Embittered Men Linked to Case of Judge

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — (UP) — Police investigating the mysterious disappearance of a prominent judge and his wife pressed a search Saturday for two embittered men whose marriages were dissolved in the jurist's court.

Police admitted they were without a "prime suspect" in the three-day-old case, but said the two men, one of whom promised to "get even" with Judge C. C. Chillingworth, might be able to help clear up the mystery.

Chillingworth, 58, and his 57-year-old wife disappeared from their oceanfront summer cottage here three days ago. A trail of blood leading to the ocean was discovered, but police have almost abandoned the idea that the couple was killed and their bodies thrown into the sea.

Skin divers combed the reef-studded ocean floor in front of the Chillingworth property Saturday, but failed to turn up anything that aided investigators.

Sheriff John S. Kirk and Deputy W. Hiram Lawrence said they were running down hundreds of leads, but presently only the two divorced men, who were not identified, have been listed as suspects.

Sheriff Kirk said "in one of the cases the man threatened the judge. He swore he'd get even. We want to get him and question him but so far officers have been unable to find him."

Police said that in a similar divorce case another man made some "uncomplimentary" remarks about the judge. Police were also searching for him.

Young GOPs Back Nixon, Eisenhower

DETROIT — The nation's Young Republicans ended their convention Saturday with an endorsement of an Eisenhower-Nixon ticket for 1956, shortly after receiving a congratulatory telegram from President Eisenhower.

The President called them the "future leaders of our country" and noted that the federation's 500,000 members can help preach the GOP program of "peace, prosperity and human well-being" to more than eight million new voters who will be eligible in 1956.

Efforts to have delegates adopt resolutions to force labor unions under anti-trust laws and support for a right-to-work law—all proposed by Michael Casey, a Michigan delegate from Detroit, were shouted down.

Charles McWhorter, New York, was elected chairman for 1956.

Richard Karsten was named vice chairman for Washington state.

Demand for 35 Hour Work Week Due to Be Made

ST. LOUIS — The CIO Communications Workers will demand a 35-hour work week for Bell telephone system switchboard operators in negotiations this year, the president of the union said Saturday.

Joseph A. Beirne, president of the union which opens its convention in St. Louis Monday, said the five-hour reduction in the work week will be a major negotiating objective.

5 Jet Fighters Downed by Thunderstorm

KANSAS CITY — Five navy jet fighters in a flight from Dallas to Denver were forced down by thunderstorms Saturday. Reports indicated three of them crashed.

All pilots were reported safe. At least two bailed out.

It was reported by a resident of Selkirk, in western Kansas, that a jet crashed 12 miles northeast of there, burying wreckage 20 feet in the ground.

The 44th Air Rescue Squadron at Denver said one plane crashed near Wekan, Kan., and another at Bonny Reservoir in southeast Colorado. Another landed at Walker AFB, Vitoria, Kan.

At Ness City, Kan., Undersheriff Dudley Craston said a jet landed three miles west of town, undamaged and the pilot unhurt. He said he could not identify the pilot.

Prior to 1944, he served with several regiments before transferring to the 6th Infantry Division in the South Pacific. In 1945 he became assistant commander of the 6th Division, serving in that capacity until it was deactivated a year later.

He was named assistant commander of the Sunset Division in 1946 when he was promoted to brigadier general, and in 1951, he assumed command of the two-state guard and was promoted to major general.

Many decorations include the Silver Star, Bronze Star with cluster, Purple Heart, Combat Infantry Badge, Southwest Pacific Ribbon with arrow and three campaigns, Philippine Liberation Ribbon with Star, Distinguished Unit Badge with cluster, and the Philippine Service Ribbon. He also holds the Order of the British Empire for valor.

In civilian life, Maison is superintendent of Oregon's state police, a position he has held since returning from active duty in 1946.

He began his career with the state's top law enforcement agency when it was still known as the "traffic division" and was a joint function of the state highway department and Secretary of State.

Hesitant Gunman Robs Iowa Bank

CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa — A lone gunman who complained about "the shape the world's in," held up the Mount Auburn savings bank Saturday and fled by car with \$11,700 in currency.

Cashier Robert W. Hadley was alone in the bank when the holdup occurred. When the bandit tied Hadley with wire, he remarked: "I hate to do a thing like this but the shape the world's in these days a man can't make a living."

