Remodeling of Old Interstate Bridge Asked

PORTLAND — Boatmen protested Monday that the present bridge over the Columbia River between Vancouver, Wash., and Portland is a menace to navigation, and should be remodeled before a new bridge is added.

Army Engineers conducted a hearing on the matter. The protests came from tugboat operators, yachtsmen, the Columbia River Pilots Assn., and dock and port commission.

The hearing was called to try to determine whether the bridge needs to be remodeled to provide more clearance, both in height and width, for river traffic.

If the Army Engineers call for the remodeling, Oregon and Washington are ready to put up 25 per cent of the remodeling cost to match a federal government contribution of 50 per cent, said R. H. Baldock, Oregon highway engineer. The remodeling cost is estimated at \$2,510,000.

A new bridge is scheduled to be built near the present bridge, each then carrying one-way traffic. The new bridge is scheduled for completion in 1958.

Crooked Finger Gets Ready for Pilgrimage

MT. ANGEL—Crooked Finger put in its second Saturday of preliminary work this week in preparation for the Marian Pilgrimage to be held August 15. About 9:30 a.m. on June 18 the little community reported for work in the grove and grounds surrounding Holy Rosary chapel and the pilgrimage path leading from the church through a half mile of farm and wood lands to the Cleve Helvey home, starting point of the procession.

Father Hildebrand of Mt. Angel, who serves as missionary pastor of the Crooked Finger church, supervised the work. One project is the planting of over 500 gladioli bulbs to insure plenty of flowers for the pilgrimage.

The procession path will be the same as last year but fences about the church are being relocated to enlarge the enclosure

and make room for even larger crowds.

Requests for a repetition of the pilgrimage have been received from all over the country. Father Hildebrand is ordering 8000 candles for the night procession.

Since the Feast of the Assumption, August 15, falls on a Monday this year, and most working folk could not attend, it was deemed best to hold two pilgrimages, one in the afternoon primarily for the children and members of religious communities and one at night for the general public.

Six other Willamette Valley communities are taking an active part in the preparations this year by arranging to sponsor large shrines honoring some phase of the life of the Mother of God. They are Jordan, Stayton, Woodburn, Silverton, Mt. Angel and Canby-Molalla.
