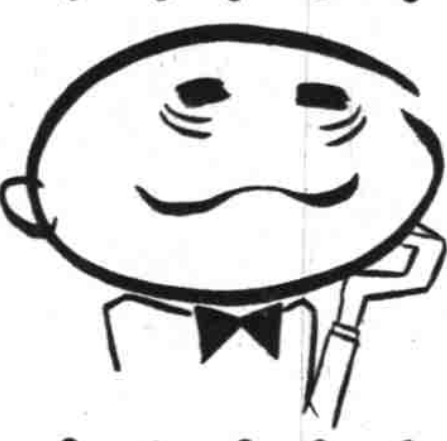
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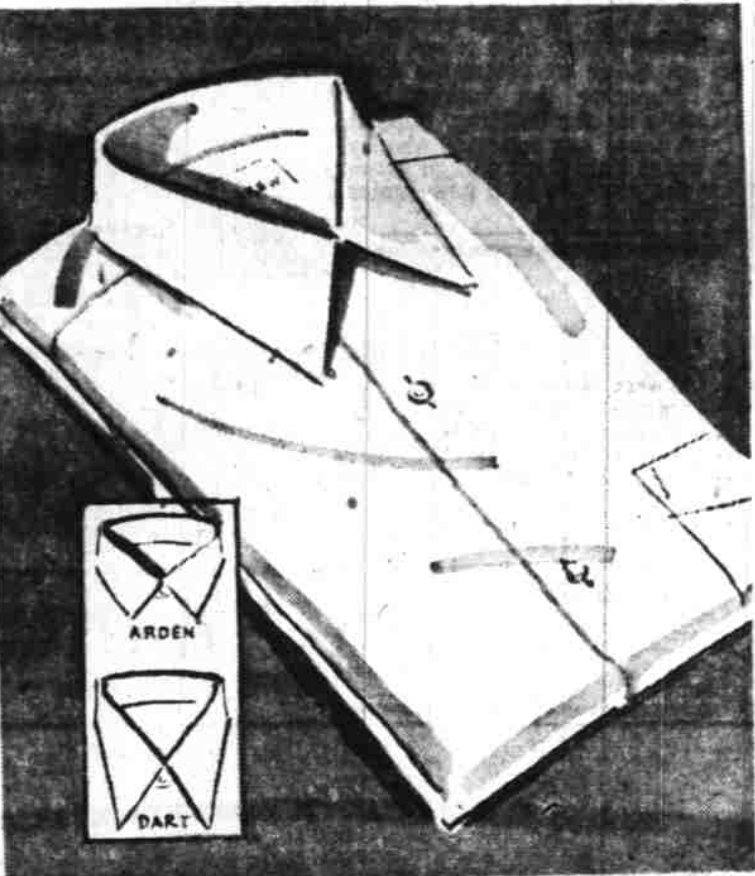
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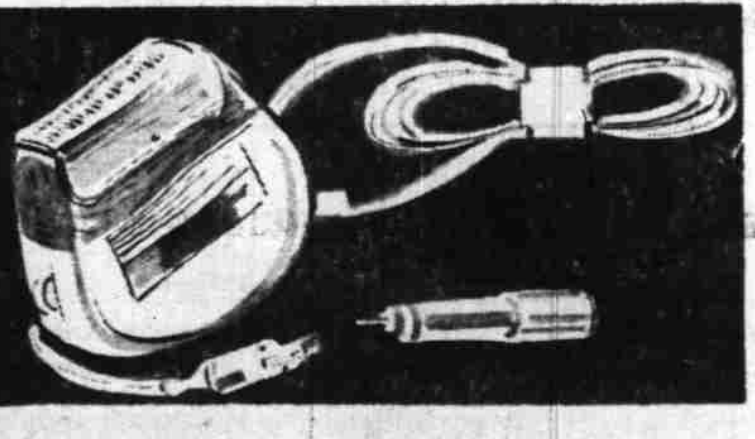
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