The gunman, about 55, wore a dark business suit and horn-rimmed glasses.

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Demos Storing Up Trouble, Solon Asserts

WASHINGTON — Sen. Cotton (R-NH) said Saturday there is "something phony" about the calm in Congress and he accused Democrats with storing up legislative "bombs" for the 1956 election year session.

Without reference to Cotton's comments, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Democratic leader, said he has "no next session plans" and is only interested in seeing Congress gets its job done in time for a July 31 adjournment.

Cotton asserted in a report to New Hampshire voters that the Democrats "have bottled up important measures like aid to school construction and the military reserve bill which would split their party on the rock of racial segregation."

"They are keeping a few little bombs like farm price supports and Taft-Hartley revision carefully up their sleeves so they can explode them next year just before election," he declared.

Says Strangely, Docile

"Don't be fooled by all this talk about the Democrats supporting the president's program. There is something phony about both the mild weather and the congressional calm. They are too good to last."

Canoes Flip, Dunk 77 Men At Carnival

BELLINGHAM, Wash. — Seventy-seven men were thrown into rough waters of Hale's Passage Saturday afternoon when seven racing war canoes swamped. The race was a feature of the Lummi Indian Stompmish water carnival.

A Coast Guard patrol boat and pleasure craft managed to pull all 77 men from the water.

Fifteen canoes started the first-round race. Four 11-man boats finished.

The defending champion, Chehalis I, a canoe from Harrison Mills, B. C., finished first.

Last year, four carnival workers were killed and two others hospitalized when a steel frame being erected at the Stompmish site came in contact with a high tension wire.

Tangent Woman Victim of Accident

TANGENT, Ore. — Mrs. Mabel Frances Shearer, 64, who drowned in a pond on her farm Friday, was the victim of an accident, Dep. Coroner Walter Kropp reported Saturday.

Problem Boy Of Portland Again Jailed

CRESCENT CITY, Calif. (UP) — Joe Oniru, the problem boy of the Portland, Ore., police department has showed up again — this time in jail here on a vagrancy charge.

Joe was first found in Portland in May, 1951, sleeping under a pile of tar paper. He claimed he couldn't understand English and a parade of interpreters failed to get him to speak any far eastern dialect, despite his oriental heritage.

His birthplace was unknown and when immigration officers at Portland and Seattle, Wash., couldn't determine how he entered the U.S., he was turned loose.

A Portland detective, Ronald McKenzie, took the lad home and started him to school. But Joe smoked too much and played too rough and was determined to go to Chicago.

Young Wife of Investigator Shot to Death

ALAMOSA, Colo. (UP) — The young wife of a district attorney's special investigator was slain on the porch of her home Saturday by assassins apparently seeking the death of her husband.

The woman, Mrs. Virginia Armijo, mother of three small children, was shot once through the head as she and her husband, Jerry Armijo, 35, stepped onto the porch of their home at the nearby small town of La Jara.

Armijo, special investigator for district attorney John Ira Green of the 12th Colorado Judicial District, was not hit by the slayers' bullets.

Family Ends 72-Hour Bomb Shelter Stay

HOUSTON, Tex. — The John R. Christmas family ended its 72-hour test of an H-bomb shelter Saturday afternoon.

Mayor Roy Hofheinz headed a large crowd which applauded as the family crawled out the shelter's escape hatch.

The most excited person on hand, however, was 5-year-old Dorothy Jan, who was too young to join her parents, brother and sister in the civil defense test.

The first voice heard from the escape hatch said: "Hello, sweet heart."

It was Mrs. Christmas greeting Dorothy Jan.

Mr. and Mrs. Christmas were followed by the other children, Stanley, 13, and Mary Lou, 11.

Mrs. Christmas said she enjoyed the experience but the others got under her feet as she cooked meals in the 113-square foot shelter.

Christmas said the only thing he found lacking in the shelter was a good cup of coffee.

Health Man Arrested on Dope Charge

CHICAGO (UP) — The public health director of suburban Cicero was arrested Friday night for allegedly issuing an illegal prescription to a Chicago narcotics detective who posed as a patient.

Dr. Thomas Kallal, 48, was seized in his private medical office after taking \$6 in marked money from Det. Miles Cooperman for a prescription for "a sympathetic narcotic called dolophin," police said.

