Senators Win 8-0, Hop to Second Place

Francis Hurls 3-Hit Shutout

Salem Still 1/2 Game From League Lead

FERRIS FIELD, Spokane.—(Special to The Statesman)—The Salem Senators continued to be just as hot as the weather here Tuesday, blanking the Spokane Indians 8-0 in their Northwest League baseball game to go 2-0 up in the four-game series.

The win was a sweet one for the Senators, for it put them in second place in the standings, over skidding Wenatchee which again lost to Eugene and fell to third place. Salem is still only half a game from the leading Eugene.

Salem Hot Too
It was 100 degrees here Tuesday, for the hottest day since Aug. 15, 1953. The Senators played in accord with the weather, blasting out 15 hits off Bill Bottler and Pat Flannigan.

It was just about the opposite for Senators' Righthander Bud Francis, who checked the Spokesmen with three hits, all singles, in racking up his third win of the season. First-baseman Joe Porter and Bottler were the only Indians able to get hits off Francis, the former having two.

Finally Makes It
Francis has been pitching some outstanding games for the Senators in recent weeks, but has seemingly been unable to finish them or gain a decision in them. It was different Tuesday. He walked only two, fanned four.

All Salem hits were singles and Mel Krause and Harvey Koepf led the steady attack with three each. Jack Dunn, Bill Shields and Jack Steinagel each had two. Only Gene Tanselli failed to get a hit for the Senators.

The Senators scored a run in the second on hits by Steinagel and Koepf, got two in the third on hits by Krause, Dunn and Shields, added another in the sixth on bingles by Koepf and Dunn and then knocked out Bottler in the seventh when four runs tallied on four hits, by Steinagel, Tommy Agosta, Don Frailey and Koepf.

Nelson Victor In 10-Rounder

SEATTLE (AP)—Willard Nelson, 18-year-old fighting 136-pounder from Portland, Ore., won a close 10-round decision Tuesday night over Ernie Davis, 136, Seattle, in the main event of a boxing card.

Nelson's win was his 29th straight. The fast young fighter who graduated from high school only last week, scored with the cleaner punches although Davis was the aggressor most of the way.

He rocked Davis several times and two judges voted for him and the third called it a draw.

Tiger Al Williams, 155, Los Angeles, won a preliminary 10-rounder in an energetic mix with Ritchie Lopez, 158, Mexico City. Williams, fighting with a bad cut under his left eye from the second round, had a narrow edge virtually all the way. It was one of the toughest fights seen in Seattle in many months, with both men continually flailing away from bell to bell.

Joe Benson, Columbus, Ohio, bantamweight, defeated Luis Castillo, Mexico City, in another 10-rounder. Both fought at 122 pounds, with Benson's superior reach telling against Castillo.

In the only knockout of the prelims, Bill Miller, 148, Seattle, stopped Alex (Kid) Alaska, Fairbanks, 142, in the first round of a scheduled four round, Joe Flowers, 161, Portland, defeated Curtis Knox, 160, Seattle, in four.

Ted Williams' ever-booming bat kept Boston on the move in the American League race Tuesday night, powering a three-run homer that beat Detroit 5-4 and pushed the Red Sox to within two games of the fourth place Tigers.

The first place New York Yankees, meanwhile, kept their two game lead by beating Kansas City 6-2 with Mickey Mantle blasting one of the longest home runs in Yankee Stadium history. Chicago's second place White Sox kept the pace by thumping Washington 6-1 and third place Cleveland beat Baltimore 3-1 as Bob Lemon became the first to win 10 games in the American League this season.

In the National League, Brooklyn upped its lead to 12 games by beating the runnerup Chicago Cubs 7-1 in 11 innings while Newcombe nailed up his 12th victory of the campaign.

Braves Top Back
Milwaukee dropped Pittsburgh 6-4 Cincinnati rocked the New York Giants again, 10-1, and Philadelphia beat St. Louis 10-8.

PORTLAND (AP)—Seattle won its 10th straight game Tuesday night by downing Portland, 4-3, and climbed into a tie with San Diego for the Pacific Coast League lead.

In winning Seattle snapped a six game Portland victory streak. Art Schult was the man who provided the big blow.

He came up in the first inning with two men on base and swatted a home run off Portland starter Royce Lint. It seemed anti-climatic at the time, but what happened next proved decisive. Bob Balena singled and scored a few minutes later on catcher Joe Ginsberg's double.

