

Officer Kills Payroll Bandit, 3 Persons Shot in N. Y. Chase

NEW YORK (UP)—A policeman killed a payroll bandit and three other persons were wounded Tuesday in a wild gun battle witnessed by thousands in a crowded commercial district a few blocks from City Hall.

The holdup man, fleeing with a \$4000 payroll snatched from a 19-year-old girl messenger in a build-

ing lobby, was killed by a motor-cycle patrolman after an exchange of bullets which ripped through the windshield of an occupied automobile.

Before he was killed, the bandit shot a building elevator man who went to the rescue of the payroll messenger; grazed a woman passerby with a bullet aimed at the policeman, and shot another passerby who attempted to nab him.

An unidentified FBI man also went to the patrolman's assistance, but didn't fire a shot. He was unhurt.

Girl Screamed

Diana Panzer, 19, clerk and typist for the Lincoln Letter Service, said she had left a bank for her office with the payroll wrapped in a plain brown paper envelope.

"I noticed a man following me," she said. "When we got into the ground floor hallway, he grabbed me. I screamed. I thought his gun was a toy pistol."

As the elevator man, Joseph Sotolana, 43, ran to her aid, the gunman fired, dropping Sotolana with a shot in the groin, and fled with the payroll.

Motorcycle Patrolman Aurelio de Filippi, 28, had stopped for a red light at the corner.

Shouts at Cop

"I heard a shot," de Filippi said. "I jumped off my bike and ran after a man I saw running."

A passerby, Detrick Eberhard, attempted to halt the bandit and was shot by him.

The bandit then shot at the policeman, Adele Lambert, 50, a state industrial relations investigator, walked into the path of the bullet. She was hit in the neck not seriously.

"He barricaded himself behind a parked station wagon and fired one shot at me," de Filippi said.

"I got behind a truck with an FBI man."

Windshield Hit

In the station wagon, two terrified men threw themselves to the floor of the car.

"Soon as we did a bullet came

through the windshield just at the driver's seat," said Edward Lynch, 50. His companion was Harry Farrington, 63.

"The guy shot at me again," de Filippi said, "and I emptied my gun as I jumped toward him."

"He was crumpled when I got to him."

The variance committee of Salem Planning Commission endorsed favorably Tuesday night the request of Phillip E. Gille to build a room on his house within four feet of his side property line on Berry St. between Electric and Hoyt.

The committee headed by T. W. Lowry reported it was divided on the request of Glen Hamilton for sanctioning a house on a lot with only 4,800 square feet at 776 Judson St. This would make the third residential lot in a row under the required 6,000 square feet, but on the other hand it would square off a lot with boundaries more uniform for the neighborhood, the report stated.

Committeemen asked the entire commission to decide the matter after next Tuesday night's hearing on this and the Gille and a third variance request. The latter, held up for word from the Capitol Planning Commission, is for modified off-street parking, height and front yard requirements for St. Mark Lutheran Church's new church site on Marion St.

Henry B. Koehler won commission approval for the plat of Regal Gardens residential subdivision of 44 lots in 1 1/2 acres of this property on the east side of South Liberty Road one half mile south of Browning Ave.

Also approved was residential plat of 20 lots in 5 acres for a new Hubbs subdivision one half mile north of Silverton Rd. near north city limits.

W. G. Wilson was permitted to withdraw his request for permission to conduct church services at a house at 653 N. 16th St. Protest of neighbors prompted the withdrawal, it was reported.

The commission recommended change of two street names to the City Council—change from Glendale St. to Orendale St. in Peony Gardens west of the bypass highway and north of Sunnyside Ave., and change from Musgrave St. to Kent St. on West Salem Heights.

Neuberger Asks Study of 'Baby Bonus'

WASHINGTON (UP)—Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Tuesday introduced a resolution to set up a special Senate committee to study Canada's 10-year-old "baby bonus" program to see if a similar plan would be feasible for U.S. youngsters.

All Canadian mothers are eligible for a monthly payment for each child under 16 years of age. Payments range from \$5 to \$8, a month depending upon the child's age.

Neuberger said the objective of the Canadian program, which now has the endorsement of all political parties, is to make available to children more clothing, wholesome foods and medical care as well as increased educational opportunities.

The senator told a news conference that all forms of social security to date have as their goal freedom from want in old age and now it is time to pay attention to the problems and needs which exist at the other end of life's ladder.

"The next great step forward in social legislation should be a program which seeks a healthier, happier and more secure life for the children of America," Neuberger said.

Two Bishops

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UP)—President Juan D. Peron's government Tuesday ordered two Roman Catholic bishops discharged from their posts, and called them in for questioning before a federal judge investigating recent disorders.

A decree from Peron and his cabinet accused the bishops of promoting the disorders involving supporters of the church and supporters of Peron.

Four hours after the bishops were taken to police headquarters, a high Catholic source said they were still there and that it could be presumed they were "detained."

House Votes Extension of Trade Pacts

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House Tuesday passed with only a shadow of past bitter debate a compromise bill to extend the reciprocal trade program three years and give the President new tariff-cutting powers.

A formal rollcall vote of 347 "ayes" and only 54 "noes" sent to the Senate the measure which would hand President Eisenhower much of the authority he sought to continue the new deal-founded program.

Senate passage, expected quickly, would take the bill to the White House.

The legislation would allow the President to trim U.S. tariffs up to 5 per cent a year for each of the three years until June 30, 1958, for a maximum of 15 per cent, in return for concessions offered by other nations on American goods.

The House acted after less than an hour's debate on the compromise measure Tuesday — a far cry from the tumultuous free trade-vs.-protection debate that saw the original bill squeeze by one and two vote margins in the House last February.

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School Board Hears Plea for County Zoning

Any decision on junior high school sites in West Salem, Keizer and east Salem areas should await a proper zoning ordinance to protect the taxpayers investment, members of the junior high school site committee of the Marion County Planning Commission recommended to Salem School Board members Tuesday night.

The report, presented by Vern McMullen and Robert Powell, said that sites of a minimum 20 acres should be acquired in south Salem and in West Salem as soon as funds are available.

"As the voters have not approved county planning by authorizing the county court to regulate land used through zoning, any site selected outside the city limits would be subject to encroachment by detrimental or objectionable uses of adjacent lands," the committee report said.
