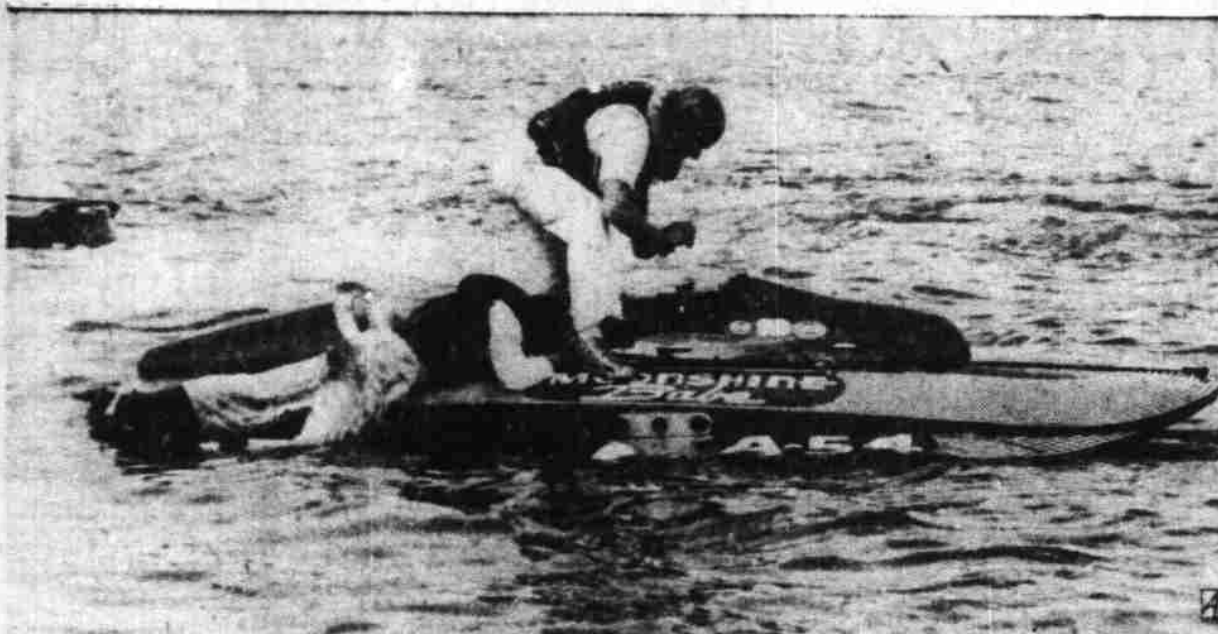
Birthday Party Honors Sheryl Renee Hilborn

Red Decisions On Conflict in Asia Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — Crucial decisions on the course of the Communist conflict in Southeast Asia are expected from Red leaders in Russia and China within the next three weeks.

The key to what is about to happen, officials said Sunday, lies in the mission by President Ho Chi Minh of Communist Northern Vietnam. He arrived in Peiping Saturday and plans to confer with officials there as well as in Moscow.

He is assumed to be subordinate to Moscow and Peiping on questions of major strategy, but at the moment he is a key figure because he commands the most active and therefore one of the most dangerous sectors of the whole cold war front.

Southeast Asian problems, recently overshadowed by those of Formosa and of Europe, will move to the forefront in Washington also this week when Burmese Premier U Nu comes here for talks with President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles. He is due June 29 to stay through July 2.

Communist forces in Southeast Asia, U. S. officials report, are actively, though not urgently threatening the security of five countries—South Viet Nam, Cambodia, Laos, Burma and Thailand. This situation in Southeast Asia contrasts sharply with Russia's peace protestations in advance of the Big Four meeting at Geneva.

Fertilizer Plant Being Erected

HAMMOND, Ind. (AP) — A new plant is going up here to produce 300 tons of ammonia a day for fertilizer. It will use hydrogen, a by-product of gasoline production, and nitrogen distilled from liquid air.

Farmers use special equipment to inject ammonia into the soil to replace nitrogen used by plants. The plants cannot use nitrogen until it is combined with hydrogen, as in ammonia, or some other element. Agronomists say the growing of 60 bushels of corn on an acre will remove 95 pounds of nitrogen from the soil.
