## Traps for Little Bugs

## Litter Barrels Spotted on Oregon Routes

"Deposit Litter Bags, 1/4 Mile," is the inscription on signs the motorist will see at more than 150 Oregon highway locations this summer, according to an announcement by R. H. Baldock, State Highway Engineer.

Over 150 green-painted barrels, with white-painted "Deposit Litter Bags" have been placed at strategic places along Oregon's 7,500-mile highway system in the Department's effort to cut down on costs of keeping the state's highways clean.

Several major oil companies and field offices of the Secretary of State are cooperating in this effort by providing handy litter bags which may be hung conveniently inside cars for the disposal of waste papers and other garbage.

The Highway Department feels that many people will use the litter barrels to dispose of the garbage, save the bag and use it again for another trip.

There are a large number of trash barrels, which have been installed in previous years, and which the Highway Department is also repainting and converting to litter barrels. Signs are being placed a quarter-mile on each side of the barrel locations so that the driver may have plenty of time to slow down and take advantage of them.

## Wheat Quota Referendum Talks Slated

Explanations of the wheat marketing quota referendum will be made at four meetings in the Willamette Valley this week. The referendum itself will be held nationally on June 25.

First of the four meetings will be held Monday night in the Linn County court house in Albany at 8 o'clock. The second meeting will be held Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Dallas City hall for Polk County wheat growers. Marion County growers will meet Thursday night, 8 o'clock, in the Marion County Courthouse in Salem, and Yamhill County growers will meet Friday at 8 p.m. in the Yamhill Fair Building in McMinnville.

Attending the meetings will be Marion Thomas, state college marketing specialist; representatives of the wheat league, the agricultural stabilization and conservation offices and the extension service. Growers will be given an opportunity to ask questions.

When the referendum is held, at least two-thirds of the votes cast in the nation (this will be held the same day throughout the United States' wheat growing areas) must be affirmative to continue the marketing quotas in effect for each farm on which there is an allotment. If the quotas are passed, the price support will remain at a level between 75 and 90 per cent of parity and will be available to each farmer who complies with the rules.

If the referendum is defeated, there will be no marketing quotas and penalties on excess wheat, but acreage allotments will remain in effect as the basis for price support eligibility. The important thing is the price support will be at 50 per cent of parity, and will be available to farmers who comply with their wheat acreage allotments.

While it is anticipated that the vote will carry in the affirmative, there are a number of farmers who have expressed the hope that penalties on the excess wheat will be removed. Because