Fletcher Relieves
That turned out to be the winning run, for Portland peeked away at Seattle's starter, John Oldham, until the score was 4-3 in the fourth. When Oldham began to get in trouble again in the fifth, Van Fletcher took over on the mound and blanked Portland the rest of the way, getting credit for the victory.

Frank Austin singled one Portland run home in the second inning. A single by Carl Powis, a double by Joe Taylor and an error by Schult allowed another Portland run in the third. Austin walked in the fourth and scored the final run by moving around the bases on a wild pitch and two ground balls.

Portland got 10 hits off the Seattle pitchers, but three Seattle doubles nipped the scoring.

In other PCL games, Sacramento tripped San Diego, 5-3. Hollywood blanked Oakland, 3-0, and San Francisco defeated Los Angeles, 5-2.

PCC Tips Big Ten; Seaman Wins Mile

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—Fernando Ledesma of Southern California cracked the collegiate two-mile record with a time of 8 minutes 57.7 seconds Tuesday night as the Pacific Coast defeated the Big Ten, 75-57, in their 14th annual inter-conference track meet.

Wes Santee of Kansas set the college standard at 8 minutes 58 seconds a year ago.

Ledesma, a junior at USC, won by 60 yards and going away from Bob Hunt of UCLA and Ken Reiser of Oregon as the Pacific Coast swept the event. Ledesma was clocked in at 4 minutes 21.5 seconds for the second mile around the baked-clay track at Edwards Stadium.

The brilliant time for eight laps actually was the second fastest run by Ledesma. He turned in a clocking of 8 minutes 56.4 seconds earlier this year at the Compton (Calif.) races in a second place finish to Horace Ashenfelter as he established an American record of 8 minutes 49.6 seconds.

Goulding Pulls Muscle
Jim Goulding of Northwestern, national sprint champion, pulled a thigh muscle on the anchor lap of the 440-yard relay as the meet opened before 7,500 fans.

Goulding, running against Bob Gary of Washington State, had enough lead to carry the Big Ten to a triumph but limped the final 20 yards.

The winning time was 41.6 seconds. Running ahead of Goulding for the Big Ten were Bill Garner of Minnesota, Bob Brown of Michigan and Harry Nash of Minnesota.

There was no immediate announcement of the extent of Goulding's injury. The Northwestern star won both sprints in the National Collegiate meet last weekend at Los Angeles.

Seaman Beats Dellinger
Bobby Seaman of UCLA went past Oregon's Bill Dellinger on the home stretch to win the mile by two yards in the meet and stadium record time of 4 minutes 42 seconds. The old meet mark was set by Don Lash of Indiana at 4 minutes 9 seconds in 1937 and the stadium record by Santee at 4 minutes 5.5 seconds in 1954.

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Archie Rated To Keep Title

Problem of Weight Gives Bobo Chance

NEW YORK (AP)—Ancient Archie Moore is expected to shatter Bobo Olson's dreams of becoming a super champion Wednesday night on the old ring adage that a "good big man beats a good little man."

Moore's punching power and ring savvy are given the edge over Olson's persistent attack.

Unless Archie has unexpected trouble making the 175-pound light heavyweight limit for the fourth defense of his crown, the odds against Olson, the middleweight champion, may soar over the 2-1 figure.

The weigh-in for the 15-round match, scheduled for noon, may tell the story of the fight to be expected Wednesday night at the Polo Grounds.

Added Support Seen
If Moore makes it with ease, say, at about 173½ pounds, he'll gain added support. If Archie has to sweat it off during a two-hour period of grace, he could go into the ring an underdog.

Apparently most of the boxing writers who have watched both work in camp, think Moore will be strong at the weight for they're picking Archie by a 2-3 score, many on a knockout. The idea in this corner is that Moore will win by a knockout in 10 rounds.

Moore was announced at 196½ pounds for his May 2 bout with Nino Valdes at Las Vegas although there were reports, persistently denied, that he actually scaled only 186½. In any event, he pared off plenty at his Summit, N.J., camp with the help of a spell of hot weather.

No Weight Problem
Olson, of course, has no weight problem. Manager Sid Flaherty wants him to come in close to 170 for this important battle. Bobo, the balding Hawaiian who now lives in San Francisco, normally weighs about 168 for over-the-weight scraps.

Both fighters will drive in from their camps in the morning. Tuesday Olson went shopping and took it easy at Asbury Park, N.J. Moore didn't box but