Mountain Top Falls Into Sea

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UP) — Virtually an entire mountain top consisting of hundreds of tons of snow and debris have plunged into the ocean one mile from Whittier, it was reported here Saturday.

Whittier residents had a front row seat at the spectacular occurrence.

The slide, in an unpopulated area yesterday afternoon, sent hundreds of gulls up in the air, according to J. M. McLaughlin of the post engineer office.

A tidal wave caused by the slide was so strong it broke a three inch mooring chain of a vessel on the opposite shore. Col. McWesley Leadbetter, Whittier commanding officer, warned small craft to stay out of the area because of the danger of additional slides.

At the time of the slide the scene appeared "just like Niagara Falls," residents reported.

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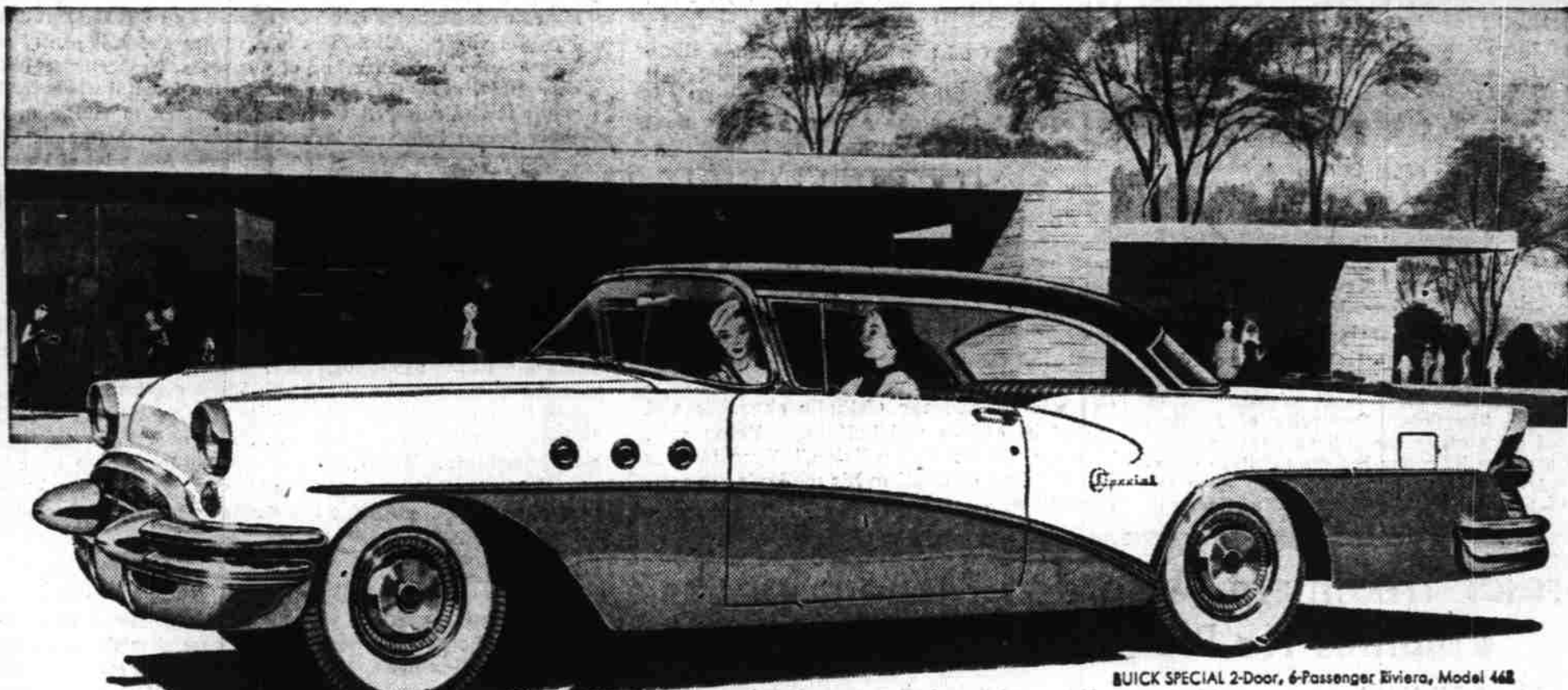
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
