County Circuit Courts 'Buzz' With Activity

Marion County's three circuit courts were a beehive of activity Tuesday with three jury trials in progress.

Court No. 1, presided over by Judge George R. Duncan, continued hearing testimony on the state's murder charge against Casper Overess.

Across the hall, Judge Val D. Sloper was hearing testimony on a charge of embezzlement by bailee against Jack A. Shoemaker, 1165 Chemeketa St. The case will continue this morning.

Shoemaker is accused of converting 1,468 turkeys consigned to him to his own use. He was indicted by the grand jury early in May.

In the third courtroom, a damage suit brought against Dr. John W. Ramage by Lois Campbell resulted in a jury verdict for the plaintiff for \$1,002.

The case, heard before Judge Wesley Franklin, a protem judge, stemmed from an accident in 1953 in the Salem General Hospital driveway. The woman had asked for \$5,000 general damages for injuries allegedly incurred in the accident.

Dr. Ramage, who was on his way to the hospital in answer to a call, filed a counter-claim for \$351 for damage to his vehicle in the mishap. The jury deliberated about 30 minutes.

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State Hospital Addition to Be Ready Oct. 15

The Oregon board of control learned Tuesday that the 676-bed wing at the Oregon State Hospital will be completed Oct. 15.

The assurance was given by Ross B. Hammond, Portland contractor who is building the wing.

Hammond also advised the board that building costs have increased 2 percent in the past 18 months.

The board, for the fifth straight year, gave Standard Insurance Co., Portland, the contract for life insurance for employees of the state police and state prison. The company, submitting the lowest of 29 bids, will charge \$1.96 per month premium on each \$5,000 policy.

The board announced that the state hospital has contracted for \$50,000 worth of furniture to be built at the new furniture factory at the state penitentiary.

It also authorized Col. William Ryan, state supervisor of institutions, to attend the American Psychiatric Association Institute in Washington, D. C., on Oct. 3. Others who will make the trip are Dr. Dean K. Brooks, superintendent of the state hospital, and Dr. Irvin Hill, superintendent of the Fairview Home for feeble-minded persons.

Letter Tells of Capitol Mall Appraisals

A letter of procedure, with relation to appraisals involving property offered for purchase by the state in the capitol mall, was directed by Gov. Paul L. Patterson to a meeting of the state board of control Tuesday.

A copy of the letter would be given to all property owners who desire to sell their property to the state.

Purpose of the procedure letter, Governor Patterson said, is to halt requests for property appraisals which have cost the state a substantial amount of money during the past few years.

Particular attention was made of one property for which the board of control was asked to pay \$486.67 for reappraisal. Price of this property, including an old house, was fixed at \$7,326.

Gov. Patterson approved this price, along with other board members, only after board Secretary E. J. (Bill) Ireland said the final appraisal was the third that had been made at the expense of the state.

Records show the board has purchased 15 houses in the capitol area and one tract of land at a total cost of \$347,684. Also under negotiations for purchase are the First Presbyterian Church property and the Glendora apartments. Final papers have not been signed involving these two properties.

Rape Charge Filed Against Salem Man

Frank Edward Griffith, 23, 6210 Portland Rd., Tuesday was charged with statutory rape on the signed confession of a 14-year-old girl and his own oral confession, Salem police said.

Arrested on a vagrancy charge was Melvin Brown, 24, also of 6210 Portland Rd., who was picked up in the company of Griffith and the girl, police added.

The girl, given a juvenile court hearing Tuesday afternoon on a charge of immoral conduct, was ordered held in Marion County juvenile detention quarters by Judge Joseph B. Felton.

Griffith, charged on a district court warrant, is slated for arraignment before Judge Felton today.

Small Crimson Clover, Lupine Crops Forecast

The first of the season's seed crop estimates have just been released in Washington, D. C., and indicate small crops of both crimson clover and lupine, two of the leading cover crop seeds.

The nation's crimson clover seed crop is expected to be the smallest in 15 years. The forecast sets the new crop at a little less than 8 million pounds, or about half the 1954 crop. Both acreage and yield are down this year. Dry weather last fall and late spring freezes in the south are given as reasons for the small estimate in the nation.

In Oregon, things are a bit different. Oregon's crop (until this week's rain) was forecast at 1.8 million pounds, the second largest crop since 1942. Here, acreage and yield are both up from last year. Rains this week are expected to trim down somewhat last week's estimate of 360 pounds to the acre.

State Weather Slows Logging

Weather put a crimp in western Oregon logging again this past week. Log supplies dropped off as showers soaked some areas that had just begun to dry out. Mills were still trying to build up their log inventories and scattered price increases were reported from these. Mill owners report an extremely wide range in prices.

Long No. 2 second-growth Douglas fir sawlogs at Willamette Valley mills ranged all the way from \$25 to \$60 a thousand in Tuesday's reports. Peelers sold over a \$15 range up to to prices of \$80, \$90 and \$105 a thousand.

Forty-five foot barkie poles delivered at Willamette Valley pole yards brought 18 to 23 cents a lineal foot, depending on diameters. In Douglas county, the same length peeled, was 17 cents a foot at the farmer's landing.

Second-growth Douglas fir bark for tanning was rated \$20 a ton at Dallas this week. Dry cascara bark was 18 cents and swordfens were bringing 23 cents a bunch.

County Considers Taking Over Street

A request that Bluff Street, located off South 12th Street, become a county road was taken under advisement Tuesday by the Marion County Court.

The road is paved and, according to County Engineer John Anderson, comes complete with a "park" area, including trees and playground equipment, in a small unpaved area on the edge of the street.

Oregon Fair's First Entry for '55 Received

The Oregon State Fair office started distributing premium books Tuesday and before the day was out the first exhibit entry for the 1955 State Fair had been received.

Doerfler Nursery of Salem entered a "contemporary garden" exhibit for the flower and garden show at the Fair.

Commenting on the premium booklets, State Fair officials said persons requesting booklets should state the division or departments in which they are interested so that proper forms can be sent with the premium list.

More than 2,000 of the lists have been sent to former fair exhibitors and others. Fair dates this year are Saturday, Sept. 3, through Saturday, Sept. 10.

The new booklet gives premium lists and competitive regulations for the textile, foods, art, floral, land products, honey, bees, rabbits, poultry, swine, sheep and goats, draft horses, beef, dairy purpose and dairy cattle departments.

The premium list cover illustrates the gay nineties theme of Oregon's 90th state fair this year.

State Employees Can't Get Oregon Gas, Oil Leases
