

Russia Admission Surprise to U. S.

(Story also on page one.)
WASHINGTON (U. S. A.)—Officials and members of Congress viewed with surprise and satisfaction the Russian admission that they may have been partly at fault in the shooting down of an American reconnaissance plane off Alaska.

U. S. officials said it was the first time the Russians have expressed regret and offered to pay damages in the shooting down of an American plane.

Sens. Purcell (R-Conn.) and Holland (D-Fla.) said they were pleased that the Russians had shown a conciliatory attitude and had offered compensation.

However, the officials who commented received with no surprise Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov's expression of regret and offer to pay half the cost in the shooting down of the plane last Wednesday in the Bering Straits.

Thaying Out
These officials said the action fits in with Russia's current policy of seeking a thawing out of the cold war.

In another air incident last November—the destruction of a U. S. plane by Communist fighters near Japan—Molotov said it was too bad that such a thing had occurred. But that was as close as the Russians came to any real expression of regret.

So Molotov's effort to make amends was viewed here as unqualified.

Purcell said that in view of the Soviets' partial admission of guilt he is inclined to think the incident was unanticipated by the Russians whereas yesterday he thought it might have been deliberate.

Seamen End British Strike
LONDON (U. S. A.)—Striking seamen Saturday called off their wildcat walkout which bottled up Britain's big dollar-earning transatlantic passenger fleet for 26 days in the midst of the tourist season.

Still out are 18,000 stevedores, their ranks divided in an internal fight for bargaining rights along the country's long water-front.

The striking seamen—mostly dining room stewards and kitchen workers—demanded better living conditions at sea, a shorter work week and higher allowances while on shore.

Cordon to Seek GOP Delegate Job
PORTLAND (U. S. A.)—Guy Cordon, who said he would not seek public office again after his defeat for reelection to the U. S. Senate last year by Democrat Richard L. Neuberger, still has aspirations.

Here on a combination business and pleasure trip, Cordon said Saturday he likely would be a candidate for delegate to the Republican national convention in San Francisco next year.

Cordon planned to fish Saturday and go to Roseburg Sunday or Monday.

U.S. Radarman Tells of Attack By Red Planes

BOSTON (U. S. A.)—"I felt a jolt and I knew we had been hit. I never saw the MIGs (sic) myself."

That is how Radarman John F. Rump, 20, of Malden, Mass., described in a telephone interview with The Boston Sunday Globe the Soviet attack on the Navy Neptune plane over the Bering Sea Wednesday.

The Globe published a copyrighted account of the interview. Rump, now at Kodiak, Alaska, told the Globe Saturday night "We were on a routine patrol when the Russians hit us."

"Suddenly, Don Sonnek, our ordnance man, hollered over the intercom from his rear station: 'There are planes on our tail. They're firing at us.'"

"The port engine burst into flames. Then I discovered three of the fellows had been hit by bullets."

"Then I felt the plane dip and we shot into the clouds."

"The MIGs made only one pass at us. They never had the opportunity for another."

"Halfway through the landing (on St. Lawrence Island) there was a flash fire."

"The bomb bay tank exploded. It was a miracle we weren't all killed. Some of the men were yelling in pain from burns and broken arms."

Emergency Exit
"Everyone got out of the plane under his own power through an emergency exit."

"We were there about an hour when a whaleboat with Eskimos aboard arrived on the scene. They were members of the Alaskan National Guard Ground—Observer Corps."

COOS BAY (U. S. A.)—A lumber company worker who came here only three weeks ago from Vincennes, Ind., was killed when a panel truck overturned on him early Saturday on the Coos Bay-Empire cutoff road.

Vernon Jantzer, 22, driver of the truck, said he parked the truck on a soft shoulder to examine a faulty steering mechanism. Just as his passenger, Chester R. Bonhomme, 26, alighted from the opposite side, the truck tipped over, crushing Bonhomme. Jantzer was unhurt.

Heart Attack Kills Portland Judge

PORTLAND (U. S. A.)—Circuit Judge Lowell C. Mundorff, who was appointed to the bench in 1944 from a federal clerkship, died of a heart attack here Friday night.

The judge recently had heard arguments in a case attacking the city's controversial pinball ban. An injunction granted operators has prevented police from fully enforcing the ban.

Judge Mundorff, 48, is survived by his widow and four children.

Rural Men Back Plan for Apportionment

PENDLETON (U. S. A.)—Representatives of rural Oregon counties decided here Saturday to prepare petitions calling for enactment of the so-called "federal plan" for apportionment of the Oregon Legislature.

The plan provides for election of one senator from each of the state's 36 counties, and representatives according to population as at present.

Giles French, former legislator and publisher of the Sherman County Journal, was elected chairman of the group. An executive committee representing all sections of the state will select a finance committee. Each county will form its own organization, circulate petitions and raise funds.

French said he believed considerable help could be expected from the State Grange, which endorsed the federal plan at its convention in Klamath Falls last week.

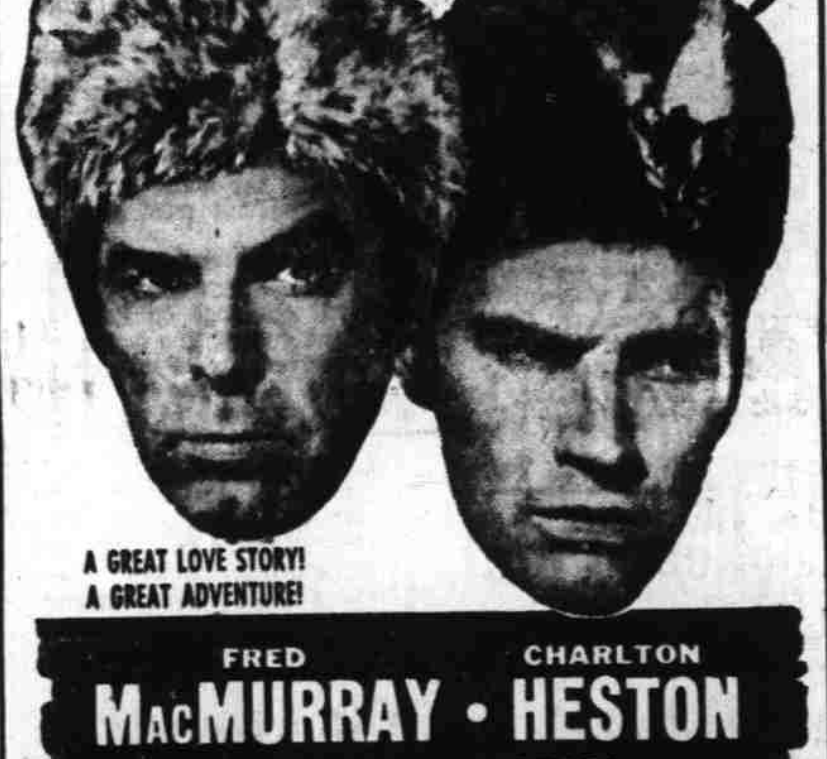
