

Farmers Returning to Cattle Production, Breeders Told

Posts and fences may find their way back between fields again in the Willamette Valley, Ben A. Newell, Marion County extension agent, told some 40 Shorthorn breeders Thursday night.

The cattle folk, on their annual Western Oregon-Washington tour, spent Thursday night at Salem, and were buffet supper

guests of Mr. and Mrs. Kehne Wain at their Pringle Shorthorn ranch. The tour started Thursday morning at Leaburg in the Eugene area. Stops were also made at the state college, where pasture programs and silage harvesting were inspected.

"Farmers in the valley turned to grass and other seed harvest crops a few years ago. They have found these very good, and much easier than livestock pro-

grams," Newell continued. "But bonanza days in these are over for the present and valley farmers, along with others, are looking about for more year-around farming again."

Change to Livestock
Newell pointed out that the change to livestock again was partially the result of the change in feed supplies in the valley. "This past year for the first time we have enough grain of feed quality for feeding cattle. We have always grown some grain in the valley, but the production was always small when we thought in terms of feeding cattle. Grass silage, and our new pasture methods have helped change the picture, too," Newell said, as he pointed out that corn was finding more place in the valley than it ever had before. This year, he explained, there are some 11,000 acres of corn in Marion County, an increase of a full 2,500 in this county alone.

Hay conditions were referred to as "ideal" in the valley this year, although Newell warned that "rain can still spoil a lot of hay here before it is safely in shelter."

Must Have Cattle
No long-time farm program without livestock could be foreseen for the Willamette Valley by T. R. Hobart, fieldman for the U.S. National Bank at Salem, one of the speakers at the informal supper hour program.

That specialty crops had "sort of moved out from under us" was the expressed opinion of Chester Loe, First National Bank fieldman at Salem, who also was on the program.

"We are not sure yet just how the cattle will fit in for a long-time program, but beef herds are increasing and appear to be a good thing," Loe said. He added that valley farmers were "searching for new or a return to old farm programs which will probably include more livestock."

Caution Advised
Newell cautioned the farmers not to go "too heavily into beef at once." It is better, he said, for a lot of folk to have a few beef than for a few people to have a lot of cattle "to start out with until we know how the program will work here." Feeding beef cattle is considerably different from feeding dairy, he concluded.

Ralph Heinemann of Waukon, Wash., western fieldman for the Shorthorn association, was chairman of the evening program. He said that 50,000 head of Shorthorns were being registered annually in the United States, and told that now 95 per cent of registered beef cattle in Argentina are Shorthorns.

The tour will be continued Thursday Friday, starting at the Clara Brown ranch at McMinnville at 9:30 a.m.

Radio Show Gift Cleared For Couple

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The U. S. Tax Court ruled Thursday that \$12,382 in cash and merchandise which Mr. and Mrs. Ray W. Campeau of Portland, Ore., received in 1949 for answering two questions on a radio quiz show was a gift, not subject to federal income tax.

The court said its decision was based on the individual circumstances in the case before it. It noted Congress last year moved to end long-standing confusion over the tax status of such awards by specifically including prizes and awards in gross income under the 1954 internal revenue code.

The Campeaus reported their quiz show winnings to the Internal Revenue Service on their 1949 returns, but did not show them as taxable gross income.

The service challenged this and attempted to collect an additional \$2,482 in taxes.

The Campeaus said they were in their home on the evening of Nov. 20, 1949, when they received a telephone call from the radio show "Hollywood Calling—Film of Fortune," and were asked to answer two questions relating to the Ritz Brothers comedy team and the motion picture, "Dead End."

When they did this, the program's sponsors sent them a score of prizes ranging from an automobile to a set of cigarette lighters and including \$1,125 in cash.

The tax court said they had performed nothing which could be construed as a service for compensation, noting they did not attempt to enter the contest, but received their phone call as a result of a random selection from a telephone book.

Rebels Still May Hold Argentine City

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP)—Listeners said Thursday night they had overheard the Argentine federal police radio hookup transmit a report Rosario, second largest Argentine city, was still held by rebels.

The listeners said the federal police detachment at Rosario quarters in Buenos Aires. The detachment said the Rosario rebels had refused to surrender.

Early reports Thursday from Buenos Aires said the rebels had captured the port city, 170 miles northwest of Buenos Aires. These reports later were discounted.

In announcing that the revolt had been suppressed, President Juan Peron acknowledged some points of resistance were holding out.

The government radio, however, said the situation was normal throughout the country outside the capital.

U. S. Jet Rams Into Japanese Homes, Kills 2

NAGOYA, Japan (AP)—A U. S. Sabre Jet crashed into a row of Japanese houses near here Friday, killing the pilot and a 16-year-old boy and critically injuring three other Japanese, 5th Air Force headquarters said.

A spokesman said the Sabre was coming in for an instrument landing on a flight from Chitose Air Base, North Japan, to nearby Kamaki Air Base.

The Sabre missed the runway by about one-fourth mile and crashed in flames into five houses, destroying one.

The Air Force said the dead 16-year-old boy and three Japanese hospitalized with critical injuries — a 10-month-old baby, a 53-year-old woman and a man — all were in the destroyed house.

The SEC then agreed that an attorney for the firm could appear for the two directors. The SEC said it is looking into methods employed by the firm in selling memberships.

Woolen Mill Plan Unaltered By Charges

BROWNSVILLE — The Federal Trade Commission's mislabeling charge against the Brownsville Woolen Mills is not expected to hinder the plant's impending move to Jefferson, Raymond Page, sales manager of that firm, said Thursday.

The Brownsville Woolen Mills, which burned March 1, was owned by Chester A. Page of Salem.

Raymond Page said he and his brother Chester E. Page bought the firm's remaining assets from their father on June 7. They are now planning to erect a \$150,000 mill at Jefferson if public stock sales provide about \$75,000 of that amount.

Raymond Page termed the FTC action a "routine check on our labeling" and said they have definitely agreed to revise the labeling accordingly to allow for a 10 per cent miscellaneous fiber content in certain low price blankets.

The FTC said it found these blankets, labeled 25 per cent virgin wool and 75 per cent reused wool, contained five per cent miscellaneous fibers and only 70 per cent reused wool.

The company had originally attempted to sell stock to Brownsville persons with the intention of rebuilding the mill there. Raymond Page said some \$15,000 was pledged. The shift to Jefferson resulted from slow stock sales in Brownsville. Raymond Page said the small amount of cash collected is in escrow and will be returned if the Jefferson move succeeds.

An earlier story said replacement machinery for the new mill has already been ordered. However, Raymond Page said the option on it expired at 6 p.m. Tuesday, but "this doesn't hinder us any."
